"It's been great fun," said Philip. "We've had some good times and have lots of really good friends here.

"We'll be sad to go and will really miss everyone, but we need to have an adventure while we still can!"

During their last week, Philip and Seb welcomed a stream of customers calling in to to wish them well, many bringing cards, gifts and bottles of wine.

The couple's last official day behind the shop counter was on Easter Saturday, but Philip and Seb spent the following week stocktaking and handing over the reins to new owner Sarah Freeman.

Although Sarah will be putting her own stamp on the business, it will remain a craft shop. "It's been a craft shop for more than 30 years, so it was important to us to find someone to keep the tradition going," said Philip.

Former teacher Sarah, who has been a family friend for many years, will be able to call on Philip and Sebastien's expertise for the next few weeks.

"We have yet to sell our house in Brighton, so will be around for a little while longer," said Philip.

"But we aim to be in France by the summer."

The pair will be moving into Sebastien's family house, and will be converting part of the property into bed and breakfast accommodation. "We've already had customers asking if they can book rooms, so I'm sure lots of people will come and hunt us out," he said. The couple also plan to keep in touch with their Cuckfield friends through Skype. "Don't ever think that skype is just for youngsters," said Philip. "We have customers who are in their 80s who have said they will Skype us. We might even skype the knitting groups!"

And the pair intend to visit the village when they return for holidays. "My mum lives in Burgess Hill, so we will be back for regular visits," said Philip. "So it's not goodbye – just au revoir!"

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Style Lounge hair-n-beauty

It takes more than Storm Katie to scare the walkers of Cuckfield, so despite delayed flights at Gatwick, trees down at Ansty, trains 'up the creek' at Haywards Heath and challenging weather conditions around twenty brave hearts set off from the Recreation Ground for the Independent State of Cuckfield's Easter Monday Walking Race. This annual event, which goes back to the 1920s, requires the participants to circumnavigate the five miles of road which enclose a section of the village. Not exactly 'beating the bounds' but reminiscent of that tradition. Running is forbidden and marshals line the route to report those who break this rule. The route this year, however, was muddy, cluttered with twigs and branches from the previous night's storm and had plenty of puddles lying in wait for the unsuspecting walker; indeed more of an obstacle than a walking race. In spite of all these setbacks, originality and determination prevailed.

Gareth Knapman walked with his dog Gizzy and his six year old nephew Zack, both crossing the finishing line in first position. Rob Helliwell, landlord of The Wheatsheaf and previous Mayor of Cuckfield, walked with his four month old baby Alfred strapped to his chest, who managed to drop off to sleep in Deakes Lane only to wake up with triumphant smiles on their return. Jennie Meadows walked to victory in a Hawiian grass skirt complete with hula lei, followed by Jane Swain as the appropriate Easter bunny. Peter Chandler, however, decided to participate in his motorised wheelchair and although a 'malfunction' occurred in Deakes Lane, which required community rescue, he did manage to complete the circuit in just over an hour, which in the circumstances can be considered a respectable time.

Meanwhile 'back at the Rec' the children searched for Easter eggs, played football and enjoyed the freedom of simply running around. For every silver token found hidden in the grass, under bushes and among the greenery, they were rewarded with an Easter egg wrapped in glittering gold, silver, pink or blue foil. So much pleasure from so little; rare moments!

Contrary to expectations, the sun broke through and shone for the presentation of the Walking Race trophies and medals by the Mayor of Cuckfield, Ken Gregory. Gareth Knapman and Jennie Meadows won the Mens and Ladies Challenge Cups awarded for the first to finish in this handicap race. James Mark, having completed the walk in 56:55 won the Swain Cup for the Fastest Man and Sarah Fry, not far behind him, the Bowring Cup for the Fastest Lady. The Frank Woods trophy, known as the Veteran's Cup as the walkers have to be 60 years old, was won by Charles Dunnett. The White Harte managed to 'walk away 'with both team cups, which must stir cup competition from our other local hostelries for next year's race.

This is a unique village event in the Independent State of Cuckfield's calendar. Next month it hosts the Cuckoo Fayre on 2nd May (Bank Holiday Monday) in the Recreation Ground, and as part of the 50 year anniversary celebrations Mayors past and present will gather together in the main arena to join Mayor Ken Gregory in the opening ceremony. Do join us if you can. The Independent State of Cuckfield supports many local charities and organisations which are a part of your community and contribute to our lives and the formulation of future generations of this village society.











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

Cricket fan Harold Salmon scored a memorable century last month, marked by messages from two very special citizens – The Queen and Sir Geoffrey Boycott!

Harold, who originates from Rotherham but now lives in Tower House Close, celebrated his 100th birthday on 12th March, with a party for family and close friends at the South Lodge Hotel.

The arrival of a telegram from the Queen had already made Harold's day but he was completely bowled over to receive a video message from his idol, Yorkshire cricketing legend Sir Geoffrey Boycott.

"My grandson Simon, without me knowing, produced a video depicting my childhood and working life," said Harold. "Knowing that I was a keen cricketer, he had contacted Sir Geffrey Boycott, who was working as a commentator in South Africa and was kind enough to personally wish me a happy 100th Birthday!"

Harold was born on 12th March 1916 in Whiston, a small village near Rotherham in South Yorkshire. "I had a happy childhood roaming the country lanes and fields with my pals, damming the stream which ran past our garden and catching the rainbow trout, by tickling their bellies, which made us a very tasty meal!" he recalled.

"I went to the local village school where we played rugby, not on grass, but on a very hard rocky surface. There were no playing fields - we had to make our own amusements.

"I went to Sunday School and joined the Church choir, singing the Hallelujah chorus in the Sheffield City Hall." Keen sportsman Harold also played in the choir's football and cricket teams.

Harold's father and grandfather were both coal miners. "In those days there was very little choice of work – either mining or farming," he said.

"My father worked down the pit for 35 years and his average wage was £2.50 which, of course, in those days

would be considered quite adequate!

"He walked two and a half miles to work, and when he arrived at the pit head he got on the 'paddy' train which travelled underground, ending near to his home where his journey started. If only he could have drilled through the earth he could have saved a lot of time and energy walking to and from work!"

The miners worked in a 'seam' no higher than three feet, half lying on their backs and chipping away at the coal. "I recall many tales he told me especially when the miners used to sit and have their break from a 'snap' tin and suddenly the rats would appear and join them for lunch.

"His back was black and blue from the flying coal as it was chopped away. When he was on the night shift I would lie awake fearing a knock at the door as there were many fatalities."

Harold vividly remembers the 'slag heaps' of poor quality coal, which could not be sold. "During the miners' strike in 1925 I used to go with my dad to the slag heaps with a bucket and collect pieces of coal sufficient enough for us to have a fire and heat the oven," Harold recalled. "We had to do this undercover as the police constantly patrolled the area."

Harold's father died just two days before the outbreak of the Second World War - September 3rd 1939. "He died from the miner's disease pneumonicosis aged 56, leaving my mother a widow for 29 years," said Harold.

"My mother was a very caring person and lived to be three days short of her 80th birthday and was born and died in the same cottage. Two of her sisters lived in adjoining cottages and never moved during their lifetimes. One of my mother's sisters married my dad's brother!

"Another sister, Gladys, and one of her two brothers Harold, emigrated to Australia in the 1920s when you could go for just £10!

Harold's mother never went out to work. "It was unheard of in those days," said Harold. "I never really appreciated how hard it was for my parents, as there was always a good meal on the table."

Harold left school on his birthday, 12th March, with the words of his mother ringing in his ears: "You are not going down the pit. Try and get a job at the Co-op or Liptons where you will be made for life."

Harold was offered an interview at a local waterworks engineering company which produced water taps and meters, and larger products, including sluice valves for the Thames Barrier. "I was interviewed by the commercial manager who was of French origin and asked just one question – 'When was the Battle of Hastings?'. I promptly replied '1066' and got the job of office boy!

"My salary was 10 shillings a week (50p), which included working Saturdays."

Every day Harold was dispatched to the Post Office on his bike with a satchel full of mail, sometimes as late as 8.30pm. "I was very naïve in those days," said Harold. "All the other staff finished at 6pm, apart from the commercial manager and the head typist who would disappear for about an hour in one of the factory enclosures (maybe for a game of snakes and ladders!).

"I had to wait for the manager to return and sign the letters, and by the time I had sealed and stamped them it was very late and I couldn't attend the evening classes I had hoped to join."

Despite having no formal qualifications, Harold gained steady promotion to the engineering department, then the drawing office, the factory floor as assistant foreman, assistant works manager and works manager.

"During the second World War I was called up and duly passed my entrance exam, carrying out training at Bramall Lane (Sheffield United Football Ground). However, due to the fact that I was already a foreman in the engineering department, my firm's directors applied to the Ministry for a deferment. The letter was typed by my future wife who was the director's secretary."

The deferment was agreed, and Harold was drafted to Barnsley to a factory which had been vacated and changed over to munitions.

"I was entirely in charge, along with a secretary, two male labourers and 400 women! These women had never seen a lathe before but within four weeks were operating the machines as good as any man."

He married Dorothy at Whiston in 1942. "It was during the war when things were still rationed and I remember people saving their butter and sugar rations to help make our wedding cake.

"We went to Blackpool for our honeymoon and it rained every day!" said Harold. "We also had our £50 savings stolen from us by some singers staying in the same lodgings."

After the war Harold returned to the Rotherham factory as works manager of a 500 strong workforce.

The couple lived with Harold's mother before moving to Coulsdon when he was promoted to London sales manager. "I was based in offices near Piccadilly Circus and commuted into London every day for 25 years, first from Coulsdon, then Edenbridge," said Harold, who retired in 1982.

"After $\overline{5}$ 5 years of marriage Dorothy died 18 years ago from a lung disease called bronchiectasis. She had lived for 15 years with her left lung completely removed and only two thirds of her right lung remaining."

Harold moved to Tower House Close 10 years ago to be near his daughter Jean who lives in Haywards Heath with her husband Roger. "After I lost my wife I had few interests but since moving to Cuckfield I have met so many friendly people. Especially another Jean with whom I have spent many happy years and above all joining the U3A, visiting gardens, monthly luncheons and trips abroad. I have found there is new life at the end of the tunnel," said Harold. "Soon after moving to Cuckfield I travelled to Barbados with the U3A!"

Harold has seen many dramatic changes during his lifetime, but two events stand out – the arrival of his first television set and being among the crowds at Wimbledon when Roger Taylor won the men's final. "I remember our relatives coming round to watch the news on our television. We all thought it was marvellous," Harold recalled.

A lifetime Sheffield United fan, Harold now ranks among the oldest supporters. "As far as I know there are two ladies older than me," he says.

Harold enjoys good health and does all his own washing.

He stopped smoking 40 years ago and only drinks alcohol occasionally, preferring a Diet Coke. The secret to living a long life, he says, is getting a good night's sleep. "I go to bed at 10 o'clock every night and get up at 7am – like clockwork," he said.

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
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

Flower Club celebrates 35 years in Cuckfield

There were celebrations at Cuckfield Evening Flower Club last month when members gathered for the club's 35th anniversary.

The Club was launched in 1981 by well known local florist Shirley Martin, along with Anne Lee and several residents. Its first patron was the late Mrs Kleinwort.

Starting in Holy Trinity Church Hall, the club quickly blossomed, moving to the Queen's Hall where meetings are still held.

From the start it has been a very active club, holding internal annual competitions along with a number of inter-club competitions.

In 1984, members held an open demonstration to raise funds for the Intensive Care Unit at Cuckfield Hospital in memory of a founder member and, for several years afterwards, continued to hold flower festivals at Cuckfield Hospital Church until it closed in 1991. Other events have included coffee mornings, lunches and afternoon teas in support of local charities and the Sussex Kidney Trust.

The varied programme is based on demonstrations from talented flower arrangers, supplemented by workshops, slide shows and visits by staff from local plant nurseries willing to share techniques.

Several members have become Area and National demonstrators, and when Sue Flight entered the World Flower Show in Japan in 2005 she brought back a first prize.

Members have also enjoyed visits to RHS Wisley, to the delightful garden of Beth Chatto and to flower



festivals held at the Cathedrals of Westminster, Ely and Salisbury as well as Westminster Abbey and Chichester Cathedral.

"We have always enjoyed the reputation of being a friendly club, a tradition we intend to continue, providing a platform for enabling new members and visitors to experience the wonderful art of flower arranging," said President Anne Lee.

"We are proud of our heritage and welcome new members.

"You don't have to be a flower arranger to join our club," added Chairman Sue Spooner. "Many of our members come just to watch the demonstrations and meet friends. Regular shoppers at the Market visit their favourite stalls for bread, fish, jams, Sussex cheeses, poultry, game and so on. Many of you come to say hello to us on the Cuckfield Local table when dropping off your red, blue and green milk bottle tops. What some of you may not know is that we have packs of wild flower seeds, which are yours for a small donation. Wild flowers and appropriate garden plants, whose blooms support bees, butterflies, moths and all the pollinating insects, are becoming more and more important. As the built environment marches ever onward across our land, we can do our bit for the natural environment. Would you believe that a window box or plant pot in the right place at the right time would be of any consequence? Well it can, so you can join in, too, even if you have no garden of your own. Supporting the insects then supports the birds and bats that feed on them. A wildlife pond, even a small one, provides habitat for this food source too.

Wild flowers do well on quite rough ground, but put plenty of good compost on flower beds to hold water and give a good, friable consistency. I love to see the little pink worms at work in my compost bin, eating away at the green waste to give lovely, sweet smelling compost. Perfect recycling.

One warm, sunny, still day back in March I was looking for signs of growth in my bee bar, a narrow border in front of a brick wall dedicated to flowers for our small winged friends. Enjoying the warmth on my back, I noticed a patch of colour moving from plant to plant. My first butterfly of the year, a small tortoiseshell. A faint buzz? Yes! A honey bee sensing around the wallflowers reflecting the sun's golden beams. To top it all a ladybird was enjoying a sunbath too. Delight stirred my heart and the day unfolded joyfully around me. I have to confess here that, having learned the names of certain butterflies last year for the Great British Butterfly Count, I had forgotten every one! The revision course has begun.

STOP PRESS: Frogspawn on my pond! This is good news because a couple of years ago the frogs died from the prevalent virus killing amphibians.

Mirror, Mirror...

Isn't it amazing that some household items that we take for granted have existed in one form or another for thousands of years? Mirrors are one such example. The first mirrors were probably fortuitous, humble pools of water or streams. The earliest mirrors to be discovered were made of black volcanic glass called obsidian or polished stone, created around 6000 BC and found in Anatolia (modern-day Turkey). Later in history, civilisations such as the ancient Egyptians made mirrors from polished metal such as copper and the very first glass mirrors were made by the Romans in the first century AD*.

These days we have a wealth of mirrors to choose from in terms of style, shape and size which share a multitude of uses and will generate impact and sparkle. Antique, shabby antique where some of the silvering is damaged, vintage, industrial or classic, whatever your style there is a mirror to suit as being simply decorative or fulfilling a function in your home.

Mirrors are often used to make an interior look bigger and lighter by bouncing light and reflections around a space. Large frameless mirrors placed on adjacent walls will magnify a small room, as will mirrors placed in halls and narrow spaces, working particularly well if placed opposite windows. Mirror balls for parties hanging on the ceiling

cast a myriad of reflected light across the space. A pair of mirrors can also add to the symmetry of an interior.

Bring spring into your home if you have a colourful garden by placing a mirror opposite a window to create a 'mirror window', producing a shimmering melting pot of spring flowers and green textures for impact.

Some mirrors come in disguise, such as TVs pretending to be mirrors hanging on the wall, and are particularly clever when at the flick of a switch they reveal their true identity.

Whatever your style, decorative mirrors can work effectively in your home, i.e. used as a focal point, by adding drama to the room or to reflect objects directly in front of the mirror such as lit candles or glass items which add depth and can look sensational. Well-lit mirrors assigned a task, such as to watch yourself brushing your teeth, applying make-up or checking your hairdo, can add to the creativity of the interior. Some bathroom mirrors have magnifying properties (which you may or may not want!). Mirror tiles can look great.

To some people mirrors are steeped in superstition, such as breaking a mirror means seven years bad luck. This myth goes back to Ancient Rome when people seeing their reflections thought that they were looking at their soul and to break a mirror meant it would take that length of time for the living soul to be renewed. The only way to remove the seven years bad luck was to bury the broken pieces*.

All in all, mirrors add sparkle and life to an interior.

Important changes to Bolnore homes property management

After a nearly two year process and meetings with eight different property management companies, including First Port, the newly formed group of volunteers have chosen Pembroke Property Management to assist us in creating a new Residents Management Company (RMC) which will replace First Port and HML Andertons (Lower Village) on our behalf.

A lot of work has gone on behind the scenes but the main benefits of the new RMC will be:

- The voluntary directors of the residents' management company BVRA (Bolnore Village Residents Association) Ltd are residents of Bolnore Village and known in the community.
- Pembroke PM will be accountable to the directors of BVRA Ltd.
- 20% savings on the management fee.
- An estimated 20% saving on insurance.
- BVRA Ltd can choose which contractors to appoint.
 All existing contracts will be renegotiated to source better value for residents.
- Weekly attendance of cleaning/maintenance contractors to the blocks of flats, with no increase in costs. Smarter management of resources.
- Costs related to sales of property are significantly lower. Sales pack for properties are turned around in 5 days.

It is a long process but with the help of as many owners of properties in Bolnore Village as possible the process can be completed by August 2016.

Voting documents for the transfer should be posted to residents before the end of April (First Port can delay this process, but hopefully won't). Residents need to sign the voting form and return in the pre-paid envelope provided – look out for this dropping through your letterbox!

Phases 4 and 5 of Bolnore will continue to be managed by Gordon's (Crest's chosen estate management company for this area) and property owners here will not be able to undertake a similar process until 'five years after the completion of the last dwelling', which effectively is likely to be sometime in 2023 or 2024.
