



International rugby star Lawrence Dallaglio has kick started work on the eagerly awaited 3G multi use sports pitch at Warden Park Academy.

The former England captain and member of the 2003 World Cup winning team, visited the school following an invitation from his friend and former Warden Park student Jon Ball.

Watched by crowd of students and staff, Lawrence cut the first turf to mark the beginning of work to build the £500,000 sports facility.

Much of the deposit to start work on the pitch has been raised by students through sponsored events, and the funds have been boosted with a £60,000 donation from Jon's company Fairfax Properties.

"I am delighted to be able to help my old school provide a world class sports facility for both students and the local community," said Jon. "My nephew and daughter both attend the school, the third generation of my family to do so, so it's nice to know that they will be among those benefitting along with their fellow students."

The pitch, which is due to open in November, is being built by O'Brien Sports in collaboration with Notts Sports.

Steve Hillman, general manager at O'Brien Sports said: "The new pitch will provide students and the local community with the opportunity to participate in frequent sports activities; building confidence, self-esteem, character building, but also give them a platform to realise their sporting goals and ambitions."

For the past 60 years, Warden Park has boasted proud sporting traditions being well represented in the District and County, whilst building a national reputation for sporting excellence.

Warden Park Academy CEO Jonathan Morris said: "The academy rightly has an outstanding reputation for its sports. The new addition to the school facilities will give our PE department the opportunity to further develop the depth and breadth of its offering. "With the current restricted funding for schools it has been important for us to ensure that it places no drain on our resources and we are very grateful to local businesses for their support.

"We look forward to being able to offer it for use to outside organisations and are confident that it will be a useful resource in the community.

"The legacy of this project will bring joy to every student at Warden Park as well as the local community for generations to come."

Jon added: "Fairfax is delighted to support Warden Park and Mid Sussex sport with this donation. As a sign of our ongoing commitment to the local community, once the capital investment of the pitch is recouped, all registered sports clubs in the school's catchment area will benefit from a 25% discount in hiring fees outside of school hours."

You could become a Cuckfield Woodlander

By Stephen Holroyd, Chairman New England Wood Trust If you go down in the woods on a Monday morning, instead of a teddy bears' picnic you'll find New England Wood Trust volunteers working on paths or clearing glades. Don't worry – they are harmless, but may be grumpy on a cold wet winter's day!

The 27 acre New England Wood includes surviving ancient woodland that once covered the whole Sussex Weald. Prior to the Trust purchase, it was on the fringe of a deer park and had been in the same ownership for four centuries. During world war two there were selective fellings and the wood suffered major damage during the 1987 storm. In all, it is a fascinating record of natural history and human intervention.

Back in 1980 the wood, along with adjoining land, was threatened with development. Cuckfield residents raised funds to purchase it and the New England Wood Trust was formed to 'improve, protect and conserve New England Wood for the public benefit and as a broad-leafed woodland'. Since then the Trust has relied on occasional donations and volunteers' efforts to meet those objectives. But conservation work, such as all-weather footpaths, fencing, planting and clearance, requires continuous resources. A community project, Cuckfield Woodlanders, is supporting this work to ensure that the wood continues as a beautiful nature reserve for the people of Cuckfield.

Cuckfield-born Olympic captain

As Britain's elite athletes battle for medals in this year's Olympic Games in Rio, Cuckfield residents have been has an extra special reason to cheer on the Rugby Sevens team.

Team captain Tom Mitchell was born in the village, and grew up in Sussex attending Worth School near Crawley and starting his rugby career at East Grinstead when he was 8 years old. His rugby career flourished while he was studying at Bristol University. Not only did Tom get selected for the England team, he also obtained a BA in English and Philosophy!

Tom went on to study History at Oxford in 2012 while also representing England in the World Series.

He was part of the squad which reached the 2013 RWC Sevens final in Moscow, took third place at the Gold Coast tournament in October 2013 and fourth place in Dubai the following month.

Tom led England for the first time when they won the Plate in the Las Vegas event in January 2014 and he was the tournament's second highest points-scorer with 44 behind Cameron Clark, of Australia.

This is the first time Rugby Sevens has been included as an Olympic sport. The game, which started as preparation of the fifteen-a-side game, is played all over the world with teams competing in 10 major tournaments. The games is fast, quick scoring and easy to follow.

Before leaving for Rio, Tom was confident of success for his team which he said were confident and well prepared with great coaches, with the main threat coming from teams from Fiji, New Zealand and South Africa.

And if you haven't been following the rugby, then the chances are you've still spotted Tom – he is one of the five athletes featured on the Team GB poster, alongside diver Tom Daley.


Visitors explore Cuckfield's dinosaur heritage

For those of you who don't know, Cuckfield
was once the site of some very significant
dinosaur fossil finds. Two hundred years later and
Whitemans Green is still attracting people to see
the place where some of the first fossils to be
recognised as dinosaurs were found.

Last month a group of 96 from the Skeptics Society, based in California, visited Whitemans Green and the Mantell Monument for just this reason. Their visit was one stop on a grand geological and scientific tour of Great Britain that included national museums, the birthplaces and homes of famous scientists and iconic geological landscapes.

The museum had organised to meet the group as a surprise with examples of the local stone and replicas of the finds (the genuine fossils being too precious and fragile to make the journey up the hill). We also had copies of the frontispieces from Gideon Mantell's 1827, 1833 and 1857 publications and a sketch of the quarry made in 1872 (right) so that they could line up the view with the church spire and imagine themselves in a nineteenth century landscape. For those wanting to see the view, the best position is just past the pavilion on the bend of the athletics track.

Thankfully the weather was fine and it was a pleasure to meet such an enthusiastic group.

A charity set up in memory of an eight year old Cuckfield girl who died from a rare form of cancer reaches a milestone this year.

For the past 40 years The Gillian Fabb Memorial Fund has been close to the hearts of Cuckfield residents, as Gilly's mum Val has worked tirelessly to raise funds for research into child cancer and to ensure that some good came from her daughter's tragic death.

With support from her family, friends and generations of Cuckfield residents, Val has raised thousands of pounds to provide vital equipment for children's hospitals. As the charity marks its 40th anniversary, Val shares Gilly's story, and tells how

As the charity marks its 40th anniversary, Val shares Gilly's story, and tells how fund raising helped the family cope with their loss and how she hopes to top the magic £200,000 mark by the end of the year.

Gillian Fabb was born in Cuckfield Hospital in 1968, the first child for proud parents Val and Tony. She grew into a bright, healthy and happy little girl and was delighted when little sister Judy came along in 1971.

But in September 1976, Val noticed a change in her lively little girl. "We felt something wasn't quite right when Gilly went back to Harlands School after the summer holidays," said Val. "She just wasn't herself, but we put it down to being over tired after our camping holiday."

But when Gilly returned home exhausted from a school trip it was clear something was wrong. "Her friends said all she wanted to do was to sit down which was very unlike her," Val recalled.

Bloods tests showed that Gilly had jaundice, possibly hepatitis, and she was admitted to Cuckfield Hospital as a day patient for observation and more tests. "I was teaching full time at Imberhorne School, in East Grinstead so would drop her off in the morning and pick her up on my way home," said Val. "One day I was told the doctor wanted to talk to me and would phone me in the evening. That's when I knew it was serious."

The doctor suspected that there was a problem with Gilly's kidneys and referred her to the Royal Alex

in Brighton for x-rays. Although the x-rays came back clear, Gilly was taken to Great Ormond Street for further investigation.

"I went in the ambulance with her and stayed for two weeks while tests were carried out," said Val. During that time Gilly was sent to University College Hospital where a scan revealed that her liver was greatly enlarged with cancer.

"The doctors said it was extremely rare and that they had never come across a tumour of that nature in a child before." said Val.

Gilly died on 4th November 1976 - just six weeks after being taken ill.

"I never believed she was going to die," said Val. "I couldn't let myself believe it. I would look at her and think: 'she looks better today', and she very often did.

"While Gilly was ill, I asked myself what I could do to help others in similar situations and set myself a target to raise £1,000 for when she got better."

After Gilly died, Val became even more determined to raise funds for research into child cancer.

Gilly's funeral was held at Holy Trinity Church. "The service was taken by family friend Peter Louis, curate at East Grinstead and Father Keating from Staplefield,"



said Val, who had worked at St Paul's School in Haywards Heath before Gilly was born. "I don't remember much about the funeral apart from Peter standing there clutching a bunch of violets."

Keen to start fund raising in Gilly's memory, Val asked friends for donations rather than flowers. "Gilly's godfather, Gordon Steptoe, manager of Barclays Bank in Brighton, set up an account and the Gillian Fabb Memorial Fund was born."

Events were organised and donations started to flood in. One of the first was £200 from Harlands School Christmas Carol Concert.

By June 1977 Val had raised £1,100. "I thought to myself – if we can do this in eight months, let's carry on! "Gordon suggested we become a registered charity which he set up with the help of lawyer friend."

Val soon found herself picking up cheques from fund raising events, from sponsored walks, concerts, dances, swims and slims, to a bar billiards contest and even brass rubbing, as support for the charity grew. "Two of the local masonic lodges adopted us and raised a great deal of money for us," said Val.

At the same time, Val's family was also growing as two more daughters arrived - Philippa, in 1978 and Helen in 1981. "When I'm asked I never say I have three daughters – I always say I have four, but one has died," said Val.

For the Fabb girls, fund raising became a way of life. "There was always something happening," said Val. "I remember Helen taking part in a sponsored walk when she was just a toddler!"

"One of our friends, Terry Bohanna, was an air steward and started a coin collection on inbound flights.

"He would turn up on the doorstep with carrier bags full of coins and we would spend the evening counting them on the kitchen table. My girls learnt how to count pesetas and drachma before they learnt to count sterling!

"Every year we had a big raffle and a Christmas Bazaar, held at my friend Val King's house in Cuckfield for over 15 years and later in the Old School, before moving to my friend Chris Musgraves' house," said Val who has fund raised annually through the Miller catalogues (now Webb Ivory). "One year I was one of their top fund raiser and was invited to a celebration event," she recalled.

In the early days, money was donated to the Institute of Child Health Laboratories, attached to Great Ormond Street Hospital. "We bought a machine which carried out vital tests following biopsies, as the staff had been using one at the Royal Marsden and desperately needed their own," said Val, who worked closely with Dr John Pritchard, Senior Oncology Consultant. "We were in contact with him all the time. It was very important to us



that the money wasn't going into a big pot and that we knew exactly how it was being spent."

However, when a merger of cancer departments resulted in the closure of the research laboratory, the fundraising took a new direction.

"I read an article in the Times about the work of the paediatric department of the Royal Marsden, so I wrote and asked how we could help," said Val who was immediately invited to meet Professor Kathy Pritchard-Jones and Dr Chris Jones. "They explained that what they did was very similar to the Institute of Child Health," she said. "It seemed right that we should support them."

The fundraising continued and, in 2006, Edward King, Chairman of Mid Sussex District Council chose the Gillian Fabb Memorial Fund as his charity for the year. "He had lost a son to cancer so the charity meant a lot to him," said Val. During the year Edward raised £9,000 with events including a civic dinner and a golf tournament

Over the years the charity has received thousands of pounds from the Independent State of Cuckfield, following the Mayor's election campaigns and Val has rarely missed taking part in the procession. She has also been a regular stallholder at the Cuckoo Fair and earlier this year could be found selling cakes made by family and friends, and bird boxes made by local Duke of Edinburgh student Joshua Walker. And, of course, there's always a Gillian Fabb Christmas tree in the annual Church festival.

As they grew older, Gilly sister's embarked on their own fund raising challenges. Philippa, who is now a Consultant Anaesthetist, completed the Three Peaks Challenge with thee university friends, scaling Ben Nevis, Scafell peak and Mount Snowdon and raising £2,600. Earlier this year, Helen's father in law Steve Harrington ran the Brighton Marathon, and his employer HSBC bank doubled some of his sponsor money. In September Helen's husband Rob Harrington will undertake the South Downs Bike Ride.

As her daughters grew up, Val went back to studying, taking an Open University Degree in Natural Sciences with Biology in 1999 gaining a 2:1. She also joined the Sussex Chorus (formerly Ditching Choral Society) and was a member for 23 years.

Val now splits her time between homes in Cuckfield and Dorset, with her partner Keith - after romance blossomed following a 55 year friendship! "We've known each other forever, and Keith is Judy's godfather," said Val.

As she approaches the anniversary of Gilly's death, Val has one wish - to raise the £3,283.09 needed to reach £200,000 mark. "It would be fantastic is we could achieve this in Gilly's 40th anniversary year," she said.

Taking time to think

VILLAGE GREEN

'Summer Time and the livin' is easy. Fish are jumpin' and the cotton is high'. So goes the song from Cole Porter's musical Porgy and Bess. A picture caught in a moment in time.

Summer holidays past are held in memory, some golden and joyous and some rain-filled yet unforgettable.

I had a happy holiday afternoon at the Railway Land Wildlife Trust Festival in early July. One of the rangers had cut a labyrinth in the grasses and wild flowers creating a magical place. A friend and I were there to tell people about labyrinths and suggesting how one might be walked. The theme of the Festival was 'Places to Think With'. Of course, me being me, I immediately thought Places to Think IN but no, a place to get you thinking, which a labyrinth could well do.

There was also a walk with a lovely man who knew more than a thing or two about trees. 'Why do some of the trees have a blue or red ribbon tied round them today?' was a question. The blue ribbons indicated trees that will be gone in 30 years time if Climate Change proceeds at the current rate. The red ribbons were on trees that are likely to be seen no more in our area in

within 50 years. That certainly got me thinking.

I heard rangers and wildlife specialists responding to people reporting that they were seeing fewer specific butterflies, insects and birds recently, swifts and house martins being mentioned. It seems that people living further north are observing more of these same species. Could it be that Climate Change is showing signs of a migration that is quite different from the human migrations we are hearing about. Habitat loss is also happening on a greater and greater scale as we know.

I sat in my garden as a Place to Think With. Is it my joy and delight, my sanctuary, my burden? Why did starlings eat ravenously at the bird feeder for several weeks earlier in the year only to disappear not to be seen of heard since? I could go on. Still thinking.

The Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) has launched Greening Grey Britain. You can find out more at its site: www.rhs.org.uk. Basically you can promise to turn a grey area green by planting a tree, shrub, flower bed, climber or a window box perhaps in your garden or in a grey, unloved space near where you live.

There is also a photographic competition on Greening Grey Britain until February 2017 so come on all you Cuckfield amateur photographers. We know just how good you are from the photos entered for our Be Friendly to Pollinators calendar a couple of years or so ago.

Turner houses

DESIGN AT HOME

Having been recently asked for interior design ideas for two Turner houses I was curious to find out more about them and how an original Turner interior could have looked compared to one of today.

Working as an architect in Haywards Heath, Harold Turner designed houses in the 1930s, 40s and 50s which remain popular with families across mid Sussex today. The most popular styles of architecture in the 30s was Art Deco and Mock Tudor. Turner designed Mock Tudor homes, like sparkling jewels across the landscape with their Arts and Crafts detailing, exposed timbers, leaded light windows and his signature curly gutter brackets, they appeal to many.

In contrast to the geometry and black and white décor of an Art Deco home, how would these iconic mock Tudor homes be furnished and decorated in the 30s? Turners original interiors boasted a wealth of oak beams, oak panelling and oak flooring sometimes parquet flooring and perhaps a stunning oak staircase,. Window cills were tiled in terracotta beneath leaded light windows in diamond or square shapes which were supported by metal Crittall window frames.

In contrast to the corner sofa of today, a 30s living room would have the newly invented three piece suite. each armchair and sofa upholstered in the same fabric such as moquette, a fluffy woollen velvet. There could have been a brown leather armchair in front of the fireplace, the brick fireplace being a dominant feature of a Turner home and the focal point of the space, the leather armchair sitting on top of an unfitted patterned carpet. Today we might have a log burner in the fireplace, expose the oak floor and add a rug or even fitted carpet. Lighting came in the form of tall wooden standard lamps stretching up between the sofa and armchair supporting a large fringed lamp shade. Pendant lamp shades were made of opaque, frosted, coloured or moulded glass. Pictures would hang on hooks hung from the picture rail, the painted picture rail a feature in it's own right, walls that were not papered were painted in pale tones or beige.

Compared to the open plan living of today where the kitchen is the heart of the home kitchens in this period had a more cosy feel about them but were working areas and not social spaces. They became more fitted with painted wooden cabinets and plain metal handles, a stand alone painted wooden dresser on legs with exposed hinges, cupboards and the top cupboard with a glass window either in ridged or stained glass. Compared to today's fantastic choice of flooring the 1930 kitchen floor would have had lino.

Homes reflect the lifestyle of their inhabitants, availability and choice of furnishings.

It's interesting to reflect just how much life has changed since the birth of suburbia in the 1930s to the high demand for new homes now.



Fun in the sun this summer


With the long summer holidays in full swing, parents will be delighted to know that a variety of magical entertainment for both children and adults is on hand at Borde Hill Garden.
