Crafty tree in store




For children there's a Fancy Dress Competition with a theme of Christmas Fun and the ever popular Father Christmas Grotto.

Rugby World Cup winner Lawrence Dallaglio officially opened Warden Park Academy's new 3G sports facility last month.

The former England captain, and member of the 2003 World Cup winning team, cut the ribbon to officially open the all-weather pitch - named the Chisholm Stoneley Sports Pitch to recognise many years of service from Deputy Heads Pete Chisholm and Rob Stoneley.

He also enjoyed watching students try out the new facility with a 'skills and mini games' demonstration.

It was the second visit to the school by the rugby star who in July cut the first turf for work to begin on the £500,000 project.

"I can't believe how quickly it's gone up," said Dallaglio. "The contractors have done an amazing job in such a short time. It's a wonderful facility which will make young people more enthusiastic about getting out and playing sport."

Dallaglio spoke of his 'amazing and colourful' career with Wasps and with the England rugby squad and told the students 'anything is possible'. "When I was at school I never made the first team, but if you work hard and enjoy your sport anything is possible," he said. "Sport changes lives – it certainly changed mine. It gives kids something to aspire to and creates opportunities for them."

Dallaglio was also impressed to hear that the pitch is available for community groups to hire and has already been booked by local sports clubs, including Cuckfield FC, Cuckfield Cosmos, AFC Haywards, Pink Flamingoes FC and Lindfield Juniors FC.

Pro Direct Soccer Academy will also be based at Warden Park, while Sussex County FA is planning to use the facility for coach development courses.

Dallaglio was invited to perform the opening ceremony by his friend and former Warden Park student Jon Ball, whose company Fairfax Properties supported the project with a £60,000 donation.

"I am delighted to be able to help my old school provide a world-class sports facility for both students and the local community," said Jon. "My nephew and daughter both attend the school, the third generation of my family to do so. It's nice to know that they will be among those benefiting along with their fellow students."

Warden Park Academy CEO Jonathan Morris added: "The academy has an amazing sporting tradition and this new facility, which gives us the opportunity to train outside all year round, will be hugely beneficial not just to our PE department but to the wider community.

"I am confident that the legacy of this project will bring joy to every student at Warden Park as well as the local community for generations to come."

The pitch was built by O'Brien Sports in collaboration with Notts Sports. Steve Hillman, General Manager at O'Brien Sports, said: "The new pitch will provide students and the local community with the opportunity to participate in frequent sports activities, building confidence, self-esteem, academic excellence and character. It will also give them a platform to realise their sporting goals and ambitions."



News from Bolnore Village





New tree planting at The Woodside

Bolnore residents were joined by local councillors Alastair McPherson and Matthew Jeffers as they planted trees in the Tim Farmer Recreation Ground, next to community building The Woodside last month.

Tree planting started early, with the cubs and scouts out in force and specialist knowledge and extra shovels kindly provided by community group Friends of Ashenground and Bolnore Woods. Everyone got stuck in, some more than others with the typical Mid Sussex clay to deal with, and a really productive community morning was shared by all. The trees have been supplied with funds from the Bolnore Village Community Partnership, and Crest Nicholson helped dig the holes on the Friday before.

A number of large silver birch and cherry trees were planted, which should give the area some real colour in years to come, and another 200 or so small whips, donated by the Woodland Trust, will be planted over coming weeks on the bank between the Woodside and Cattswood Lane. 1st Dec: D-Day!

It would appear, at this time anyway, that all is on track for a successful handover to Pembroke Property Management on Thursday 1st December!

It seemed an appropriate time to remind everyone about the Community Interest Company, particularly what it is and is not responsible for.

The BVCIC (Bolnore Village Community Interest Company) is responsible, through its appointed estate manager, for all communal areas of Bolnore as well as the blocks of flats and communal areas within them including: Middle Village Square car park, some landscaped areas including the large meadow near the Barn, small wooded areas and has also inherited responsibility for the upkeep of the Community Garden on Updown Hill.

Legally speaking the village is split into two.

Our CIC will only be legally responsibly for the 'Old

Bolnore' (Phase 1-3). 'New Bolnore' which is still under
construction is managed by Crest Nicholson's appointed
management company for the time being.

Here are some of the issues for which the CIC is not responsible: Maintenance of the public highways - the adopted roads and pavements (speed limit signs, painting white lines and potholes), parking issues, most of the woodland, The Woodside Pavilion and its grounds and the Housing Association properties in the village.

Although we're not responsible for any of the above, wherever possible we will work with the relevant authority or group to maintain, improve and protect our village amenities.

We will keep you updated as part of our commitment to engage with the community.

The 50th Anniversary of The Independent State of Cuckfield was celebrated in glorious autumnal weather over the three days of the penultimate weekend in October.

Firstly, the election of the new Mayor took place in The Hayloft at The Talbot. The fifty candidates were gradually eliminated during the evening according to the amount of money they had raised, with tension and excitement building up towards the final ten.

Right up until the last moment the result was in the balance, but as the bell chimed and the money counters completed their marathon task it was Wilf Knighton with £8,705.59 who managed to beat the favourite Leanne Knapman (with the tidy sum of £7,748.08) to become Mayor of the Independent State of Cuckfield in this record-breaking 50th year. It made a 2016 overall total of £23,058 raised for local organisations and charities.

Mayor Knighton will play a major role in the distribution of these freshly raised funds, his track record in local affairs is highly impressive.

He has lived with his family in Cuckfield for 53 years, and, as soon as he was able to release himself from the demands of commuting from Haywards Heath to London Bridge, he could focus on improving the community facilities for our area.

Saturday morning welcomed blue skies and bright sunshine in readiness for the procession of floats through the village to introduce the new Mayor and to represent the range of activities, organisations and events that enrich our community.

Twenty floats left Warden Park Academy after the staff of the host pub The Talbot had put Orchard House's colourful float, in celebration of their project on the rainforest, in first position.

The talented Singing Allsorts were awarded second place for their Steam Train to commemorate the coming of the railway to Haywards Heath 175 years ago.

The third place went to Holy Trinity PTA which reminded us about the importance of stories in children's lives and the inspirational nature of books.

Sunday's Cool received a special award while advertising their up and coming production of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat – a date in the diary for you.

Burgess Hill Marching Youth Band led the procession, and Surrey and Sussex Drum and Bugle Band preceded Mayor Wilf Knighton, grandly seated in the 1966 Cardinal Red Sunbeam Alpine owned and driven by David Horne.

The traditional ceremony of 'Handing over of the keys of Cuckfield' with a pint of much needed beer to the Mayor, took place in the High Street outside The Talbot. While the floats paused so they could be admired and photographed, Brillo the clown entertained the children before the procession slowly returned to Warden Park Academy to conclude the spectacular afternoon.

Rev Michael Maine, too late on Friday evening to submit his mayoral application, was 'spot on time' to start the Village Service on Sunday morning by welcoming the new Mayor and the members of The Independent State of Cuckfield committee supporting Wilf Knighton in their various costumes.

The service focused on our Cuckfield community - a sense of belonging and that organisations supported by the Independent State were the building blocks of our society. The church bells rang, the organ played and the congregation sang, all in celebration and with thankfulness for the great weekend and in appreciation of the richness and diversity of Cuckfield that we are privileged to enjoy.

As Rev Michael Maine so rightly said: "We are all in this together." So clearly reflected in and reinforced by this splendid three day event.

His passion for food and seafood can be seen with his broad selection of quality fish in the shop and also his carefully selected and locally sourced range of products to complement fish! His recipes are mainly inspired by the cooking demonstrations held at the shop regularly.

Here he explains how to get the best out of bream...



Baked Bream with Fennel and Orange

Serves 2

Things to grab:

2 sea bream fillets scored on the skin

- 2 small oranges
- 1 large garlic clove chopped
- 1 large fennel bulb shredded
- 2 tbsp fresh coriander chopped
- 50ml olive oil

Zest and segment the orange then squeeze out the remainder of the juice and place in a bowl with the garlic, fennel, oil and coriander.

Place the mix on a baking sheet and lay the bream fillets, skin side up, on top of the mixture then drizzle with olive oil and season.

Place the dish in a preheated oven at 200C for 12 minutes until the skin is crisp and the flesh is cooked.

Serve the fish on top of the fennel in the centre of your plate.

Cuckfield fights for Play Meadow

The campaign to save Cuckfield's Play Meadow has suffered a serious setback as Mid Sussex District Council has put the land on the market for development.

Villagers who have been fighting to save the popular play meadow were devastated to find local estate agent Marcus Grimes is currently marketing the site, along with proposed designs for a five bedroom house.

The land is owned by Mid Sussex District Council, which has rejected a community bid to secure its future for local people. It is expected to fetch up to £2 million.

But the campaigners, led by Flis Irving and Janet Beales, have vowed to fight on to keep the meadow as a community space.

"I will continue to fight this to the bitter end," said Flis. "I think it is morally wrong. The council should not be developing the land with one enormous house at the expense of the community."

It's been a roller coaster ride for Flis whose hopes were raised in June this year with news that the High Court had quashed the Council's granting of planning permission.

At the time, leading planning judge Mr Justice Gilbart found that the council had acted unlawfully as the planning consent breached planning policy. He focused on the harm to the Cuckfield Conservation Area and highlighted the importance of preserving The Play Meadow for the benefit of local people.

"People seem to be flummoxed as to how MSDC can get away with sidestepping a judgment in the High Court," said Flis.

"But the council is activating its 'reserved matters' planning permission: the 2015 update on the outline planning permission that it granted itself at the start of the process and which was about to expire.

"This way it can claim that the ruling of the High Court is not relevant, as the plans, despite resulting in a similarly massive house with the same consequences to access and loss of views that the judge took exception to, are different and preceded the judgment."

Mid Sussex District Council Leader Garry Wall defended the council's proposals, saying the money generated from the project could be used to deliver additional social housing for local people. "We have over 1,600 applicants waiting on our housing register and building one house in Cuckfield could generate enough income to deliver an extra 15 affordable rent homes for local families in the District," he said.

But Flis commented:"If the council is claiming that the profit made on building a luxury home is going to be used to construct council houses or flats, perhaps it could spare a thought for those in the village living in such accommodation who, alongside many in the community, will be deprived of the recreation and relaxation that The Play Meadow has provided for generations. There is also no guarantee that this money would be ring-fenced and used for the purposes that Councillor Wall suggests."

She added; "Mr Justice Gilbart made it clear in his High Court ruling last June that preservation of this special "I think it is morally wrong for the council to be developing the land at the expense of the community."

place, set within a conservation area, took precedence over development."

Janet Beales, owner of Next Step Nursery School, said the meadow has been regularly used by the children and by other local groups including the Brownies and a village youth club.

But the council has suggested that community groups could use land nearby, known as the Observer Field, as an alternative community space.

Councillor Wall said: "The Parish Council owns a larger area of open space immediately adjacent to this site which is held for the enjoyment of the public as an open space. Our landscape experts advise that this land is suitable for use by local groups which will complement the large amount of open space already available in the village."


But Janet said it was misleading for the council to suggest that the Observer Field is a viable alternative to the Play Meadow. The piece of land is a rough field and not suitable for children to run around on: the risk of injury is too high. Therefore planned physical activities would be very difficult, if not impossible. The Youth Club would not be able to use it for football and ball games for the same reason.

She added that the Observer Field contains equipment for meteorological observations as well as a Cold War nuclear bunker and is a regular place for nesting bees

Mr James Pavey, partner in law firm Irwin Mitchell who was involved in the High Court litigation, commented: "The High Court's decision will have to be taken into account in any application to vary the planning permission for the 'off-plan' house or for any subsequent planning permission in relation to it."

Flis added: "This is not the end of the story. The Play Meadow will remain a registered Asset of Community Value after sale. Any subsequent sale with vacant possession will need to be notified to the Council and any community interest group will be given the opportunity to be treated as a potential bidder. I imagine that this would be an unwelcome piece of information to any buyer, once it becomes clear."



Should I exercise?

MANAGING PAIN

By Sophia Barlow, registered osteopath

Most patients who present to me at the clinic are in pain and have a recent, and often recurrent, injury. Exercise in one way or another is bound to come up during consultation, and I am often asked, should I exercise? Actually on an injury the answer is usually no, but there are caveats, certainly for ongoing conditions.

Osteopathically the answer is, it depends, and more importantly, listen to your body and consider your own health needs, including your mental health. With experience I have become a lot less grudging in strapping up knees for skiing, shoulders for golf and basically everything for marathon training and running, knowing that I am sending my patients out, on their wishes and fully informed, into a sporting activity that may certainly in the short term aggravate their symptoms. But I would hope that these patients, rather than having the 'I just went for it' mentality that they often espouse on entering the clinic with acutely painful injuries has hopefully been replaced with a more balanced view of their own health, expectations and current capacity. Most importantly they are exercising, and over the years I have become a bit of a

I find that most patients' expectations, and in some cases long held dreams, of what they may be able to achieve regards exercise and sport are perfectly reasonable. In my experience injuries happen when these targets are rushed, not planned, and planning includes the basics of enough sleep, good nutrition, good hydration and a planned and graded exercise and fitness plan. Also patients may have become out of touch with their bodies, seeing their bodies as a resource to use and not listening to when their bodies are tired or injured and changing their behaviour accordingly.

More generally, if we are not in the midst of an acute injury, we all know the clear benefits of regular exercise, but all the media nagging and stats and apps can become rather like white noise to many. In fact, I hadn't really done any regular exercise for about ten years despite discussing its benefits with my patients every day. But last year I undertook the NHS couch to 5k running plan, partly because I felt a bit of a fraud when nagging my patients, partly because I was looking to increase my energy levels and partly because in the clinic I see the significant benefits to patients in their older years who have undertaken regular exercise throughout their whole lives.

It really is astounding how a few half hours a week of exercise adds up over the years, whether in general tissue health, cardiovascular health, overall joint health or mental health; well certainly enough to get me off the couch anyway!

So yes, please do exercise, it's never too late to start, just start gently.

Every family has stories to tell – from ancestors and family history to weddings, babies, landmark birthdays and those memorable holidays.

All too often these stories are hidden away in dusty albums, boxes in lofts or, more recently, locked away in the memory of a home computer.

But one local business is bringing these stories and memories back to life, producing unique books that can be picked up, shared and enjoyed every day.

Book-a-Gift, run by Maral French from her home in Warninglid, creates individually designed memory books, capturing family stories.

Maral set up her business in 2007, after selling her share in a document binding company. "I was looking for an opportunity to work locally and spend more time with my daughter," she said. "I realised that I could use my experience and develop my ideas for the consumer market."

Maral's research showed that, although there were opportunities for people to create photo books online, there was a gap in the market for those who didn't want to do it themselves.

"Many people don't want to risk sending precious photos through the post," said Maral. "But they can bring them here knowing they will never leave the office."

Initially Maral opened a shop in Billingshurst, which was an instant success. "But I ended up being there seven days a week which was taking me away from my daughter again, so I decided to move the business to my garden studio."

Since then Maral and her assistant Sarah have been kept busy with requests for wedding albums and ancestry books.

"For the wedding books, couples bring in CDs or memory sticks of photos and we design their photobook to tell their story," said Maral. "We're not trying to compete with the traditional photo album but provide a 'coffee table' book that can be picked up, flicked through and enjoyed whenever someone wants to remember the day."

With ancestry books, customers bring their old printed photos, slides or even negatives. "The first thing we do is scan all the pictures so the originals are handled as little as possible and kept safe," said Maral. Very precious photographs can be scanned while the customer waits.

The condition of the photos isn't a problem. "Old sepia photographs reproduce really well. The worst ones are those taken in the 1970s!"

All the photos are scanned on to a CD which is given to the customer with the completed book.

"These aren't just books of photographs – they are family stories and we design the book to tell the story," said Maral. "Seeing customers' faces when they come back to collect their books can be very emotional."

One recent book tells the story, through pictures, of a motoring enthusiast who built his own car to race at Goodwood. Another follows the training of a young pilot. "We've also covered gap year travels, produced a 'pull out' family tree, and reproduced grandmother's old recipe books!" said Maral.

"The younger generation particularly like them. In this world of mobile phones and computer screens it means a lot to hold their memories in a book."

Book-a-Gift also produces canvas pictures from photographs and a range of calendars - popular Christmas gifts. They also provide a photo scanning service and general photo printing.

One of the newest products is a school photo book. "Most parents buy school photos which often end up in boxes still in their little card frames," said Maral. "Our books, available in various school colours, tell the story of the child's journey through school and can be added to over the years."

There are also binders for children's artwork – with a choice of having the work scanned on to pages or inserted using special tabs.

These binders have proved popular with businesses which need to add or take out pages. "We've produced binders for marquee companies, holiday home owners and even a horse breeder!" said Maral.

Ancestry and wedding books cost from £55 including design fee and generally take about three days to produce. Calendars (from £9.99) and canvases (from £12.99) can be made in hours. "People appreciate the quick turnaround," said Maral. "We've even done a canvas on Christmas Eve for a VERY last minute gift!



The golden leaves

VILLAGE GREEN

How breathtakingly beautiful this autumn has been. The yellow, orange and burgundy of the turning leaves inviting the camera of the mind's eye to catch and store the memories of loveliness for the winter days to come. Driving up the Balcombe Road from Haywards Heath one day the wind blew a shower of golden leaves over me like rose petals on a bride. Precious moments to be treasured. How blessed we are to have the joy of trees all around our towns and villages.

In the gloom and doom of war and confrontation on the world stage and general uncertainty in the air I was much uplifted recently. THE GREEN FUTURE IS HERE event was hosted by our local Green Party: GREEN referring to green shoots of hope for the future by businesses and people who are already operating in ways that are creating a sustainable future that will survive and thrive. Dr Tony Whitbread, CEO of the Sussex Wildlife Trust, spoke on the importance of Natural Capital. This is about what nature does for us and how we can recognise and work with the natural world. There was plenty of time to talk with some of the speakers who came to share what they are doing. The Woodland Flora and Fauna Group is based in Hurstierpoint and supported by the Hurstpierpoint Society. After a huge biodiversity study to identify areas of officially designated ancient woodland, Mid Sussex District Council has now agreed to designate all woodland in and around Hurstpierpoint as semi natural ancient woodland. Let's hope this will halt the onward march of the concrete housing carpet. At The Crossing in Forest Row, the land is stewarded to maximise fertility, biodiversity and food production. They operate Community Supported Agriculture, an example being The Coop Co-op where a number of families come together to care for hens and share the eggs. Businesses from The Green Growth Platform at Brighton University were at the event too.

Regenerative Agriculture went mainstream with an article in The Guardian: 'Our best shot at cooling the atmosphere might be right under our feet'. They report studies suggesting that regenerating the soil by turning our backs on industrial farming holds the key to tackling climate change. Talking of climate change, for those of you who take an interest in these things, a new film has been released. BEFORE THE FLOOD has some big names on its team. Free on The National Geographic Channel, Leonardo DiCaprio meets with scientists, activists and world leaders to discuss the problem and possible solutions. War with the planet as well as on it could be a way of looking at what we are doing to our blue island home.

Don't forget the Cuckfield Local Christmas Food Market on 10th December 9.30am-12.30pm. It's shaping up to be a great market with all kinds of Christmas goodies. Not to be missed!

Mid century modern

DESIGN AT HOME

An open plan interior embracing clean lines with sliding doors opening out on to an outside living space is not such the new idea as you might think but swings right back to 1950s America. Seamlessly merging indoor/ outdoor spaces with the inside spilling out to wide patios embracing nature and its organic forms was a philosophy sprung from Mid Century Modern, a design movement from the 1930s to early 1960s. Architects Frank Lloyd Wright and Walter Gropius amongst others created such spaces hoping to achieve a fresh look for a new lifestyle. Floor plans composed of light, airy, wide open spaces, forging a brighter future in home design for post-war America, Architecture turned its back on austerity and made the most of its massive post-war economic boom. creating homes with flat roofs, expanses of glass walls and clean lines. Such modern light and airy spaces called for new trends in furniture design and decoration and manufacturers could fortunately make the most of postwar mass production techniques. Furniture and appliances took on new affordable exciting styles which were stripped down to their basic forms and described as contemporary.

In Europe designers Ray and Charles Eames contributed to the modern styling by designing mass produced furniture with clean lines and curved angles. Experiments with aluminium, polyester resin, plywood and fibreglass resulted in their iconic plastic chairs which for comfort followed body contours and their sleek, moulded plywood chairs voted The Best Design of the 20th Century by Time Magazine. Being affordable and mass produced was an important feature to them quoting: 'Getting the most of the best to the greatest number of people for the least'.

The familiar teak furniture from the period, and sold in many shops today for followers of the vintage trend, was designed by Finn Juhl, leader of the Danish Modern Design movement and a master of organic design in the 1940s.

Decor took on graphic patterns and geometric forms, and with renewed popularity in recent years the designs have taken Britain by storm in fabrics and wallpaper using the dark neutrals and strong accent colours of the day. Interiors adopting the look are trimmed down to their bare bones and any 'fussiness' removed to take on a new depth encouraged by scenes from the TV series Madmen, set in the 1950s. Furnishings are made from teak, walnut or oak with plain textured fabrics. There are clever designs like storage in the form of sleek shelving units with cupboards stretching up the wall. Low coffee tables, some with glass tops like the Noguchi table with elegant curvy organic form and sideboards with drawers and cupboards with sliding or hinged doors.

Mid Century Modern is enormously popular and original authentic furniture can sometimes be found on ebay, in charity and specialist shops. Graphic and geometric fabrics and wallpapers following the trend by Orla Kiely can be found online and there are plentiful furniture reproductions online also.


