

Welcome the new Mayor

The new Mayor of Cuckfield will be announced on Friday 18th October after the final votes have been counted at 10pm. The excitement starts at 8.30pm and election night is kindly being hosted this year by The Wheatsheaf Pub, Cuckfield. Every penny raised by the candidates counts as a vote, so the more they raise the more chance they have of winning. This year's result is just too close to call at the moment but all the money raised will be distributed to a host of local groups and charities.

Once the winning candidate has recovered from their celebrations, their first Mayoral task will be the Mayor's Procession on Saturday 19th October. With marching bands and colourful floats, the procession is truly the highlight of the Independent State of Cuckfield's year. The procession sets off at 2.15pm from Warden Park School, along London Lane, around Brainsmead and eventually reaching the Talbot in the High Street at around 3.15pm. It is here that the Sheriff of Cuckfield will officially present the new Mayor with the keys to the town.

There's always a party atmosphere on the high street with music, plus special entertainment for the kids by Poppies Parties. So make sure you come out to welcome the new Mayor, cheer the procession on and join in the celebration on the high street. It's not too late to take part in the procession. Bonfire and Fireworks Sat 2nd Nov

Cuckfield Bonfire Society (CBS) will hosts its annual event in just a few weeks time: Saturday 2nd November at Cuckfield Park.

The giant bonfire will be lit by the newly elected mayor of Cuckfield at 6.45pm. Also featured on the fire will be Guys made by pupils of Holy Trinity School.

At 7.30pm spectators are treated to a professional firework display set to music.

CBS has always supported local charities and this year the beneficiaries will be Cuckfield's Holy Trinity School, Woodlands Meed School and the disability charity Kangaroos, based in Haywards Heath.



A spokesperson for the bonfire society explained: "We couldn't put on this event without the support not only of the professional companies we employ for security and fireworks but also over 45 volunteers who help with car parking and marshalling. We are also very grateful, of course, to the Mayou family for allowing us to use their beautiful grounds."

The organisers expect to host around 6,000 people on the night, where they will also be able to make use of numerous food and drink vendors on site (there is a strict no alcohol policy).

Admission to the event is just £25 for a family ticket (2 adults, 3 children), £8 per adult and £5 for under 16s. On site car parking is available, at a cost of £2. Gates open at 5.30pm on Saturday 2nd November.

Classy comedies come to Cuckfield

Cuckfield Dramatic Society's autumn show at the end of the month is a comedy double bill to keep us feeling good even as the days lengthen. Whether you have heard of the playwrights or not, the shared comedic theme of battles between the sexes is something everyone will enjoy.

The Bear by Anton Chekhov is about a very angry man trying to collect a debt from a weeping young widow while her loyal retainer tries to both cheer her up and throw him out. It's all mirth and no melodrama as two very stubborn people get hot under the collar about money and marriage.

Also known for realistic long dramas Chekhov was also a prize winning writer of short stories and plays, including collections of humorous ones, and he is still considered to be a master of that form. The Bear is subtitled A Joke in

Director Hazelle Woodhurst says it's a hilarious play – a classic about an archetypal man and woman with some wonderful comic timing. Chekhov it may be but this Russian farce is more Carry on Comrade than heavy drama!

Fumed Oak by Noel Coward is set in 1930s Clapham where Henry Gow is fed up with his whiny daughter, moaning mother-in-law and demanding wife. But he has a secret and soon it will be out...



Despite being known for plays about high society and having one of the poshest voices ever 'born and bred in the suburbs of London' Coward also wrote about ordinary people, and in Fumed Oak horribly funny ones too!

Mind Awareness Day event to exercise and entertain

Well-known Cuckfield yoga teacher Diana Laker-Fullilove has a personal experience of the debilitating illness of mental health but is doing something this month to raise awareness of the

condition.

It took five years of courage and determination for Diana to regain her life from one of living in the shadows to that of a confident person teaching yoga and fitness in front of packed classes 15 times a week. She realised, that if we are to improve the situation at a localised level it must also involve people at a local level.

Last year she created an event which raised £2,400 for the mental health charity Mind. This year

Di is stepping up her game and is hosting a larger event at Clair Hall, Haywards Heath on Saturday 19th October timed to coincide with Mind Awareness Day. This event will be a fundraiser for Mind and bereavement support charity Oscar's Wish Foundation.

During the morning Di will be sharing her own story publicly, running a raffle with prizes from local

businesses and participants will experience a YOGADi yoga flow class with an infusion of pilates, followed by a Les Mills Body Balance class and the morning will close

with a gentle, calming yoga and mindfulness class - the perfect way to end your morning and leave relaxed and ready for your weekend!

Cuckfield estate agent Richard Butler started cycling in 2014. He wanted to increase his overall fitness but also was keen to ultimately take on a personal challenge.

During this time Richard's father had been suffering from Parkinson's disease for a number of years. It was at this juncture in his life that he decided to begin training for the London to Paris bike ride in aid of Parkinson's UK. On the 15th September Richard completed the cycle ride and in the process managed to raise £4,200 for the charity.



In 2016 Richard began

training again, but this time his journey would take him from Lands End to John O'Groats. However, due to a badly damaged shoulder, Richard had to withdraw from the event at the last minute. Nonetheless, he still managed to raise a healthy sum of £2,606 for the Parkinson's UK cause.

A couple of years after Richard's attempt to finish the 2016 cycle ride his dad sadly passed away. In memory of that goal, he became determined to complete the task that he had started back in 2014.

Last month Richard finally completed the Lands End to John O'Groats ride for Parkinson's UK. In the process Richard managed to successfully raise a further £2,818. This now leaves the running total raised by Richard for Parkinson's UK at a staggering £9,606.

Richard explains just how getting to that finish line made him feel: "It was amazing and an experience I shall never, ever forget. Nothing can quite prepare you for it. The physical and mental exhaustion that you feel is one I have never felt before. And that's not all you go through. It's an emotional journey too but the moment you cross that finish line and finally achieve that long-awaited goal you realise just how lucky and privileged you are to have taken part in something so important."

Help for the homeless

Members of the Outreach Team at Holy Trinity Church in Cuckfield held an appeal to help the homeless last month in support of local charity Open House Crawley.

Ian Wilkins, Fundraising and Relationship
Manager of Open House, had this to say about the
fundraiser: "Crawley Open House has been on the
front line serving the homeless and vulnerable of
Crawley and West Sussex for 24 years. It covers
a huge swathe of West and Mid Sussex. No one
locally does more to stand alongside those who
have fallen or are falling through the cracks in
society, for whatever reason."

Last year the charity managed to resettle around 60% of hostel residents to somewhere more permanent. There were over 24,000 support appointments for residents, day centre users and those staying on the streets.

Crawley Open House is a medium-sized independent charity and relies heavily on the generosity of local Trusts, places of worship, schools, individuals and companies. They receive some statutory funding but are working hard to diversify their income streams so as not to be too dependent on it in an uncertain political and economic climate.


Beauty treatments now available at Honeycomb



Tickets cost £10 for adults and £5 for under 16s and are available via eventbrite.co.uk: search 'To War with God Havwards Heath'.








The bass guitar is often described as the instrument that no one really notices, yet the sound it creates is the beating heart of any rhythm section. From Sir Paul McCartney's left-handed pop, through John Paul Jones' bluesy rock to Flea's slap-happy funk, the bass guitar can be a varied and interesting beast. The same can be said for the bass player too.

Cuckfield resident, music lover and bass player George Budd (aka the B.O.D father) plays as part of a seven piece line-up called Band of Dads. The bass guitar was not the first instrument that George picked up either. As a young boy he learnt to play both the cornet and the euphonium. Now, some forty years later, George's instrument of choice is the bass guitar.



"In all honesty I don't

know what it was that made me want to play the bass," he explained. "All I remember was that I loved the sound that it made so I bought one and taught myself how to play. The rest, as they say, is history."

The story behind B.O.D is that it was initially created for fun. Primarily it consisted of dads (i.e. those who had children!) that missed playing music and who could afford the time to jam together. Luckily most of the band members have a similar taste in music. Preference ranges from 60s and 70s rock and roll through to more modern 'singalong' songs.

"For most of our band members it's about being able to juggle work and family in the hope that we can find the space, somewhere, in our busy lives to enjoy making music. Ultimately, that's what it's all about."

But what about that name?

"We spent a bit of time trying to come up with a decent name. There were some real odd humdingers being thrown around, but I wanted something that people could connect with. Now, whenever we play, members of the band wear our branded t-shirt, and you'll often see people in the audience wearing them too."

Originally from London, George has lived in Cuckfield now for over 20 years, so he knows the community well. He is very much part of village life and over the years has been involved in many fundraising activities.

"We played at Haywards Heath Rugby Club in August as part of their Festival of Rugby to help to raise funds for their much needed new clubhouse. Last month we played the Lindfield Arts Festival for the third time. Most of what we do is linked to the village or surrounding area, so if we can play our music and support the community at the same time then it's a win-win all round."

B.O.D have got big plans for the rest of this year and beyond. They are scheduled to play an event at The Queen's Hall on 16th November. They have also been asked to perform at the Wivelsfield Green Bonfire Night and will be playing the Savannah Bar in Haywards Heath in November too.

"The event we are playing at The Queen's Hall comes after the Mayoral elections and before Christmas, so it's the right time for all of our supporters to come and watch us. This year will be our third year. It's an annual event and any funds raised will go towards the Mayoral Fund."

Band of Dads mainly play cover songs. They have one original composition but mostly their set lists are made up of classic numbers from the 1950s through to the modern day. George's biggest musical influences are The Beatles and The Jam, but ask him to play something by The Strokes or Blur and he will be equally enthusiastic and adept.

"We play a big mix of covers and at our shows we always like to include a few special guests. Last year we had a couple of members from the rugby club join us on stage who played the bagpipes to ACDC. They were dressed in kilts and B.O.D t-shirts. A very elegant look!"

It is clear that George loves his life in Cuckfield. The time and effort he spends supporting the local community appears to give him a lot of joy, notwithstanding the fact that he is able to combine his love for music whilst giving something back to the community at the same time.

"We are like a big family now and it's not just the band. It's everyone around us. That's what this thing has become and we're hoping it will continue to grow."

What about the future, and where would George like to see the band headed?

"Well, we've already created a B.O.D in East Grinstead with new band members from the nearby area. The aim with that now is to try and attract a wider following. I put a post up on Facebook a few months ago in the hope that we might gather some interest to start up a new arm of B.O.D, and I could not believe the response. It turns out that a lot of people want to join us."

For George, a fundamental part of what he and his fellow band members believe is that they support each other and that includes any bright young (or old) thing that may want to join them on their quest for rock stardom.

"Having a bank of musicians who want to be part of this franchise, so to speak, means a bit of juggling but it gives others the opportunity to play and perform at more of our gigs. If that helps us to get our name out there and we can raise some money for charity at the same time then we've achieved our goal."

This year the band are planning to pick three national charities that mean something to each of them, and a percentage of their takings will go to those chosen charities. B.O.D has also just received sponsorship from a brewery in Brighton that is going to supply beer for the event at The Queen's Hall in November. This will result in less overheads and more money being available for the charities.

Band of Dads rarely charge a penny for people to attend their gigs. They just want people to show up, offer their support and have a good time.

"That's the beauty of what we do. We do it for a genuine love of people who live here and community spirit in general."

RECYCLE THIS...

Colin McFarlin is a Volunteer Waste Prevention Advisor with West Sussex County Council and sheds some light on what can and can't be recycled.

Thank you for all your enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails. Do keep the questions coming...

Plastic recycling is the most frequent question in my post bag and topic of questions when I am out giving a talk.

So, what plastic can I recycle?

If it has come from your bathroom or kitchen and if it is a bottle then YES. Clean, dry and loose please with the tops removed. The tops are too small for our mechanised sorting. Place tops in the rubbish bin or give to charity.



Is it a tub or a tray then YES. Again, clean, dry and loose and with tops separate. To be big enough for sorting, top needs to be jam jar lid size or greater. We want all colours, as you can see. We can recycle black plastic in West Sussex, we have the technology!

And now for some of the

We can recycle take away coffee cups and lids in West Sussex. We can recycle 'Tetra Packs', even with windows and can recycle window envelopes.

Finally I would like to mention batteries – do NOT

put these into your rubbish bin or into your recycling bin. You can take them back to any shop that sells batteries. By law they must take them back, although there is no need to take them back to the same shop you bought them from.

I do hope that with this information and these pictures I have helped to make recycling simple.

Golden Charter



No Fat, No Sugar Mincemeat

(Makes about 2kg)

Into a large bowl put 225g each of sultanas, raisins, currants, chopped ready-to-eat dried figs and apricots. Add 450g peeled, cored and sliced dessert apples and 100g blanched almonds. Stir to combine then tip into the processor and buzz until finely chopped. Return to the bowl and stir in the finely grated rind and juice of 2 unwaxed lemons, the juice of 2 large oranges, 2tbs mixed spice, 150ml clear honey (gently warm first to make mixing easier) and 60ml rum, brandy or whisky. When combined cover, refrigerate and allow to mature for two to three weeks before using. It can then be frozen.

Mincemeat Crumble Cake

Preheat oven 180° and base-line and butter a 23cm cake tin. For the topping rub 50g chilled butter into 75g SR flour to form crumbs. Stir in 50g demerara sugar, a pinch of mixed spice and 50g broken walnuts. Set aside. Beat 115g soft butter with 115g caster sugar, 2 beaten eggs and 3tbs milk until smooth. Sift over 175g SR flour and 1tsp baking powder and stir to combine. Spoon into the baking tin, evenly spoon 450g mincemeat on top then sprinkle with the crumb topping. Bake 45-50 min or until golden brown. For a festive finish, just before serving hot, sift a little icing sugar over the top. When serving cold decorate with a drizzle of lemon glace icing.

I have been teaching or writing about food on both sides of the Atlantic all my professional life and certain recipes get requested just time and time again. This is one of them – a delicious alternative to store-bought mincemeat, which always contains some kind of fat and cane sugar in it. This recipe has neither. As an alternative to mince pies try my Mincemeat Cake, either as cake for tea or warm for dessert – delicious topped with a spoonful of brandy or rum butter. The baked cake can be frozen.

Did you know mincemeat originally contained chopped meats along with the fruits and spices, and ancient cookbooks tell us it was used to fill one enormous pie dish and was called 'The Christmas Pie'. It was probably flavoured with rosemary, the herb of remembrance, to honour the Virgin Mary. An enchanting legend tells how a rosemary bush spread its branches for her to dry her baby clothes on during the flight to Egypt.

A pot of the Cranberry and Raspberry Relish would make a delicious Christmas gift. Brandy Butter freezes very successfully, so make ahead then allow to thaw at room temperature.

Cranberry and Raspberry Relish

(Makes about 300ml)

In a small pan stir 1 small finely chopped onion into 3tbs red wine vinegar and cook, stirring, over low heat one to two minutes until soft. Stir in 4tbs orange marmalade, 1tbs finely grated fresh ginger and 250g each fresh or frozen cranberries and raspberries (if frozen no need to defrost). Continue to cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until the fruits have softened (the cranberries will pop) and the mixture has thickened slightly. Tip into a freezer container, cool then freeze. Serve at room temperature.

Brandy Butter

With a wooden spoon beat 75g butter until pale and soft. Gradually beat in 75g caster sugar then, a few drops at a time, 2-3tbs brandy. Beat well after each addition to avoid the sauce curdling. It should be silky in texture. Fither serve chilled or freeze until wanted.

So reads the plaque opposite the feather bench under the Wellingtonia tree in Holy Trinity churchyard. The dedication ceremony of this art installation by Christian Funnell, the Sussex sculptor, took place on Saturday September 28th on a blustery albeit beautiful autumn afternoon. Around one hundred people, familiar and unfamiliar, gathered together to witness the ceremony and remember the stillborn babies buried in unmarked graves in the churchyard, and to recognise this permanent memorial.

Marie Dormer, the instigator of this moving project, began the ceremony by reciting 'Hope is a thing with feathers' by Emily Dickinson. Andrew Symonds reminded us about the special journey that this poignant remembrance has formulated. Finally Father Michael Maine closed the ceremony by reminding us of the extreme love for these tiny souls and the constant need of such a significant memorial.

The consecrated ground of Cuckfield churchyard is a sanctuary for many people. A place where they can walk and sit in peace and tranquility. Where they can enjoy the beauty of Holy Trinity Church, the awesome views of the South Downs and value the loving care given both publicly and privately to this sacred ground where the spirit of the past lingers so powerfully. It can also generate introspection, an awareness of time and a sharp realisation that we are finite beings. Neil Oliver, the Scottish archaeologist, historian and broadcaster, says that it is this that makes us human.

On her last visit to Cuckfield, Kay D'Arcy, the late mother of village resident Simon D'Arcy, was overwhelmed by the potent qualities she felt while in the churchyard.

Kay was a midwife for most of her life and must have delivered many babies. Some who grew up and lived full and healthy lives and some who were deprived of life at birth or lived only for a short space of time. Her poetic questions do, therefore, seem poignantly appropriate.

Many will appreciate a permanent memorial to the babies buried in Cuckfield churchyard and be comforted to know that there is a shrine where they can contemplate and remember the tragically short lives of their much loved babies.

Before she returned to her home in America, Kay recorded her poetic thoughts by asking questions for all of us.

How sleep the dead beneath the snow In Cuckfield when the North wind blows?

And do they stretch when Spring's warm rain Brings blossoms to the verdant land With memories, which once had been immersed, Rising like a mist engulfing the flower-filled vale?

> Does the Summer's stifling heat invade their beds As overhead the Spring sown seeds Ripen to lavish fulfilment to the sun?

Then the harvest; Autumn's glorious show
With scents of swollen iris and wealth of gathered
crops.

Are they aware, and does their essence rise To bless each rivulet, each stone, each clod That makes this place a marvel to the eyes.

We'll never know till death's still hand Enables us to know this promised land.

Be afraid, be very afraid

If you're looking for a balanced article about house
spiders being misunderstood animals that actually help
to keep our homes free of flies, then you're dealing
with the wrong man. My name's Michael and I'm
arachnophobic. I know, I know. It's completely irrational.
They are totally harmless. So why, when I find all other
animals wonderful, do these eight-legged arthropods
make me so terrified that even typing their name sends
an involuntary shiver down my spine?

Is my fear, as evolutionary psychologists believe, an inbuilt self-preservation instinct inherited from the cavemen? Is it a response conditioned by a spider-fearing society? Or is it just because spiders have those creepy, long, hairy legs? All I know is, after researching this article, I'll be sleeping with the lights on till Christmas. I understand that some animals out there actually do have big teeth and need to be feared and respected, but they can be cleverly avoided by not going snorkelling at night in the upper Amazon basin. There is no avoiding spiders. They will find you in the one place you thought was safe. Your home.

There are many spider species which have the audacity to swan into our homes uninvited but the real monsters belong to the genus Tegenaria – the house spiders. These spiders love dark, cool places, so when humans invented 'indoors' they happily followed us inside. There's an easy way to identify the Tegenaria spiders. If you're hyperventilating, swearing and sobbing while stood on a chair then you've found one.

There are five Tegenaria species but the big daddy of the bunch is Tegenaria parietina, also known as The Cardinal Spider (named after Cardinal Wolsey, who apparently lived in fear of one of the eight-legged horrors of Hampton Court creeping up his cassock). Its leg span can reach a whopping five inches.

Tegenaria are most active in the autumn. The mature males scuttle scarily along the skirting board looking for a bigger, even more frightening female. After mating, he dies and then she eats him. A simple relationship but suitably horrific. She'll then saunter around your house, giving you a minor heart attack as she passes by, before finding somewhere dark and cool to hole up until she lays her eggs in the spring. So, to all the spider-lovers out there who come to our rescue with a glass and a bit of card, I salute you. To the rest of us, I have no words of consolation. Oh, and while you were reading this, I think I saw a really big one crawling behind your sofa.






News from Cuckfield Parish

ASSETS, COMMUNITY AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

Feather Bench Ceremony - 28th September 2019 The official opening of the art installation on 28th September was very well attended as over 100 people stood in the cemetery to listen to the short ceremony. The austy wind interspersed with bright sunlight seemed somehow appropriate for the occasion. It was good to see so many people there, united in a common cause, and later chatting over refreshments at the Old School

This project arose from the desire amongst Cuckfield Parish Councillors to provide an art installation to acknowledge the many stillborn babies, and those who only lived a short time, who were born at Cuckfield Hospital and buried in unmarked graves in the cemetery. The burial records from 1855 to the current day are held by the Cemetery Registrar, P & S Gallagher, and some years ago they were digitised so can also be seen at Cuckfield Museum and on the Parish Council website www.cuckfield.gov.uk. They make sad reading and the practice of burying stillborn babies without specific marked graves continued until the 1990s.





Christian Funnell was chosen as the artist after one of our councillors was impressed by his piece 'The Shoal' at Seaford. Christian came to meet councillors in Cuckfield to discuss the project, which is when he suggested the idea of a feather - something that can float freely and has a symbolic meaning in many cultures with spirituality and the soul. We hope that this feather bench will give all those families who grieve a sense of well-being and comfort.

ROADS AND TRAFFIC COMMITTEE London Lane Improvements

The long-awaited improvements to London Lane commenced on 24th July with completion on 30th August. The main work involved the widening of the pavement from around Glebe Road to Chatfield Road. For safety reasons the work was carried out with a road closure in place for this period. SGN were also in London Lane for approximately three weeks to carry out gas main and service replacements. In order to keep traffic flowing, parking restrictions along the diversion route, High Street and Broad Street, were necessary. The diversions and parking restrictions caused some unavoidable inconvenience to residents. Early examination of SID reports suggests there is a slight decrease in the average speeds being witnessed along London Lane since the road re-opened.

Get ready for winter in **Cuckfield**

- Priority two roads will follow once the above are clear in prolonged periods of ice and snow. Other roads will then follow on.
- You will not be sued if you clear snow outside your property to gain access to the road
- Make sure you know where the nearest gritting bin to your property is located. There are thirteen in Cuckfield and all will be filled before the start of winter.
- Be aware of elderly or vulnerable neighbours who may need help with shopping or doctors' appointments.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Mid Sussex District Council is about to commence consultation on its latest Strategic Housing and Economic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHELAA) - part of the agreement with the Planning Inspectorate at the District Plan Examination last year. The District has to find additional houses as a result of the increased target, and Cuckfield, as a Settlement 2 category settlement, is slated as taking an additional 222 dwellings. Following the SHELAA process, the open field adjacent to Horsegate House off Hanlye Lane has been identified as an 'allocated' site and marked as 'developable' for part of this. This goes against the Cuckfield Neighbourhood Plan policies and assessments. Cuckfield Parish Council is therefore currently preparing a response to the consultation on this proposal.

A six week public consultation opened from 9th October 2019. All members of the public who wish to pass comment on this Site Allocation Plan should go to the MSDC website for information (weblink not available at time of going to press). Hundreds of glowing lanterns and torches of fire will bring trees, ponds and woodlands to life at what will be Wakehurst's sixth Glow Wild later next month.



Action Group encourages the switch to green energy

With global climate change in the news daily, heatwaves and drought at home and abroad on an increasing scale, the hottest July date ever recorded, a very wet UK August and now the Amazon ablaze, who would blame people for feeling concerned and worried? Sussex Green Living (SGL) believes that community action can make a real difference across the world. It is a multi-award winning growing green network offering many climate mitigation solutions. Its mission is to inform, empower and inspire people to make more sustainable choices and encourage one world living, now and for future generations.

The group can offer free clean energy advice and an easy switching service, their exciting eco schools work is hugely inspiring and they have masses of good ideas to mitigate climate change effects.

Thanks to the highly popular Repair Café concept (there are good ones in Chailey and Horsham) many items can be repaired, including clothing, electronics and other goods.

On green energy, Catherine Edminson, a volunteer based in Cuckfield says: "What many people do not realise is that wind turbines and solar farms, as well as power stations feed their energy into the National Grid, like rivers running into a big pond. When you switch to clean energy, your supplier guarantees that however much electricity you take out of the 'pond', the same amount of clean energy will be put in. The more people who switch to clean tariffs, the more renewable energy that goes into the pond. This means that the energy sector is producing less pollution and carbon, which is crucial if we are to reduce global warming and climate change."

Governments have been talking about climate change since the early 90s. It is only now that we are seeing fast escalating action, with more than half the UK's principal local authorities having declared a climate emergency in the last eight months.

Carrie Cort, co-founder of the Horsham Repair Café and founder of Sussex Green Living, explains: "Switching to clean energy is part of the solution within everyone's grasp and is the biggest action anyone can take in the fight against climate change." She adds: "Everyone (bar one household) I have helped to switch has saved between £90 and £366 in their first year, so surely it is a no brainer to change?"
