

JoJo relocates across the road

Owner, and village resident, Jo Dennis is very happy with the move. "The team and I are very excited to be in the new premises – which provides a staggering four times as much space as our previous shop!"

Commemorative sculpture to come at cemetery

During the last century more than 500 stillborn babies or those who died within 24 hours of birth were buried in a large unmarked communal grave area in Cuckfield churchyard.

In the past, hospitals were responsible for the burial of stillborn babies, and in this case it was Cuckfield District Hospital.

Cuckfield Parish Council decided the communal graveyard of these babies should be recognised, and is working towards commissioning a commemorative installation to reflect this.

Sam Heynes, from the council, said: "We hope a commemorative bench, positioned in the unmarked babies graveyard, will provide a place to sit and reflect within this peaceful setting."

The Parish Council has submitted a grant application for £3,000 to cover the cost and installation of a commemorative bench. This project has touched the hearts of the community of Mid Sussex, and for some this might be the first time they have become aware of the plans to recognise the babies through the commemorative installation.

New exhibit donated by ex-Copper





Boxing clever for Cubs

What is a box cart?

A typical soap-box cart is made of a wooden chassis and has four wheels, arranged as a fixed rear axle and a steerable front beam axle – usually with a very simple single central pivot. A seat is arranged at the back, and perhaps the seat area is enclosed, as in the original soap-box design. More sophisticated designs might employ a fully enclosed wooden body. The types of wheels employed vary according to what can be obtained easily – wheels from pushchairs, prams and discarded bicycles being common. Ready-made wheels are also available from hardware suppliers. Steering is typically actuated using a rope connected to the ends of the steerable beam.

Introduction

Spring is here and the bulbs are coming up in the lawns and flower beds around the Village. Heyworth Ride should have lots of flowers this spring. The landscape contractors cleared the overgrown brambles in Foundry Brook, the woodland between Lower Village and Brooklands. Daffodils have begun to appear in areas where brambles once grew two metres high. We are hoping some bluebells will also flourish in the same area.

Major Decorations project in 2018

The surveyors have completed the tendering process for the major works. There are 30 blocks of flats to be decorated this summer. We are in consultation with all Leaseholders who are affected by the works. For most blocks, reserve funds are in place to cover the cost of these works.

The works will start in May/June and they will take around four months to complete. The plan is for contractors to work on two or three blocks at the same time. They cannot move on to other blocks until they have the works signed off by the surveyors. This will reduce the disruption and assist with monitoring the project progress.

All the lamp posts, seats and bollards around the Co-Op shop will also be painted. Further communication will be sent to those affected in due course.

Gardens and Landscaping

The grass cutting season has begun and the landscape contractors will cut the grass every two weeks. The plan for hedge cutting will be published on the bulletin board.

With regards to weed spraying, the areas for which BVCIC is responsible will be sprayed by one contractor this year. A plan of the areas to be sprayed is on the Bulletin Board.

The garden is open daily between 10am – 5pm.



The Green Tree Gallery, run by Jill Housby and Cuckfield resident Samantha Phillips, has just launched a new spring exhibition supporting Sussex children's hospice, Chestnut Tree House. In order to raise awareness of the charity's work in Mid Sussex, the exhibition is titled 'Through the Eyes of a Child' and was recently opened by local MP Sir Nicholas Soames.

The exhibition is the focal point of the gallery's year-long support of the charity and is a fitting way to celebrate the gallery's 10th birthday. Jayne Todd, community fundraiser at Chestnut Tree House, said: "It is really exciting working with Sam and Jill throughout this year, as we also celebrate our 15th birthday in 2018."

As on all its exhibition launch days this year, the gallery donated 10% of all sales to the children's hospice in Arundel, which serves the whole of East and West Sussex. "We were invited to visit Chestnut Tree House," Sam explained, "and it was a truly uplifting experience." Jill continued: "Every detail is thought of. It really is like a home from home for the children and their families, and a place where they can all have fun. It really challenged our understanding of what a hospice is."

The Green Tree Gallery was started in 2008 by a group of Sussex artists, including Cuckfield resident and sculptor Julie Janvrin, as a platform for local artists and makers, a principle which continues to this day. "The majority of our artists and makers are from Sussex," Sam explained. "The gallery really is a community space to showcase their work."

One of the Gallery's long-standing artists is David Fawcett, who has donated the painting above to be sold in aid of Chestnut Tree House. Other artists whose work is part of the exhibition include Sally Scott, Emma Bird and Iveta Goddard (whose ceramic clocks were featured in the TV series The Great Pottery Throw Down).

"By showcasing this bright and colourful body of work, we hope that the observer will be reminded of their own

childhood experiences of the wonder and beauty of the natural world and gain an appreciation of the hospice's work," said Jill.

Charity events have always been an important part of the gallery's remit, and last year its annual Macmillan coffee morning raised almost £1,200.

With plenty of free, easy parking right outside the door, visiting The Green Tree Gallery is certainly convenient. Its location, just outside the entrance to Borde Hill Garden, allows visitors to combine a browse with an on-site coffee and cake at Cafe Elvira. Alongside the art and sculpture pieces, the gallery offers an everchanging array of unusual, and often unique, gifts to suit all budgets, including cards, jewellery and toys.

"We have always tried to tread the fine line between being a formal art gallery with great artwork and, at the same time, being a friendly, accessible place where you can track down the perfect gift, or even just a greetings card. Hopefully, we've got the balance right," said Sam.

It will be 100 years on 11th November this year since the end of World War I. The Great War, and also known, wrongly with hindsight, as the War To End All Wars. This horrific bloodbath took the precious young lives of more than nine million soldiers while a further 21 million were wounded.

Cuckfield at that time had a population of around 2,000. Of the 462 men went to the war, 81 never returned.

We will remember them here in Cuckfield at all times, but especially on the century weekend in November.


Plans are already underway for memorial activities. Our beautiful churches, Holy Trinity and the Baptist Church, will provide ideal venues for a community concert and performances by our local thespians. There is even a special anthem being written by two gifted members of our community in preparation to commemorate this anniversary.

The well documented Christmas Eve football match between 'the enemies' might well be re-enacted, and a tea dance set up in the Queen's Hall, inviting couples to waltz and foxtrot, tango and one-step to dance music of the time, then glide gracefully to feast on always fashionable tea and cake.

Watch out for a trail of photographs of First World War soldiers around the village and the lit portraits that will be on display in the heart of the High Street.

It could be your house that hosts one of these memories, as history, carefully stored in Cuckfield Museum, reveals past lives of both men and women from the village who contributed significantly to the war effort.

As darkness falls on Sunday 11th November, the village will join the rest of the country by lighting our beacon to commemorate the end of this war a century ago and remember those



who sacrificed their lives for us in this brutal conflict.

Your help and support is still much needed.

The village Quiz Master

VILLAGE PEOPLE

Lveryone knows me as Nick but on the shows I went for Nicholas, as a tribute to my parents and my northern family."



Nick Flindall could never have imagined that when he first picked up a copy of Len Deighton's novel The lpcress File back in 1962 that would lead, four decades later, to him appearing on national television being grilled on that very book in front of millions of viewers.

In fact, if the weather had been a little kinder in the winter of 1962/63, Nick – instead of reading that novel – might have been playing professional football and his life taken a very different path.

Instead, the career path Nick took was to become an accountant – which brought about his move to Cuckfield. And an unshakeable obsession with the 'Harry Palmer' novels of Len Deighton that brought about his appearance on his favourite quiz show to become the village's very own Mastermind.

Born in Morecambe, Nick moved to Surbiton when he was seven and grew up playing and loving sport, particularly football. At university he played for England Universities in a team including Bob Wilson, later to play for Arsenal and Scotland, and George Davies, who became a retail mogul of Next and George at Asda.

"I signed as a professional footballer with Stourbridge in the Birmingham League," he said, "but the desperately severe winter of that year put an end to an imminent move to a League Club, and I returned south and commenced studying for accountancy qualifications.

"I also played cricket for Worcester Park, and I played

both against and with a number of Fulham footballers including Bobby Robson – a lovely man, and a highly competitive cricketer, too! A young Rodney Marsh, an older Johnny Haynes and many other internationals were in their side.

"I met my wife to be, Jill, in Wales, and moved to Aberystwyth, where I spent three very happy seasons playing for Aberystwyth Town, including a Welsh Cup tie against a Cardiff City side with a rising young star called John Toshack ...whatever happened to him?"

Nick and Jill subsequently arrived in Cuckfield in 1976 after he landed a job with American Express, which was then based in Haywards Heath before its move to the brand new 'Wedding Cake' building in Edward Street Brighton – which itself was recently demolished.

The couple lived in Woodhall Close for 30 years, and their children, Sarah and David, were both born in the old Cuckfield Hospital and went to school at Warden Park.

His love of football remained and he played a couple of games for Cuckfield and later coached one of the Cuckfield Cosmos Junior sides for a couple of seasons.

As the legs grew older, the mind continued to expand and a new challenge arose – to appear on Mastermind. One night Nick took the plunge. He remembers it well. "In a moment of slightly tipsy, late-night, online bravado, having completed an application form for Mastermind, I pressed the submit button," he said.

"My first choice of specialist subject was, of course, The Harry Palmer novels of Len Deighton. To my

amazement – and delight – I was asked for audition and then accepted for the show.

"In preparation I read and re-read the books, scoured the internet, made assiduous notes, and prepared my own 'Deighton File'. It was a labour of love. I never tired of them and found many hidden gems which had escaped me previously."

And so came the big day. Was he nervous?

"Nerves? Not many," he said. "The programme was filmed at the Granada Studios in Manchester in front of a live audience including my wife and son. I was first up and I got off to a good start, getting 15 out of 16 which put me in the lead after the first round.

"That meant I went last in the final round, and I had to beat a score of 22 to win. I didn't know how I was doing, I was focused totally on the questions. It goes really quickly and if I didn't know the answer straight away I passed. The buzzer went and John Humphries read out my score. I got 23. Which meant I'd earned a place in the semi-finals."

That did not go quite as well. Nick's specialist

subject that time was Robert Maxwell and, up against some top-notch opposition (including that year's eventual Mastermind winner), ended up coming an honourable fourth.

Undaunted, Nick decided he would try to appear on his two other favourite quiz shows, Brain of Britain and Fifteen to One.

"To get on Brain of Britain I had to answer 20 questions over the telephone, and I did really well. But on the show itself I was more Brainless of Britain ... although I was in the heat won by the eventual winner of the title. Mark Grant.

I did obtain recompense there, as my Listeners Question was selected for a special broadcast the following year and defeated the combined team of previous 'Brain of Britain' winners.

"I was also successful at getting on to Fifteen to One. The first programme I was on I had only one life left, but defended it six times and got down to the last four contestants. I lost on the final question about a flower linked with Greek Mythology and I said Narcissus, which wasn't a bad guess but the correct answer was Hyacinth, which I would never have got.

"I appeared in three shows – all filmed in one day in Glasgow – I did OK in the first two, I was fourth in one and fifth in the other, but by the third show I was exhausted and didn't do so well. Sandi Toksvig, the host, was really friendly and I had a great day."

So are there plans to appear on any more quiz shows, TV or radio? "Absolutely not," said Nick. "I've definitely quit. They were the three programmes that were attractive to me and I've done them.

"I was just pleased to get on, particularly Mastermind.

I thought it would be interesting to see how the show is put together, and it was – that was as enjoyable as competing.

"The editing team have to ensure everything is 'in the can' before the contestants are allowed to go home on the day... no replays! I had to redo the initial walk from my seat down to the Black Chair and sit in it differently for the introductory shot, as my initial position would not allow the rather long title of The Harry Palmer Novels of Len Deighton together with Nicholas Flindall, Retired Accountant, to fit properly on to the screen.

"Everyone knows me as Nick but on the shows I went for Nicholas, as a tribute to my parents and my northern family, as that was what they always called me. I would have loved my parents to have seen me appear on those particular programmes."

Nick's quiz exploits also brought an unexpected bonus. A message from his hero, Len Deighton.

"Early in the year following the transmission of Mastermind it was Len's 80th Birthday," said Nick. "I sent an email, via his publishers, congratulating him on

that milestone, mentioning my Mastermind appearance and how much I had admired the books over so many years. I was thrilled and touched he wrote back personally from the USA, and later signed some mementos of the programme and other photographs."

Now Nick is dusting off the reference books as he prepares to host a charity quiz night at the Woodside in Bolnore Village later this month.

He will be setting the questions to help his daughter and son-in-law raise their target of £3,000 for Action for Conservation as they run in

next month's London Marathon.

He has promised to go easy (well, reasonably easy) on the participants after being on the receiving end of severe grillings from John Humphreys, Russell Davies and Sandi Toksvig.

"I really enjoy setting the questions," said Nick.
"Hopefully I set it with the audience in mind and I try to
set it so there is an average of around 70 per cent of
right answers."

Savoury bread and butter pudding (Serves 3-4)

Cut the crusts off 6 large slices of fresh (or 1 day old) bread and lightly spread with butter, plus a little mustard if wished. Top three slices generously with thinly sliced ham and grated or thinly sliced cheese – Gruyere is especially delicious. Top with the remaining three slices of bread and cut into triangles. Arrange in a shallow buttered dish slightly overlapping, like roof tiles. Whisk

together 2 large eggs with 600ml full fat milk, or single cream, and seasoning. Pour through a sieve over the bread. Cover and refrigerate for 45 min - 1 hour.

Preheat the oven 170°. Uncover and bake for 45-60 min or until just set and golden brown. Serve freshly baked.

Our familiar loaf of bread, which we take for granted, has been around for a long time. One of the principal forms of food from the very earliest times, a milling stone dating from the Stone Age, 7,500 years ago, shows evidence of grinding primitive seeds and grains. Bread making is one of the earliest crafts known to man, with evidence from Egyptian tombs. The British Museum has loaves made over 5,000 years ago. A bit stale by now!

Fast forward a few years – to July 7th 1928 and to Des Moines, Iowa where a jeweller had invented the first mechanical bread slicer. By 1933 80% of the bread made in the USA was sold ready-sliced. I am not a home baker – I would probably eat too much of it! Our mutual friend Katie Stewart made fantastic loaves, all kneaded by hand. Her kitchen smelt heavenly on baking days.



There is nothing to beat a well buttered slice of very fresh bread, but it can also form the basis of some delicious, inexpensive main dishes, perfect for chilly days. Bread and Butter Pudding is that wonderful quivering baked combination of creamy custard, bread and fruit certainly not to be confused with the rather more solid mixture called Bread Pudding. Rather than being a vehicle for stale bread ends, this humble pudding now comes made with every conceivable type of bread - I have used that delicious Italian Christmas bread, pannetonne, brioche and croissants – it is even said to be Prince Charles' favourite pudding, and his chef includes a liberal addition of whisky. Be adventurous and try this savoury version.

Stuffed french toast

In the USA French toast is made with thick slices of fresh bread (no filling), served with crisp rashers of bacon and a drizzle of maple syrup. My recipe is a bit more substantial.

Using soft sliced bread make sandwiches generously filled with butter and your chosen filling – grated cheese, sliced soft cheese, ham, crisp bacon, canned salmon or tuna (could be mixed with a little mayonnaise) – whatever you fancy.

In a shallow pie plate beat 1 egg with 300ml milk (enough for 2-3 sandwiches). Dip each sandwich in this, coating both sides.

Heat a good knob of butter in a fry pan and cook the sandwiches until a rich golden brown on both sides. Cut into quarters and eat piping hot.

For a sweet version, traditionally called 'Poor Knights of Windsor', try a filling of jam and thinly sliced bananas. Yummy!





Beautiful daffs

FLOWER TIPS

Marie Curie holds its 'Get Behind the Daffodil' campaign every March, and Chez Fleur has been busy selling prettily wrapped bunches to raise money for the charity. Daffodils are such a lovely inexpensive way to bring a bit of cheer during the cold weeks of winter and they truly do herald the arrival of Spring!

Daffodils look great just placed in a jug, but below I show you something a little different using a floral pinholder and a small tapas dish. Pinholders are a great eco-friendly alternative to floral foam because unlike foam they can be used again and again!

Here's what you will need*

Small black tapas dish (or similar small sided dish) One bunch British daffodils

12-15 small black pebbles

1" diameter floral pinholder

Floral tac (similar to blue tack but waterproof)
Small length of yellow ribbon or raffia

Scissors – we recommend carbon blade florist scissors *all items available from Chez Fleur, contact Belinda@ chezfleur.co.uk for details

How to make

- Secure the pinholder to the centre of the tapas dish with a small piece of the tac
- Tie a ribbon around the daffodils about half way up
- Cut the daffodils to same length and holding them firmly secure the stems to the pin holder
- Add a small amount of water and top up as necessary
- Add decorative river stones around the base of the dish

Tip: when securing the pin holder ensure that the dish is bone dry and not too cold otherwise it will not stick. Once the pinholder is in place there is no need to remove it – just rinse the dish when the daffodils fade and replace with a new bunch!

When Pavlos Carvalho was a young boy, his father gave him an invaluable tip. The professional cellist told his son, who wished to follow in his footsteps, "even if you're just playing to the birds in the garden you have to do it like you are performing at the Royal Albert Hall."

That philosophy has helped shape Pavlos into one of the finest cellists in the country and also helped him early in his career when audience numbers were not quite what was hoped.

"One time there were 11 in the band and six in the audience," says Pavlos, "but it became one of the best gigs because we invited the audience to sit with us in a big semi-circle and we all loved it."

Such modest turnouts are – thankfully – unlikely now as Pavlos and wife Sarah are both key members of the hugely popular Ensemble Reza group of musicians, who will be performing alongside Horsham Symphony Orchestra at Cuckfield's Holy Trinity Church on 24th March.

Ensemble Reza is celebrating its fifth anniversary, and Sarah and Pavlos, both founder members, are immensely proud of the work they have done in that time.

"When Sarah and I moved down here from London we thought it would be nice to get a group together with friends I'd played with for years, where we don't have to go up to London to rehearse," says Pavlos.

"The first concert was great, we knew so many people

that came, it was all so personal, the rehearsals were all in our homes with food and a glass of wine.

"We got Hannah Carter involved to help manage us, and she has done an amazing job. We didn't expect it to become such a central part of our lives, but now I can turn down offers in London because we have so much work here.

"It's become a whole network of work from education to outreach to community orchestra to going into schools. Hannah is like ten people in one and she's made it all happen, she's amazing."

Pavlos and Sarah met at the Royal College of Music and their home in Haywards Heath is crammed full of musical instruments, including a half size cello as they have successfully passed on the love of playing to their nine year old daughter.

She was hardly likely to escape given that Pavlos has to play his cello every day.

"If he doesn't play he gets grumpy," says Sarah. "I don't need to play every day but he does. It's like a drug for him."

"I grew up hearing the sound of the cello every day," he says, "and you need to touch it every day to sustain it and to be able to play it well. It's part of my daily routine, get up, have breakfast, brush my teeth, and play the cello, even if it's five minutes before I go out. It's just to start whatever kind of day you're going to have with something therapeutic in your head. I always play Bach."

The couple laugh and josh each other gently. "Bach had 20 children, you know," says Pavlos. "But I'm not modelling all of my life on Bach. Sarah wouldn't allow me to, not sure why! How hard can it be? We've had two children, what's another 18?"

Pavlos's devotion has brought his reward – with an invitation to play with the Royal Philharmonic this year at Guildford Cathedral. Even though he didn't quite believe it when the world-famous orchestra first got in touch.

"I was at the train station and I got an email asking if I'd like to play an Elgar Concerto with the RPO. I immediately phoned Sarah. She asked 'Are you sure it's not the Romford Philharmonic?'

"So I sent an email back asking is this from the Romford and they replied, 'NO! It's the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.'

"It's strange, I'd just made the decision not to do any



more concertos because of all the hours you have to rehearse alone and then that email arrived.

"Guildford cathedral is gorgeous. Playing Elgar, one of the greatest English cello concertos with one of the greatest orchestras is going to be amazing. You can't waste time being anxious about it, you have to absorb it and enjoy it because it may never happen again."

Before then it's Cuckfield to play a Spring Concert featuring Elgar's Cello Concerto in one of their favourite venues.

"We love Holy Trinity Church," says Sarah. "It has a beautiful sound. It's quite a big church, so, especially when it fills up, there's a very warm atmosphere."

"When we rehearse there it can be a bit boomy and muddy," said Pavlos, "but when it fills up it's almost like a perfect acoustic. Now they have a new baby grand piano it's even better.

"They haven't had a concert with an orchestra there for five years because of space issues. But this is such a tempting programme I think they just said yes and we'll figure out the space later."



Making the most of a small space

DESIGN AT HOME

Small cramped spaces in your home, such as a tiny hall, study, living room or bedroom, can feel uninviting or unwelcoming. If there isn't enough space to work, sit or welcome guests what can you do if bashing down a wall between two rooms to create a larger interior isn't an option? Luckily there are a few tricks to make a space look bigger. Here are some ideas and suggestions that will help to make the most of a small space in your home.

Declutter, removing small items as these will contribute to the feeling of a small space. These can be kept inside a clever piece of storage such as a footstool with a lid that doubles up as a coffee table when a tray is added. Bespoke fitted furniture increases available floor space.

It's tempting to paint a small interior in white to reflect light to magnify the space, but by using trendy bold colours for depth and cosiness, such as a dark blue or red with accent dark and pale grey neutrals, the space will look balanced, cosy and larger. Test the tones in different lights to obtain the right effect. To increase the illusion of higher walls, contrast a dark wall with a pale ceiling to draw the eye upwards. It also helps to paint the skirting board the same colour as the wall.

Let interiors flow together by using the same flooring throughout, which will give the illusion of expanding the small space. Swap bulky sofas and armchairs for those with delicate legs allowing more light through to stretch out the floor. A glass table will have the same effect. For a larger project a fabulous glass staircase would open out a small hall beautifully.

In a small living room, place the TV on the wall and replace a gallery wall composed of small pictures with a large picture. Put seating around the coffee table rather than against walls.

Use mirrors to expand an interior. A large mirror filling one wall will reflect space and light to create the illusion of a larger space. Mirrored sliding doors on a wardrobe is a good option.

Consider the lighting as it can achieve fabulous results in a small space. A single pendant lamp hanging from the ceiling will just appear to flatten the small interior, whereas pockets of light from table lamps and wall lights help to expand the space. A floor lamp could replace table lamps. A track lighting system with LEDs with the lamps pointing at different locations is the way to go. The track lamps pointed to the wall, ceiling and feature areas will do wonders to achieve your goal.

For a narrow bathroom or kitchen, rectangular metro wall tiles work very well in stretching out the interior and add structure to the corners.

By making a few changes like adding a mirror, painting a few walls or replacing some furniture your small interior will look magnified.
