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



It was announced on Sunday 23rd November that the Rev Michael Maine, currently curate at St Mary the Virgin, Willingdon, Sussex, is to be the next vicar of Holy Trinity, Cuckfield.

Michael is a Cornishman by birth and as a child was a choral scholar at Truro Cathedral, where he also studied the organ. After a long career as both Organist and Director of Music at Hove Parish Church and Director of Music and Head of Lower School at St Christopher's School, Hove, Michael felt in 2008 that God was calling him to ordained ministry and he subsequently studied at the College of the Resurrection, Mirfield and the University of Leeds.

Ordained in 2011 at Chichester Cathedral, Michael has served his curacy at St Mary the Virgin, Willingdon, where he led the ministry team during the year long vacancy following the departure of the Incumbent. Unmarried, Michael has the company of his dog Archie on his walks on the Downs.

It is expected that Michael will be inducted on Thursday 26th February 2015.

Mid Sussex District Council has approved plans to develop the Play Meadow.

It struck me that the sale of this informal playing field for development was politically driven by MSDC over the last 18 months or so, with real disregard for local feelings, as expressed in the Cuckfield Neighbourhood Plan, and local efforts, exemplified in the community's bid to purchase it.

The good planning reasons why The Play Meadow should not be built upon have been repeatedly expressed at the many Council meetings leading to this last one and were put forward again on Thursday night by those who challenged the proposal. These arguments have fallen on deaf ears.

I am now actively considering with my solicitors whether there are grounds for a judicial review.

The controversial sale of The Ship and opening of the new Co-op store has been the talking point of the village for the last few months. And while many villagers have been lamenting the loss of the pub, their biggest concern has been the future of the much loved Wealden Stores.

But rest assured – store owners Dawn Hall and Janine Watts have no intention of shutting up shop. On the contrary the pair are fighting back with exciting new products and plans for the future, spurred on by the support and good wishes of the village community.

Dawn and Janine came to Cuckfield from Colchester in September 2000, buying the Wealden Stores and moving into the adjoining house with their five young children.

"We shared a dream of moving to a village and running two 'lifestyle' businesses," said Dawn. "We began looking in Sussex and when we came to Cuckfield we fell in love with the location. The Wealden Stores had everything we were looking for – two businesses (the post office and shop) and huge accommodation with seven bedrooms – plenty of space for our two growing families."

Despite having no experience in running a shop, the pair took the plunge. "It was a very steep learning curve and we relied on the existing staff to show us the ropes," said Janine.

Initially Dawn and Janine kept the shop as it was, focusing on getting up to speed with running the business. Then it was time for a few cosmetic changes. "The shop was a little run down and tired, sort of shabby without the chic!" said Dawn. "We spruced it up and then began to change and increase the stock."

Then there were the early starts to get used to! Dawn and Janine's day starts at 5.30am when the daily papers are delivered and sorted. The doors open at 7am, to

catch the early morning trade, closing at 5.30pm. The store is open every day, including Sunday from 8am to 12 noon. "What we originally thought was a lifestyle business actually took over our lives but it's been worth it!" said Dawn.

Over the years the pair have changed direction in the store, focusing on locally sourced, fair trade and organic produce and seeking out high quality suppliers. Meat is from Clive Miller butchers in Hurstpierpoint, bread from Fellows in Ardingly, home-made curries from Chuala in Lewes, High Weald Dairy cheeses, fruit and veg from Paul's in Lindfield and there's a range of products from Infinity Foods.

"We just use our judgement and pick out things we like," said Janine. "We are happy to source and order products for customers and are always open to ideas from new suppliers."

Best sellers includes cakes, pastries and pies. "We get a lot of lunchtime trade, particularly 'builder breaks' from local tradespeople, including the builders working on the Ship!"

The latest supplier to the Wealden Stores is 'Cook' – producers of home-made frozen meals, already a firm favourite with Haywards Heath shoppers. Dawn and Janine are about to take delivery of two new freezers packed with a range of meals. "It's really exciting for us

and we think our customers will love it!" said Janine.

There are also plans to spruce up the store with new shelving. "We intend to carry on with what we're doing but be more aware of what's going well and what isn't."

When the pair first heard of the plans to convert The Ship into a convenience store, their first thoughts were not the threat to their business but the loss of their local! "We feel it's been stolen from us and we'd like it back," said Janine. "It was great living next door to a pub and we enjoyed being part of the weekly quiz nights, book club and mah-jong evenings.

"We shared a dream of moving to a village and running two 'lifestyle' businesses ... when we came to Cuckfield we fell in love with the location. The Wealden Stores had everything we were looking for ..."

"When people started asking if we were closing we were really surprised as it hadn't crossed our minds!

"It's amazing that a little shop can generate such strength of feeling and huge support."

But Cuckfield residents have a tradition of supporting the Wealden Stores long before Dawn and Janine took over – at one stage digging into their wallets to buy shop bonds to get the store back on its feet after financial difficulties. And when Dawn and Janine were victims of a robbery in the store in 2003, villagers rallied round. "There were bunches of flowers and offers of help arriving daily – people were really shocked, as if it had happened to them," said Janine.

Knowing that residents are behind them has given Dawn and Janine the confidence to plan for the future.

"Once we knew that the Co-op was definitely going to open it was a turning point - we knew exactly where we stood and could plan ahead and just get on with it," said Dawn.

"The support has been overwhelming and we've been very touched and very humbled by all the good wishes from all our customers."

The support has included an Action Group set up by a team of loyal customers, whose campaign had included compiling and distributing promotional leaflets to advertise the store, and drum up new business. "They've been really fantastic," said Janine. "We've has so much support that we're actually feeling quite positive about the future now and feel we can co-exist alongside the Co-op quite happily.

"We've still got the post office, pay point and lottery, which will always draw people in.

"Wealden Stores is not a convenience store but a good old-fashioned village shop and that's how we want it to stay!" added Dawn. "And at the end of the day people will vote with their feet!"

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By James Gaydon I'd like to introduce you to Christian Stevenson aka DJ BBQ.

Christian has been a local resident in Cuckfield for 11 years. He was raised in Maryland, America and spent some time in Colorado before moving to the UK. Christian and his wife Naya were looking for a warm friendly community with green surroundings and once they visited Cuckfield they knew they had found the place to plant their roots and make a home for themselves and future Stevensons (there are now three more!).

Sitting in The Talbot with Christian it is clear to see his appeal. With bucket loads of charisma, Christian makes everyone feel like an old friend and a part of what is going on. It is this Stevenson American charm that has made him an obvious 'face' to lead the Save The Ship campaign which has hit the local and national news. Christian, Jo Roche and the whole Cuckfield community have been doing all they can to preserve the local amenities and highlight the PR errors made by the Co-op in this latest acquisition. The campaigners did their best, battling to keep the village and its services accessible to all and keep the Co-op where it is. Christian said: "We feel totally cheated; we were lied to. Clearly the Co-op doesn't care about our community." Indeed the talk of the pub while I sat with him revolved around this ongoing situation. Everyone I spoke to seems concerned for the future of Cuckfield's High Street but they are trying to remain positive.

Christian has always been quite focused on the

Cuckfield community and is keen to get stuck in. You might have heard of Christian some years ago when he pushed through the project to build a skatepark (The Bowl) at Whitemans Green. Some local mums had recognised the need for kids to have somewhere to skate and made an appeal in the Parish news requesting further expertise. Christian – a skater/BMX rider and surfer since childhood - had just finished a BAFTA award-winning series called Rad for Channel 5 at the time. Some might say a perfect match! He was happy to step in and pull some strings to make it happen. After some design work, negiotation and some friendly arm-twisting, Christian presented the skatepark that still (seven years later) gets used by 5-50 year olds. I suggested that, in my experience, of skateparks there can sometimes be young troublemakers making the place intimidating. Christian joked saving that problem has never been an issue as the troublemakers don't like to stray far from fried chicken so tend to stay in Haywards Heath! The facility still looks good as new, despite being used by local skaters both large and small. Apparently the park is occasionally visited by dads who refuse to think they have 'lost it' desperately trying to teach their unimpressed seven year old son how an 'Ollie' should be done on an antique skateboard... so I am

Annoyingly, Christian (unlike me) can still grind, catch air and fakie with the best of them.

So who is this DJ BBQ character? This name sums up Christian's persona perfectly. Christian worked as a music video director for several famous acts, such



as Jamiroquai and Reef, and he met Naya on the set of an Oasis music video. Sony spotted his talent and signed him to direct and produce further music videos. Afterwards, Christian committed to doing a two year stint at Kerrang radio, where he became a popular DJ, and won two Sony awards including the prestigious 'Best Radio Station'. Missing his family, he quit while on top and worked around the country DJ-ing at festivals and all the while using any opportunity to showcase his other passion – food, or more specifically: BBQ food.


It wasn't long before this charismatic character came to the attention of Jamie Oliver and DJ BBQ was born. Jamie was impressed by Christian's ability to enthuse people about the food he made and the style in which he presented his food and himself! Christian is a big fan of 'spandex' (or, as we say, Lycra) and certainly makes an impression! Jamie soon had Christian in the studio filming a pilot show and when the camera stopped rolling Jules Oliver requested a lesson in how to mix a record. A fair exchange Christian thought. Jamie then started Food Tube, an emerging digital food channel, and he called upon Christian to be part of the Food Tube family which now boasts a cool million (plus) subscribers. Food Tube has quickly become the largest digital channel in Europe and the third largest in the World.

Christian humbly acknowledges the part that Jamie has had in promoting his cooking, and classes Jamie as a friend who has helped and inspired him in equal measure. With Jamie's backing, Christian has released his first book which went straight to number one on Amazon knocking Jamie's book off the top spot. Apparently Jamie took it well, partly I think because Jamie's other book was sitting comfortably at number three.

Christian still works alongside major names in the catering and entertainment industry, and unsurprisingly Christian describes his industry as Catertainment. A fair enough description I guess.

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A Cuckfield man who led a £135 million project to extend the British Museum, and create state of the art research facilities, has been rewarded with an MBE.

Tony Wilson, of Ledgers Meadow, travelled to Buckingham Palace last month to receive his award from Her Majesty the Queen, accompanied by his wife Mandy and sons Eoin, 16 and Ben, 13.

"It was quite surreal," said Tony. "I have spent so much of my working life driving past the Palace without ever thinking I'd have the opportunity to go inside, and there we were, walking in through the front gates, with tourists taking photos of us wondering who we were!

"It was a great experience and one we will all remember for a very long time."

Tony recalled how the honour came as a complete surprise. "I remember sitting on the edge of the bed staring at the letter and wondering who was having a joke at my expense!

"I never thought anything like this would come my way."

The ceremony took place on 11th November - Remembrance Day. "We travelled to London the day before and went to see the poppies at the Tower of London, which certainly added significance to the day," said Tony.

Recipients don't find out until the morning of the ceremony which member of the Royal family will present the honours, so Tony was delighted to hear that he would be meeting the Queen.

"We had a brief chat and I spoke about my work with the British Museum over the past 7 years," said Tony, who also enjoyed chatting to other honours recipients and their families, who included Stephen Sutton's mother. "She's a really lovely person and it was great to meet her. The ceremony must have been a bitter-sweet moment for her, as she received the award on behalf of her late son who had inspired the nation by raising so much money for charity in spite of his terminal illness.

Tony was nominated for the honour by the director and deputy director of the British Museum for his role as Project Director for the development of the £135 million World Conservation and Exhibition Centre.

Work started on the project early in 2008, and the building opened earlier this year. The work involved creating a new temporary exhibition space, complete with state of the art workshops and laboratories for the research team which includes 25 scientists.

The building also includes the largest lorry lift of its type – big enough to carry a 45 tonne articulated lorry (the biggest on the roads today). "It's the equivalent of a 580 person lift," said Tony. "The installation of the lift means the museum can now move the largest of the objects in the collection with relative ease, which minimises the risk of damage in the process."

The new six storey building was slotted into a gap between two wings in the museum's north-west corner. "The biggest challenge was not to disrupt the day to day running of the museum, or damage any of the priceless objects in the surrounding buildings," said Tony. "As most of the building is underground, and we had to dig down four floors, it was quite an achievement. I think the award was mainly for not breaking anything!"

Tony feels the MBE really belongs to the team he led.

"I was extremely surprised to be singled out in this way, as the award is really a reflection of what we achieved as a team," he said. "Every member of the team deserves recognition. But it's nice to think that my sons can now get married at St Paul's Cathedra!!"

Tony has now moved onto his next, equally prestigious project – the redevelopment of facilities at the Royal Opera House in Covent Garden.

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Clive Rees: generosity in life and death

In 2010 Clive Rees won the Cuckfield Village Hero Award for his generosity, care and concern, his heroic behaviour towards his friends and neighbours in the High Street and beyond. In 2014 he was, posthumously, awarded the Order of St John United Kingdom Award for Organ Donation, presented by Jonathan Lucus High Sheriff of West Sussex to his widow Annie Rees on 29th October during a ceremony at St John's Ambulance Headquarters in Brighton. Two significant honours presented in life and death to a man with a wealth of rich human qualities which managed to affect us all.

December is a special month when we celebrate a Christian festival in a variety of ways. Irrespective of our religious beliefs we still manage to indulge – eat, drink, spend, party too much – work, sleep, exercise, earn too little. Most of the time we love it but can be heard to moan about commercialism, materialism, children's outrageous expectations... We were lucky if we got an orange, a handful of nuts and a jigsaw puzzle... we reminisce, but, in spite of this, giving and receiving remain an integral part of our Yuletides. So the truly wonderful example of Clive Rees's decision in life to donate his organs in death provides an appropriate opportunity to reflect and consider at this time of the year.

When Clive tragically and suddenly died in April last year he was put on a life support machine for twenty four hours. Not, sadly, because his life would be restored but in order to keep his organs in working order before they were removed to continue to work for others. A precious time for his widow and family who had time to be with him and say their goodbyes. In medical situations such as Clive's you are only put on life support if you are a donor.

Since this tragedy the benefits to others have slowly been revealed.

A 22 year old man has Clive's liver and can now look forward to a normal healthy life.

A 56 year old woman has no signs of rejection from his kidneys, which are functioning extremely well for her. Anonymously she says: "I can now travel to go and see my grandchildren who I've never met before, as I was unable to travel due to my dialysis commitment four times a day for the past five years ... Saying thank you



just doesn't seem like enough when what somebody does is basically save your life" (One extremely grateful woman. Letter to the Donor Family. 23/8/13)

Clive would have thought 'thank you' was quite enough! His attitude to organ transplantation was unusual as it is not part of our cultural thinking or practice. However, three people die every day waiting for organs that we all have to give in death whatever age or gender we might be.

So at this wonderful, magical, tinselled time of the year, when we give and receive with gratitude and love, perhaps you could give a thought to the supreme act of generosity that Clive Rees showed in life and death, and hopefully embark on 2015 with the resolution that you will sign up for organ donation and really embrace the true meaning of the Christmas spirit in the knowledge that through organ transplantation people can be reborn, their lives transformed and Christmas welcomed and enjoyed.

Not unlike Mr Scrooge 172 years ago this month in A Christmas Carol, we could even take a leaf out of the reformed Scrooge's book. He was better than his word, like Clive Rees, he did it all, and infinitely more.

Concluding this great festive novel Charles Dickens celebrates Scrooge's rebirth, his new generous life:

'and it was always said of him that he knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man possessed the knowledge. May that be truly said of us, and all of us. And so, as Tiny Tim observed, God bless us, Everyone.'

Cuckfield's new Parish Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer (RFO)

In October we unfortunately had to say 'goodbye' to Nicky Sage, who decided to step down as Parish Clerk & RFO to pursue new opportunities. Following a recruitment campaign, the Parish Council is pleased to welcome the appointment of Annette Jones as our new Clerk. Many of you will already know Annette as, although now based in East Sussex, she lived in Cuckfield for nearly 24 years. We are confident that her business background as a Company Secretary will give her a valuable insight into the complexities of the Parish Clerk's role. You need only to look elsewhere in this report at the accounts of the Council's recent activities to see how wide-ranging the Clerk's responsibilities are, from legal, financial and staff management to day to day administration.

Free Senior Railcards

If you are eligible for a free bus pass but do not require one, you may choose instead to have a free Senior Railcard. Statement from Co-op

On 26 November 2014 the Parish Council received the following news from The Co-operative Food who has responded to residents, businesses and Parish Council requests, deciding the existing store in the High Street will remain open, at least for a while. You will note The Co-operative Food will 'revisit the decision in the months ahead' and so it is now up to Cuckfield and surrounding areas to continue to generate demand so that, hopefully, the High Street store can exist in unison with the new store at Whitemans Green.

The Co-Operative to serve Cuckfield and Whitemans Green

The Co-operative Food has announced that it is to continue to serve the residents of Cuckfield and Whitemans Green by keeping its High Street store open alongside its new store on the site of the former Ship public house.

Samantha Moore, Regional Acquisitions Manager for The Co-operative Food, said: "Over recent weeks we have been contacted by a number of residents and businesses regarding our plans for Cuckfield, and we have also been in liaison with the Parish Council. In addition, representatives of The Co-operative Food were in the village recently to reassess the feasibility of keeping the two stores open.

"We have concluded that keeping both branches open is the best course of action for the village at this time. We will monitor progress carefully and revisit this decision in the months ahead.

"As a community retailer we are committed to supporting the communities in which we operate, and we hope that this illustrates that we are listening to feedback from residents.

"In addition to our existing store, our new store on Whitemans Green – which is due to open on 4 December - will include a bakery, an excellent fresh food department including meat, fruit and vegetables, and a community information area. This will greatly improve the shopping experience for the people of the village."



Street Lighting

All street lighting and illuminated road signs within Cuckfield are currently being replaced as part of a government funded project to ensure all lighting columns conform to current safety and energy efficiency standards.

The Parish Council saw an opportunity to maintain the heritage of the village and bring uniformity back to some of the light fittings previously replaced on a piecemeal basis. As a result, we are funding some of the columns so that all Conservation Areas will have heritage style columns and the main through routes (London Road, London Lane, Ardingly Road, and South Street south of the Conservation Area) will have a combination of heritage columns and 'swan neck' brackets. All side roads will have standard columns.

Currently new columns are being installed with the standard type due to a shortage of Heritage fittings. Where appropriate, they will be refitted with the Heritage embellishments at a later date.

Please note that West Sussex County Council policy is that all residential lighting will now switch off at the midpoint of night, approximately midnight, and remain off for five and a half hours, switching on again at around 5.30am if still dark. The main through routes will be on all night but will 'dim' after midnight to 60% of normal level.

Ardingly Road Zebra Crossings

The two crossing points in Ardingly Road, one near to Bylanes Close and the other at Longacre Crescent, are being replaced by zebra crossings. The scheme has gone through a lengthy process from design stage through to approval from WSCC. Unfortunately, there have been a number of setbacks along the way that the Parish Council have had to deal with, the latest being an objection to the scheme during the public consultation period. The issue raised has now been resolved and on 26th November we received the final Highways sign off. This now means the scheme can go ahead and a date to book the highway space is being sought.

Youth Centre – London Lane

As reported previously, the Parish Council successfully registered the Youth Centre as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) and was successful in its bid to purchase the land and building for £200,000 to protect it for the community. The Centre hosts the Cuckfield Pre-School Playgroup and provides space for young people with learning difficulties and other youth groups for the Parish and wider District. With the loan in place, we are now in final contract negotiations with WSCC and working hard to proceed to completion in the coming weeks. Costs of maintaining the current building are likely to be high and, in the short term, the Parish will run the building in its current condition. However, the plan is to look at providing a new building, which will require significant funds, and we anticipate seeking a mix of grants and fundraising for such a major community project.

The Youth Centre will be available for hire, and facilities include sports hall, social room, small outside area and kitchen. Please contact the Parish Clerk for further details.

Planning

After all the hard work and tremendous effort which went in to getting a Neighbourhood Plan in place for Cuckfield, it was formally 'made' by the Secretary of State on 1 October 2014. We have seen how it is having an impact on the shape of the village with decisions on a number of prospective developments made where Plan policies have been a critical factor in the outcome. These include a proposal for 20 new houses on the open field along Broad Street and two garden 'infill' properties in Bylanes and Ardingly Road which have been refused by Mid Sussex District Council (MSDC). However, work does not stop there and our attention now turns to monitoring the Plan, including evaluating progress towards delivering its spatial vision and assessing the extent to which policies are implemented. Monitoring Indicators and Targets, which can be anything from the number of trees, hedges and ponds affected by development to the number and location of properties built, will enable some measurement of its implementation.

The Ship Inn

The community was shocked and disappointed to learn of the proposal to convert the Public House to a convenience store in September. Residents and the Parish Council fought to protect the public house in Whitemans Green Conservation Area and the potential harm to other local businesses. Due to the relaxation in 'Change of Use' under Permitted Development rights and despite significant pressure from the Parish Council, our District Councillor and tremendous efforts of 'Save the Ship' campaigners to get MSDC to apply an Article 4 Direction (acting to remove permitted development rights), planning permission was granted for associated works in the conversion.

The Parish Council are seeking Article 4 Directions on our remaining public houses to remove permitted development rights in the first instance, meaning planning applications would need to be made for change of use, and will be submitting these requests to MSDC for a decision

Mantell Park - Bylanes Close

The last properties are nearing completion and the Council and residents have been working with the main contractor Taylor Wimpey to minimise the disruption during the construction phase. Issues remain with the original access scheme and surface water drainage scheme at the rear of the development and Taylor Wimpey have agreed to revisit the proposal for a raised table at the entrance to reduce traffic speed and improve safety for pedestrians using the Twitten. A final (Stage 3) Safety Audit will be undertaken by WSCC. The surface water scheme continues to suffer bank slippage which we are very concerned about and continue to put pressure on MSDC and Taylor Wimpey for this to be addressed.

Courtmead Road, Play Meadow

We were very disappointed to see that, despite very strong arguments by the Parish Council and our community, MSDC's Planning Committee will grant permission (subject to, at the time of writing, any new evidence coming forward) for one house on the land at the end of Courtmead Road.

Permission is being based on the District's lack of a five year housing land supply and limited harm the proposal would have, together with the point that outline permission had been achieved.

Environment

Worsley Memorial Recreation Ground

Iguanodon update – the sculpture destined for the children's play area is now in clay form ready for casting. Some of our Councillors went along to see progress recently and were very pleased with the results. A progress meeting is being held in December by MSDC, where we hope to have a date for completion for the new playground equipment.

Winter Advice

The Parish Council would like to ask residents to look after their neighbours and to check on any frail or vulnerable neighbours to make sure they are keeping warm and have all the essentials. We would also ask that, if safe to do so, residents clear the snow from the pavements in front of their homes. Government advice is as follows:-

'Clear snow from a road, path or cycleway - You can clear snow and ice from pavements yourself. It's unlikely that you'll be sued or held responsible if someone is injured on a path or pavement if you've cleared it carefully.'

How to clear snow and ice - when you clear snow and ice:

- do it early in the day it's easier to move fresh, loose snow
- don't use water it might refreeze and turn to black ice
- use salt if possible it will melt the ice or snow and stop it from refreezing overnight (but don't use the salt from salting bins as this is used to keep roads clear)
- you can use ash and sand if you don't have enough salt - it will provide grip underfoot
- pay extra attention when clearing steps and steep pathways - using more salt may help

Calling all last year's Winter Volunteers and any new ones!

Thank you to last year's volunteers who were at the ready to help clear snow and ice from the pavements and we hope you will continue to be a volunteer this year with kits at the ready! If anyone else is interested in joining the scheme, please contact the Parish Office for further information.

Do you own a 4x4 vehicle and are you prepared to help if needed, perhaps taking an elderly person to hospital? Please contact the Parish Office with your telephone number so we can build up a list of people to contact in an emergency.

The Holly and the lvy

DESIGN AT HOME

It's that time of year again! Christmas is on the way and the decorations are being unpacked and displayed. Glittery, sparkly lights, festoons of paper chains, magnificent lanterns, baubles in all shapes and sizes, musical snowmen, stylish garlands and elegant candles. Some decorations home-made by you or the kids, some collected over the years waiting to dress the Christmas tree, others bought only yesterday, then there is the holly and ivy you have just collected in order to make a wreath to hang on the front door.

Traditionally holly is associated with Christmas and its use has an interesting history. In Northern Europe it has been used in festivals for hundreds of years celebrating many beliefs; it is an important plant to Pagans with their close association to nature and Druids used it in their ceremonial headgear believing it to have magical powers as the Sun's favoured plant. In Norse mythology, beliefs associated with Thor, the god of thunder, said that the prickly green leaves prevented thunder, while in Roman mythology holly was given to the god Saturn during Saturnalia, a festival celebrating the Winter solstice. It then became important to Christians, symbolising the crown of thorns that Christ wore on the cross and the red berries the blood produced from the

thorns. Hanging holly on doors was believed to ward off evil spirits during holy days.

Ivy has been used as decoration in winter for thousands of years, the leaves symbolising eternal life and regeneration in Spring. Pagans believed it to have magical powers as the leaves stay green during winter, while the Ancient Romans used ivy to make garlands for Bacchus, the god of wine and fertility. Eventually ivy was also incorporated into Christian festivals, the heart shaped leaf symbolising eternal love.

Mistletoe is also an important greenery to have at Christmas. It has long been believed by many cultures to have the special powers of fertility. According to many, kissing under the mistletoe ensured fertility with the removal of one of the berries after each kiss. So after many kisses and the picking of all the berries, the magical powers in that particular sprig would be gone!

Making a wreath might not be on your to-do list but, if it is, there are many demonstrations on YouTube on how to make them. Briefly: attach moss to a wire frame or bent wire coat hanger, wrap wire around the moss attaching it firmly to the frame. Back the wreath with plastic to protect the area you are hanging it against, using wreath plastic or plastic from a bin liner, and attach pieces of greenery using wire pins. The wire frame and pins should be available from a florist or craft shop.

This is the 72nd panto for The Weald Theatre Group and we have raised thousands of pounds for local charities in this time. Our cast is made up of children and adults from the local area, including Haywards Heath, Burgess Hill, Cuckfield and Lindfield.

From Cuckfield we have Peter Bowman playing the evil Sheriff of Nottingham and Paul Ruse a lovable Will Scarlet. Our lovely leading ladies are Beth Bryant as Robin Hood and Sarah Milton as Maid Marion. Together they have performed in over 30 pantos over the years.

The show is written and directed by Lance Milton, who has been involved with the group for the last decade both on and off the stage. This year Lance and Sarah's eldest daughter Emily has her chance to tread the boards as one of the children in the chorus. More than 50 children turned up at auditions and they are split into two teams, taking it in turns to perform on alternate nights. The kids really love rehearsals and performing but are also mindful that they are raising funds for children less fortunate than themselves whilst having a great time. 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Persistent rain put the dampers on this year's Cuckfield Bonfire, and despite more than 2,000 people braving the atrocious weather to enjoy the spectacular firework display, the event still looks set to make a loss.

Normally the event, held in Cuckfield Park, attracts around 7,000 people and raises thousands of pounds for charity but this year's event has left the committee contemplating the future.

Jem Lee, chairman of the society, explained: "On a normal year we would expect to take in excess of £15,000 profit, £20,000 if you include the groups selling food, but sadly this year we were beaten by atrocious weather.

"The skies opened at the worst possible time, 1.5 hrs before the fireworks were due to go up. People obviously saw the torrential, unending rain from 5:30pm and chose not to attend."

He added that the event needs to attract around 3,000 people through the gates to break even. "It's always a risk but for the last 10 years we have always beaten the weather, albeit by a narrow margin."

He estimated that the event looks set to have made a loss of around £3.000.

"We have no financial backers, so money has to be found in order to stage another Cuckfield bonfire," said Jem. "We now aim to take a fresh look at the whole event early in the new year and decide if it is viable to continue. Costs are spiralling, no-one wants to pay any more at the gate and we as a committee are personally responsible for the safety and any financial losses.

"On a brighter note, it was a fantastic choreographed

display and seems to get better every year."

The first Cuckfield Bonfire was lit 28 years ago with the aim of raising funds for the old village school. Sue and Bryan Mayou, owners of Cuckfield Park have continued to offer the use of their grounds ever since. Several years later, Richard Totman joined the bonfire team providing professional pyrotechnics set to music, and this theme continues today. "We are different from many local displays as it is all timed to high quality music," said Jem.

Today the bonfire tradition is continued by the Cuckfield Bonfire Society, a committee of 23 members whose sole aim is to organise the event. Members are mostly past and present parents of children at Holy Trinity School.

The cost of staging the event is high but charging for entry means money is raised for local charities. Profits taken from the gate go to Holy Trinity School, Woodlands Mead (formerly Court Meadow Special Needs School and Newick House Special Needs School in Burgess Hill), Kangaroos (who provide care and support for special needs children in Mid Sussex) and other local charities such as Cuckfield pre-school playgroup, Cuckfield Museum and Cuckfield Archers.

Profits from food and merchandise stalls benefit local groups and raise much needed income. This year the groups included the 1st Cuckfield Scouts, Cubs & Beavers, Friends of Warden Park School and Holy Trinity School PTA.
