#### Nursery sets record straight

The owner of a Cuckfield nursery is frustrated following a damaging recent newspaper story. It was reported that the Norto5 KIDZ childcare setting on Whitemans Green was awarded a rating of 'requires improvement' (previously called 'satisfactory') by Ofsted.

An Ofsted inspection report is based on a snapshot of when an inspector comes to the setting unannounced and observes how the nursery is run. The inspector is then required to review his/her findings with management before they publish their findings.

According to owner Peter Bird: "This particular Ofsted inspector did not review her findings with management prior to publishing the report and, as a result, we believe that her conclusions were erroneous.

"The day before the inspection we had just introduced a new online child development application, which was recommended to us by other Early Years practitioners. The opportunity to record, share, observe in this way we believe is really important to parents."

One parent recently wrote to Peter saying: "The online system is fantastic and keeps us up to date daily with our children's progress and development."

Peter Bird continues: "On the day that the Ofsted inspector came our staff were learning the new programme and this has been misinterpreted as not being supportive enough to the children's needs."

The fact that the report was published without review has been raised with the Family Information Service.

## Walking Race

The Independent State of Cuckfield hosted the Easter Monday Walking Race in brilliant warm Spring sunshine. Twenty seven walkers gathered at the Recreation Ground and set off to walk round the village, their previous handicap times taken into consideration. Once the last walker had disappeared down the High Street en route to Ansty and Deakes Lane, the children took over, searching for Easter eggs, riding their scooters and playing football. An idyllic village scene.

First home, winning the Men's Challenge Cup, was Gary Atkinson who also took home the Swain Cup for the fastest male walker. Leanne Knapman won the Ladies Challenge Cup to celebrate her 'first over the line' triumph, but the Bowring Cup for the fastest female walking time went to Sarah Fry.

This is also a team event with The Wheatsheaf and The White Hart receiving trophies for their winning combined efforts. Our two Co-op shops also entered a team but on this first time it didn't pay dividends.

The Mayor of Cuckfield, Rob Helliwell, participated in the race and donned the mayoral robes to present the cups and medals to the winners (pictured above).

## Museum lighting

State of the art lighting recently installed at Cuckfield Museum has opened up a host of new opportunities. The new system, which includes individually controlled LED lighting for each display cabinet, means fragile objects from the museum's collection can now go on display. The lighting was installed while the museum was closed over the winter and was part funded by an Arts Council England grant.

Curator Sue Burgess explained the benefits the new system will bring. "We are delighted that we now have an eco-friendly LED system for our display cases and overhead lighting," she said. "Individual dimmer switches means we can adjust the lighting in each cabinet to the appropriate levels for the exhibits. We're really pleased as it means that we can now more safely display objects from our collection such as first edition books, original documents, and costume items."

New exhibits currently on show at the museum include a collection of matchboxes from the Sussex Match Company, along with copies of the original artwork, and 'Practice Makes Perfect!', a collection of children's handiwork. The main exhibition explores the history of Horsgate House.

The museum staff are also in the process of downloading its collection of historic postcards onto a laptop, so visitors can explore the history of the village at the touch of a button!

Several pennants have already been dropped off at Sussex Crafts in the High Street, where Philip and Seb will be putting together the commemorative bunting to adorn the main marquee.



When Sandra Hall was preparing to take up her first post in the ministry, as assistant curate at Holy Trinity Church, she was given one simple piece of advice: "Love the people and they will love you back."

It's advice that has served her well, for as Sandra prepares to leave the village to take up her first parish she's been humbled by the heartfelt messages from parishioners who are clearly very sorry to see her go.

"Leaving is going to be very hard and I can't help but feel sad," said Sandra. "I've made some wonderful friends here and the village will always have a special place in my heart."

Sandra has been appointed priest-in-charge in the parish of Slinfold and Itchingfield, near Horsham. Her last service at Holy Trinity will be on April 19.

"It's going to be a sad day," said Sandra. "When it was announced that I was leaving I had many tears. I just hope I can hold it together."

Sandra arrived in Cuckfield in June 2010.

"I came here straight after ordination so this was my training parish," said Sandra. "It was all very exciting - my first year as a deacon."

She was ordained priest in the parish in June 2011, with two other women priests. "It was a magnificent service. The church was completely full and the music and singing were fantastic."

Sandra always knew she would leave the village when her training ended but was delighted to extend her stay after vicar Nick Wetherall retired. "My training finished last year but because Nick was leaving I was allowed to stay and look after the parish while a replacement was found. It's been a great experience for me."

She also used the time to look for her next post. "Slinfold and Itchingfield appealed to me straight away," said Sandra. "I'm a country girl at heart and grew up on

a farm, so a parish in the countryside was perfect." The parish has two churches and covers four lovely villages. "It's also only about a 35 minute drive from Cuckfield, so it doesn't feel like I'm going too far away!"

Sandra was born in Leatherhead but shortly afterwards the family moved to Ovingdean. "So I always thought of myself as a Sussex girl!"

After leaving school she worked in the accounts department of American Express, and as a farm secretary, before spending many years in the sales team of Bass Charrington. "I also worked as a driving instructor for 4 years after being made redundant," Sandra recalled.

"I now have a great admiration for parents who teach their children to drive in their own cars! I was always so pleased to have dual controls!"

Her calling to the ministry came in 2006. "I heard a new deacon preaching about her role and almost immediately bells started to ring and bright lights flashed in my brain," said Sandra. "It was like a light going on. I suddenly knew that this was what God wanted me to do."

Initially Sandra felt her calling was to become a deacon. "I didn't think I could ever be a priest – I just wasn't clever enough.

"I tried to run away from the idea but  $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$  would not let  $\operatorname{\mathsf{go}}$ . I kept having this niggling feeling.

"I finally asked myself: 'What's holding you back?' It was only then when I realised that I didn't need to rely on my own strength but the strength God provided in me."

Sandra commuted to her training college in Cambridge, spending weekends at home with husband Richard. "He was my number one supporter and extremely proud of me.

"Training was lovely but hard work, and very taxing on the brain particularly as I had left school with 5 O levels and had done nothing for years."



After college, Sandra moved to Cuckfield to continue her training. "I was excited but a little scared. I knew I was fulfilling God's will but I was a bit nervous of what was to come."

But she needn't have worried. "Nick was a fantastic training incumbent, putting himself out to make sure I was getting the right experience," said Sandra.

Villagers in Cuckfield were happy to welcome their second woman priest. "I was lucky because Jean was here before me," said Sandra. "I got a wonderfully warm welcome.

"I've loved everything about working here, although I remember being terrified at the prospect of my very first school worship," Sandra recalled. "I hadn't had any experience working with children. I was petrified. Now I love doing it."

During her time at Cuckfield Sandra has formed close bonds with dozens of families, celebrating weddings, baptisms and funerals. "Every wedding is special and it's a privilege to be able to support families who have suffered a bereavement."

The support was reciprocated when Sandra's husband Richard was diagnosed with cancer.

"I had the best year of my life in Cuckfield and the worst," said Sandra. "In 2011 we celebrated our Silver Wedding anniversary with a wonderful safari to Africa. Shortly after we returned, Richard was diagnosed with cancer." He died in July 2012 aged just 59.

"When my husband died everyone was so kind, loving, caring and supportive and it's given me a very special bond with the people here," said Sandra. "I knew people were upholding me in their prayers." Parishioners showered Sandra with flowers, gifts and lots of chocolate.

"Everyone knows that, like the Vicar of Dibley, I'm a chocoholic," said Sandra. "But, unlike her, I don't hide mine in my Bible! When people ask how I cope with stress I say - talk to people, talk to God and eat chocolate!

"Richard loved the Vicar of Dibley and had all the dvds," Sandra added. "We had the choir singing The Lord's my Shepherd 'Dibley style' at my ordination, at Richard's funeral and I'm sure we'll have it again when I leave."

Among the highlights of Sandra's time in Cuckfield was the pet service held last autumn.

"As an animal lover it was something I had wanted to do for many years. It was lovely to see everyone arriving



with their pets and I certainly hope to do it again."

Sandra also enjoyed organising a Quiet Day for the Mothers' Union at Worth Abbey. "It was a day of led prayer, with plenty of opportunity to wander around the beautiful grounds," said Sandra.

Another highlight was the reordering of Holy Trinity Church. "It's been wonderful to see the building evolve and become a venue for music events in the village," said Sandra

"When they took away the screen and I saw the East window in all its glory it moved me to tears.

"Cuckfield is a beautiful village, where the community and the church often come together and work alongside each other.

"From the annual village service when the new Mayor is introduced to the village to the Christmas tree festival, the church has become a good place for people to congregate.

"But it's also a beautiful prayerful building with a tremendous feeling of peace."

Sandra moves out of her home in Glebe Road at the end of the month and will fly to Tunisia with family to celebrate her mother's 80th birthday before starting work in her new parish.

"The last 10 months have been fantastic," said Sandra. "Looking after Cuckfield has meant I'm more than ready for the challenge ahead.

"Saying goodbye is going to be difficult but once I've left I can start getting excited."  $% \label{eq:constant}$ 

Sandra's new parish has two churches – St Peter's at Slinfold and St Nicolas at Itchingfield, about 10 minutes away from each other

"St Nicolas is a lovely ancient church in the middle of the countryside with no running water or toilet facilities," said Sandra. "St Peter's is in the heart of the village. The parish also covers Barns Green and Bashurst, so there will be lots of travelling, but luckily I love my driving."

It won't be long before Sandra is reunited with friends from Cuckfield. "A coach full of villagers will be coming to my licensing service," said Sandra.

"And I'll be returning to Cuckfield regularly to tend Richard's grave and catch up with friends."

Cuckfield will always have a very special place in Sandra's heart. "I have many special memories of special people. But it's easy when you're working with people who have learnt to love you." said Sandra.

"I just hope my new parish will learn to love me too!"

You will, I know, take part in the raffles and competitions and enjoy the entertainment taking place in the central arena and throughout the afternoon across the ground. Bring your dog if you have one, it could become 'Best in Show'!

As I write, the present situation remains the same. Still the yellow lorries trundle along Broad Street and up the High Street with staggering regularity and weight with which they pressurise our fragile roads, pavements and buildings.

I had limited response to the questions I posed last month about this village problem, so I will try again.

Living in a conservation area makes us conservators, which according to Collins 21st Century Dictionary are: ones who preserve from injury or violation; a guardian, custodian, protector from harm, decay or loss.

In the light of this, Cuckfieldians, my question is: How is it that a conservation area has not been granted a weight restriction order?

## Chairman's Annual Report 2014/15

This is the final year of a four year term for the current Parish Council with a new one due to be elected in May. My report for this year focuses on the completion of projects we set out at the beginning of this term in 2011 and a summary of our committees during 2015. Achievements were only made possible by the dedication of councillors, some of whom left us over the term and others who joined mid-term, and I would like to take this opportunity to formally thank all the Parish Councillors who have served during the past four years.

In October 2014 we welcomed Annette Jones as Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer, replacing Nicky Sage who left to take up a new career after five years with the council and who we wished well. Jane Forester joined as our new clerical assistant last March. A number of staff work behind the scenes, either as caretakers or grounds people, to keep the Queen's Hall and cemetery operating as people expect.

I am pleased to summarise completion of the following projects:-

#### Neighbourhood Plan – now adopted and part of the MSDC Development Plan

The Cuckfield Neighbourhood Plan was 'Made' on 1st October 2014 and now forms part of the Mid Sussex District Council Development Plan. Our Plan was the 25th Plan nationally to complete the process and the first in Mid Sussex. Taking four years, with over 50 people having worked on the project, thousands of hours went into preparing evidence and policies. Importantly, the Parish Council learned a lot through its consultation and communications with all age groups which will benefit future projects. The Plan is now used on all planning applications and we have monitoring indicators to review decisions. A number of examples demonstrate the impact of the Plan and how it is used to determine planning applications. One example is the open space in Broad Street where applications for six and 20 houses in a very sensitive part of the village was determined by policies in the Neighbourhood Plan and delegated powers by the Planning Officer. One was subsequently refused based on policies in the Neighbourhood Plan and the other withdrawn. The role of Permitted Development has caused a few surprises especially with regard to change of use for business purposes, The Ship conversion to a convenience store being an example.

#### Youth Club Building – Safeguard and Acquisition

I am pleased to announce we completed the purchase of the Youth Club building in London Lane on 4th February 2015 and we now own the building and freehold for the site. This completion marks twelve months of negotiation with West Sussex County Council who had put the building up for sale in 2014 and the Parish Council took the decision to safeguard the building when it heard of the sale. The building has been the home for many years to groups such as Cuckfield Pre-School Playgroup, Orchard House Youth Club, Kumon Learning Centre and a local Karate Club. These groups would have been threatened with closure due to lack of local space had the building been sold to a commercial party. Identified in the Cuckfield Neighbourhood Plan as an essential community building which should be protected, 85% of the community responses during consultation were in favour of Policy CNP 20 which seeks to safeguard the building. The building will run and operate 'as is' in the short and medium term and the Council will identify value for money maintenance projects. Using our experience of running other assets, we have set up a new Community Building Committee to ensure it is run with the required financial and regulatory responsibility. The Committee has met with the current hirers to ensure a smooth transition and looks forward to working with them. Importantly, the Parish Council plans to increase its use by other groups and therefore ensure viability. In the long term, the Parish Council's vision is to seek a mix of funding and grants to provide a new purpose-built facility which would be a significant undertaking requiring the Cuckfield community spirit to help achieve this. It will be an exciting project for the next Parish Council.

And now for my summary of the Committee activities over the year...

#### **Roads & Traffic**

Whitemans Green has seen new marking and speed reduction measures in place and we have worked with Highways to quickly address the flooding on the roundabout which was causing pedestrian safety issues.

Ardingly Road Zebra Crossings - Two crossing points in Ardingly Road, one near to Bylanes Close and the other at Longacre Crescent are being replaced by zebra crossings. The scheme has gone through a lengthy process from design stage through to approval from West Sussex County Council. Unfortunately there have been a number of setbacks along the way but the Parish Council have worked hard to manage these. We are now very pleased to be able to report the appointment of a contractor and road space for the project has been booked. Work will commence on the 5th May with completion by the 22nd May 2015.

London Road Puffin Crossing - As part of our ongoing safety improvements for the village, a Puffin Crossing located between the bus shelter and Tower House Close is being installed by West Sussex County Council. Work is due to commence on the 3rd August with completion by 4th September 2015.

Street Lights Replacement Programme - As reported previously, all street lighting and illuminated road signs within Cuckfield are currently being replaced as part of a government funded project to ensure all lighting columns conform to current safety and energy efficiency standards. I am pleased to report it is nearing completion but required a significant amount of unexpected work by the Parish Council. Seen as a once in 30 years project and to make sure we retain the heritage of the village and bring uniformity back to some of the light fittings, the Parish Council is funding some of the columns with Section 106 monies from recent developments. All Conservation Areas will have heritage style columns with the main through routes. London Road, London Lane, Ardingly Road and South Street south of the Conservation Area will have a combination of heritage columns and 'swan neck' brackets.

#### **Planning**

We continue to see an increasing number of applications for conversions and extensions, which are generally of good quality, design and construction. We saw the completion of Mantell Park (Buttinghill Drive) providing 42 new homes and Bevan Bank with 6 new homes. The development at Ardingly Road has now started and will deliver 14 new homes and a Public Open Space. The new road there will be known as Horsefield Green.

Mantell Park will also deliver an area of Public Open Space but we still have significant concerns over the drainage scheme and the slippage which has occurred during and after construction. This has currently led to a reduction in the drainage scheme which we are concerned may have consequences downstream and, locally, means a sizable amount of open space is potentially unsafe. We are working with Mid Sussex District Council and Taylor Wimpey to ensure this is resolved so we can take on the land as per the legal agreement.

Yew Tree Court, Glebe Road redevelopment has now started. Whilst a long term benefit with the provision of affordable homes in the centre of the village, it will mean a period of disruption while the old building is demolished and the new one constructed. Access and location near to Holy Trinity Primary School are factors which the Parish Council has fed back to Planning Officers and the developer. We will monitor the situation.

There have been some disappointments to report for the year as well. The Parish had worked hard to try to safeguard the open space at the end of Courtmead Road but was unsuccessful. Planning permission was granted and we expect a substantial single dwelling to be built.

The Inspector's decision to uphold the Penland Farm planning appeal is a major decision for both Haywards Heath and Cuckfield. It will have significant impact on the infrastructure of Cuckfield and encroach on the Strategic Gap between Cuckfield and Haywards Heath.

Whilst our village centres continue to be vibrant and the heart of Cuckfield and Whitemans Green, the sale and conversion of The Ship Public House to a convenience store caused much frustration and concern around the whole village. The ability to make this change in a Conservation Area with minimal planning consent was a shock to everyone and in fact highlighted a national trend and weakness in policy on Permitted Development. Despite enormous effort from the Parish Council and led by our community groups, there was very little that could be done to prevent the conversion without it being fully considered in terms of planning. The Council continues to liaise with The Co-operative Food to ensure the current Co-op in the High Street is retained (see further update in this newsletter). Subsequently, there has been significant attention on this subject and the Council is looking at ways to make sure we retain our public houses as community assets. We are investigating what is now needed for Asset of Community Value (ACV) applications to be made on our remaining public houses.

#### **Environment**

The Environment Committee has focused on ensuring the churchyard and cemetery is well maintained and provides a beautiful and tranquil environment with stunning views to the South Downs. Dick Taylor, our grounds person, retired last year after 13 years of service and we put in place a regular maintenance contract with a local business to work alongside Brian Smith, our

part-time grounds person.
Paul Frost, Village Orderly
(pictured here on left) for
Cuckfield and Lindfield,
retired last month after four
and a half years with us and
nearly 20 years previously
working in and around West
Sussex street cleansing. We
wish Paul all the very best
for a well-earned rest.



The Observer Field (Newbury Lane) is our

long-term project to develop and maintain a natural zone for wildlife and ecology. The introduction of bees has been an important development for this year. We have supported the volunteers with the renovation of the Royal Observer Corp Nuclear Bunker, part of Cuckfield history, which has attracted many weekend visitors.

December 2014 saw our biggest and most successful Christmas Street Festival, with lots of festive activities and cold crisp weather attracting many people and making a good start to the festive season.

### Worsley Memorial Recreation Ground: Playground update

The 7th March marked the official reopening of the refurbished playground at the Recreation Ground. You will find a new sculpture of an Iguanodon with climbing rock stacks, both linking Cuckfield to its past when Gideon Mantell traced the first fossil of an Iguanodon back to quarries in Cuckfield. Cuckfield commissioned the Iguanodon from local sculptor Hannah Stewart.

#### Queen's Hall

The Queen's Hall continues to be a key asset to the village and one which takes a lot of time and effort to maintain, ensuring we deliver a good experience for our regular hirers and community groups. Our caretakers, Chris, Vicki and Paul, continue to look after the Hall admirably. We have seen a good use as a wedding venue and it continues to attract very positive feedback. We have worked hard to minimize impact on our neighbours at the end of the events which are strictly managed and monitored.

#### **Community Building Committee**

Set up to manage the new Youth Club building asset, I am pleased to report that Jane Revell and Mary Crouch agreed to join the Committee and provide vital knowledge and insight to its running based on their previous experience. An opening ceremony is being planned for September, with a competition to seek a new name for the building marking our new ownership.

#### Finance and General Purpose

I am pleased to report the Parish Council still holds sound reserves and continues to operate within the financial power vested to it. We have increased the precept this year by 3%, which equates to £88.36 per year for a Band D household, a 10p rise on last years Band D rate.

#### And finally... a New Council from May 2015

In May the existing Parish Councillors will retire their office in readiness for a new Parish Council to be elected, which this year coincides with the General Election. Some councillors will be standing for re-election but some will be stepping down and it is hoped new nominees will come forward to take up the challenge of an interesting and worthwhile role. My thanks go to all councillors who have worked so hard over the last term and who, along with Cuckfield's community spirit, have made this village a special place to live.

### THE CO-OPERATIVE CONTINUES TO SERVE CUCKFIELD AND WHITEMANS GREEN

A STATEMENT FROM THE CO-OPERATIVE FOOD (25 MARCH 2015) TO THE RESIDENTS OF CUCKFIELD:

"Steve Hammett, National Stores Director of The Co-operative Food, met representatives of Cuckfield Parish Council on 6 March. The meeting was organised by The Co-operative to provide an opportunity for the Parish Council to raise any issues relating to the two Co-operative Food stores in Cuckfield – in the High Street and at Whiteman's Green.

Mr Hammett told the Parish Council that the two stores are now both trading well, though the High Street store had had a difficult few weeks when the Whiteman's Green store opened. There had been some issues around availability in the run up to Christmas – mainly because the store had originally been earmarked for closure and logistics had to be 'turned back on'. These issues have now been resolved and, whilst the High Street store remains under review, no decision about its future will be taken until late 2015 at the very earliest.

The issue of deliveries was raised, particularly occasions when lorries have parked on the road outside the Whiteman's Green store causing an obstruction. Mr Hammett agreed to look into this issue, which appears to be deliveries of bread. He suggested that if the delivery were to be made earlier in the day, when the car park is less busy, the lorry should be able to park in the car park.

The Co-operative is keen to continue the conversation with the Parish Council and committed to keep it informed about progress on resolving these issues."

## Sue meets the Queen

Cuckfield tennis coach Sue Pegler, who has inspired many deaf youngsters to take up the sport, was recently presented to the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh at Buckingham Palace.

Sue was one of 300 Churchill Fellows, chosen from over 4,000, to be part of the 50th anniversary celebrations.

The Winston Churchill Fellowship Trust was set up in 1965 to 'travel to make a difference' in a particular field of work or interest. Sue was a 1984 Fellow and. from 1999 to 2003, served in the Council to help choose categories and interview prospective Fellows.

"Being invited to Buckingham Palace and meeting the Queen and Duke was such a privilege and great honour," said Sue. "It was lovely to meet other Churchill Fellows too who are doing tremendous work at the grassroots of society and are so passionate and enthusiastic!"

Sue was granted a fellowship for 'Social Integration of the Young Deaf through Tennis'.

The funding enabled her to travel to New York for the USPTCA Conference, meeting other coaches from all

She went on to spend 8 weeks studying 'Integration through Sport of the Deaf' in America and Canada, visiting the Deaf University and schools teams in



Washington DC, North Carolina, Baton Rouge, Texas (where Arthur Ashe had a big tennis school for deaf youngsters run by a qualified deaf coach,) San Francisco and Montreal, and witnessing the confidence gained by deaf sports people competing against hearing players.

Armed with contacts, information and experience, Sue set up tennis coaching days all over Britain inspiring a whole generation of deaf youngsters to take up the sport and eventually taking Britain's first team to compete in the Deaf Davis Cup.

Her first pupil, Andrew Rees from Cuckfield, went to achieve international recognition in world games for deaf tennis and rugby.

Sue is now keen to encourage others to apply for grants. "It's a chance in a lifetime to make Britain better in your field of work," she said. "The possibilities are endless to integrate people into communities through sport and you gain much more than you give."

## Flooring ideas

#### **DESIGN AT HOME**

Planning a re-furb? It goes without saying that comfort and style are not limited to soft furnishings, décor and lighting as flooring is an important factor in the finished interior. Comfort aside, flooring needs to be practical, good looking, durable, easy to manage and overall complete the look contributing to the final 'wow factor'. Start by deciding what you want from your chosen flooring in a particular interior. Do you want it to zone an area such as a dining/play area within a larger space? Help increase insulation? Unify interiors so that they flow into one another? Add style or cosiness? Or some or all of the above?

There are many surfaces to choose from and a popular choice is wooden planks, providing a beautiful finish within their spectrum of warm tones and grain patterns. Select from, for example, oaks of many kinds and tones, cherry and walnut. Keeping the original floorboards in an older home is a consideration. Who knows what kind of beautiful floor might lurk underneath an old carpet ready to be stripped, varnished, stained or painted? Replacing damaged boards is possible with the availability of reclaimed oak or pine planks. Add geometrical pattern, depth and historical style (popular between 1900 and 1940) with reclaimed wooden parquet flooring as an alternative. For a different approach, the 'fake' wooden flooring route takes you to a luxury vinyl having a tough durable finish fabricated in flexible planks which look like the real thing to flow seamlessly through the home. It's all a matter of choice and style to create a unique interior.

Large floor tiles in stone or porcelain can unify a modern interior with the tiles running from area to area or room to room. Small tiles will generate a texture or pattern which can make the space look smaller. Choose glazed tiles or seal absorbent ones, such as limestone, to prevent stains. Luxury vinyls will also give you great choices in stone effect.

Not forgetting carpets, think fabulous textures with loop or cut piles in neutral tones or, for the more adventurous, jazzy stripes or patterns in fantastic colours. Remember that carpet with a decent underlay will increase insulation. Consider amazing hand knotted rugs in glorious patterns in wool or silk, or go bespoke with rugs designed to fit exactly with your décor and furnishings. Natural fibres such as wool, coir, seagrass or jute are lovely but are only suitable for dry areas; best to avoid areas such as the bathroom that might get damp.

Considering an eco floor? Here are a few examples:
Bamboo floors come from a renewable source and
offer a natural and hard wearing finish.

Glass tiles made from recycled wine and beer bottles could adorn your floor or there are alternative tiles made from such things as ash, porcelain, glass and old mirrors.

Cork flooring and underlay is one to consider being naturally fire retardant, water resistant and warm.

## School forest garden

#### VILLAGE GREEN

One bright, sunny Saturday morning a few weeks ago I went down to Holy Trinity School. That particular morning was Grounds Day when a group of parents spend the morning digging, pruning, clearing, creating and generally helping to make the grounds what they are. What an inspirational place this is, vibrant and alive with the first shoots of spring echoing the laughter of children. This is a facility of great value, fostering a love of nature in the generations growing up at Holy Trinity.

The latest plan is the creation of a forest garden. This appeals to me as it is a method of agriculture which grows produce in a way that mimics the structure of a natural forest, the most stable and sustainable type of ecosystem in this climate. First to go in are the tree saplings, which were being planted that morning by some of the children; walnut, quince, medlar, mulberry and so on. The idea is to grow fruit and nut bearing trees to provide a canopy, with the autumn leaf fall giving a natural mulch to the plants below. In due course the fruiting shrubs make the middle of the sandwich, under-planted with low growing, shade tolerant fruit and vegetables. In this way the area cultivated yields threefold instead of the usual one plot one crop method.
