

# Now's a great time to 'have a go' at archery

Every year around 60,000 people participate in archery in the UK. Historically, archery was used for hunting but now it's mainly a competitive sport. Today, both male and female archery teams are preparing for the Olympics which will take place in Tokyo in 2020.

The Archers Club in Cuckfield was established in 2012 and it now has 50 members ranging from the age of ten to 70. The club has a mixed membership of both men and women which also includes whole families and people with disabilities.

The team meet most Sunday afternoons at Warden Park Academy and the group organises a beginners course, which covers everything from range safety, overview of equipment, assembling a bow, technique and how to score. The first session will be on Sunday 24th November.

Course fees are £60 (with a £25 discount on membership if you decide to join). The minimum age for anyone wishing to take part is ten and under 18s must be accompanied by an adult.



# Lest we forget

### **REMEMBERING PEGGY SWAIN**





Every year in November, the nation marks the wars that have scarred the brave men and women who fought in them; and not just those who fought, but what they fought for.

This November, we remember Cuckfield resident Margaret Swain (nee Stuchbury) also known as Peggy or Peg who served as a Wren and Armourer throughout the Second World War loading the guns of 'Seafire' planes.

Peggy lived in Cuckfield most of her life until she died last year at the age of 93. Her daughter, Jane, looks back on Peggy's life in Cuckfield.

"Mum was a feisty lady. To the outside world she always appeared very positive and cheerful but that wasn't always the case. Mum's generation were tough so they were all about keeping a stiff upper lip.

"Mum's childhood, and that of her friends, was probably quite frugal but happy and healthy. When talking about her early days in Cuckfield, she said most of what they ate was homegrown, with some neighbours keeping pigs at the time. My Grandad's motorbike and sidecar was the envy of Mum's friends! Mostly she walked or biked everywhere."

Peggy was born in 1924 in Southsea, Portsmouth. In 1928, when her father came out of the Navy, the family moved to 3 Inholmes in Cuckfield, where they lived for two years before moving to the Old Courthouse in Ockenden lane. The large Georgian house had previously been the workhouse and had a row of outside toilets – or earth closets – all shared by the neighbours.

Jane continues: "I remember Mum telling me that the inside of the house had big flagstone floors and a soup kitchen. Mum and her brother John used to hang out of the upstairs bedroom window to pick the plums off the tree in the garden. She wondered how they didn't fall out!"

Peggy's dad, Ernest worked as a baliff for a firm of solictors in Haywards Heath, collecting debts (a job he disliked) until in the early 1930s he took over the licence at the White Harte pub where they stayed until the mid 1960s.

"Mum was about seven years old when they moved to the pub. The White Harte was the hub for the cricket and football clubs, Grandad being very involved with both. Mum

would be sent off on her bike on a Saturday morning to rally players for the afternoon's match. Another job was filling the bath in the 'club room' at the pub for the referee.

Peggy attended the old school until 1938 when she went to work at Hoadleys Stores (now Nisa), a proper grocers shop where they ground the coffee and used a bacon slicer and a cheese wire. She was involved with almost everything going on in Cuckfield! She swam at Cuckfield bathing pool, belonged to the tennis club and played stoolball too!

"Mum was very popular, particularly being the Landlord's daughter, and during the early war years I think she had a quite a good social life. There were regular dances at The Queen's Hall for the troops stationed in Cuckfield. She particularly remembered the 56th Heavy Regiment RA with fondness."

In 1941 Peggy's father was recalled to the Navy leaving the family behind in Cuckfield.

"Mum was desperate to join the Wrens but she couldn't sign up until she was 17½. John and Peggy were finally allowed to join up in 1942 but that left her mum Daisy to run the pub on her own. Mum always said that her mum worked harder in the pub than the rest of the family away in the Navy but she never complained. She was a very well respected landlady."

Peggy was 18 when she became a wren and was initially stationed in Portsmouth. She also spent time at Henstridge where she met her husband, Jack, a Geordie and a footballer; great news for her father. They married in 1944 at Holy Trinity Church in Cuckfield. Peggy was posted to Ireland and Jack to Australia soon after they married.

When the war ended it was a little while before Jack returned to the UK so Peggy returned to the White Harte. In 1947 Peggy had her first child, Jim, and in 1949 Jane was born. It wasn't long after that they moved out of the pub and into their first house in London Lane.

"That's when Mum became very involved in Cuckfield life. Things like the PTA, the church, cricket and football and also still helping out her parents at the White Harte. She scored for the cricket club into her 80s."

Peggy was also very involved in the British Legion which led on from when she was a Wren and for a period of time was president of the Cuckfield Branch of the Women's British Legion. In addition she was a member of the Cuckfield European Association, a Museum Steward and, having worked as a nurse at Cuckfield Hospital and the Princess Royal for many years, she also belonged to the NHS Retirement Fellowship. Both Peggy and Jack and for that matter Jim and Jane, were very active in the Independent State of Cuckfield (ISOC) over the years. Jack and Jim having both been mayors.

Jane now lives in her mother's old house and, much like Peggy, is very much immersed in community life in the village. Although she moved away for several years, she now feels the strength of her roots in Cuckfield.

Sadly Peggy outlived the men in her life, having lost her brother in 1975, her husband in 1995 and her son in 2015, but she continued to forge on as always. Peggy was a popular figure in Cuckfield. The attendance at her funeral paid testament to this. In the many letters and messages of condolence were these quotes: 'Peggy was a remarkable lady', 'She was one of a kind', 'The rock of utter dependence; she personified her era and anything was possible when she was around', 'She was an institution, an inspiration and an icon'.

Finally Jane sums up thoughts about her mum, Peggy: "Mum was a no nonsense woman of great integrity, hard working, last to bed at night, first up in the morning and always devoted to her whole family (and other waifs and strays)."



The third Cuckfield Book Festival began on Thursday 3rd October with a tour of Borde Hill Garden in the company of the head gardener. The weather, which had been wet and grey, suddenly improved and the sun appeared, enhancing the glories of that stunning garden. After canapés and prosecco in the house, Vanessa Berridge discussed her book, Great British Gardeners, with Andrew John Stephenson Clarke whose great grandfather created the garden.

The literary quiz, compiled by local enthusiasts, had sold out within days and the Hayloft at The Talbot was packed with eager competitors. On Friday night the now customary supper at Ockenden Manor had the wonderful Robin Ince (arriving just in time by train from Stoke) entertaining the diners and he appeared again on the Saturday morning with a wonderfully chaotic session (Robin was particularly taken with the graveyard at Holy Trinity Church).

Other authors included: Adrian Tinniswood, whose book Behind the Throne is an intimate look at the private lives of monarchs, James Hanratty with a fascinating and disturbing account of the immigration problems facing Europe today, and local author Ed Halliwell talking about mindfulness. On Saturday evening, actor Simon Williams had the audience laughing loudly at his account of an actor's life. No. 1 Broad Street offered delicious complementary canapés in a crowded Queen's Hall to round off the first day of Cuckfield Bookfest.

While these events were taking place at The Queen's Hall, the young people had their own activities at the Old Church and the place rang with laughter as several children's authors entertained them.

On Sunday, Andrew Lownie, a loyal supporter of the book festival who has been coming for three years, revealed how he'd unearthed so many details of the lives of Louis and Edwina Mountbatten, and Tim Waterstone gave a disarmingly frank and honest account of his life and how he came to found the eponymous chain of book stores. Penelope Lively, the renowned fiction author, talked about the importance of gardening to her creativity and Greta Scacchi read her favourite prose and poetry to a delighted audience, with elegant afternoon tea at Ockenden Manor.

In addition to this wonderfully varied selection, Jenni Murray and Clare Clark talked about famous women and art forgeries while Peter Guttridge ran an absorbing crime-writing workshop. The Guardian's political sketch writer, John Crace, brought politics in this frenzied climate to life.

The number of attendees was considerably higher this year – 1,800 - surely a reflection of the much wider distribution of programmes and the growing awareness of the Festival. A cheerful team of volunteers kept visitors supplied with delicious cake and sandwiches and judging from feedback received from both authors and ticket holders, people are already looking forward to a fourth festival in 2020.

If you already have a diary for 2020, why not pencil in the dates now - 12th-15th November? This later date is because The Queen's Hall is not available for the early October date and Cuckfield is such a busy place in the autumn with the Mayor's Procession, the CDS production and Bonfire Night that we have fixed on mid-November. It will be the perfect opportunity for selecting Christmas books.



# Wreath Workshop for charity



He added that the cars would offer bereaved families the same level of comfort for their loved one's final journeys as a traditional hearse but with the added benefit of being better for the planet.



# Schoolchildren and parents get outdoors

Cuckfield's Holy Trinity Church of England School recently received a grant of nearly £6,000 from the Sussex Lund to help improve the natural habitats within the school grounds.

The six acres of school grounds include a mixed ancient woodland with hazel, field maple and oak.

The aim is that this pioneering project (led by Mrs Gaby Dobson - school teacher and Outdoor Learning Co-ordinator and the PTA school grounds committee), becomes an inspirational model for other schools and for a new generation of young naturalists.

This funding, along with previous contributions from Cuckfield Local, will go towards projects to establish a wildflower and butterfly meadow as well as to create and support two additional ponds and carefully restore some hazel coppice areas. While the funding covers all the materials and expert guidance, much of the hard work will be done by the volunteers.



The fun (and hard work!) started in September when we started the build of our Butterfly Meadow with over 50 very enthusiastic adults and children preparing the ground for sowing. The work involved the manual removal of the majority of turf over our new meadow area which extends to around 500m². This turf was piled into banks to make further habitats for bees and grass snakes. As we're only a short distance from Paiges Meadow, we would like to attract the typical Sussex meadow butterflies including marbled whites, skippers and blues.

More recently, on a damp Monday after school, we were delighted to welcome the newly appointed Mayor, Claire Bellamy, to help us sow the first wildflower seeds for the meadow. Claire was joined by representatives from the school's pupils, parents, PTA, staff and governors and it was a wonderful first milestone of this habitat restoration project.

The seed mixture includes around 60 different locally sourced plant species – many specially selected for butterflies by one of our PTA members, Oliver Whaley, a scientist and research associate from the Royal Botanic Gardens Kew and Edinburgh, who has been supporting us throughout the project

Next spring we will be planting additional wildflower plugs to speed the restoration process. These species




are being specially propagated for us by the Millennium Seed Bank at Kew's Wakehurst Place.

At next year's school summer fair the meadow will be in flower and visitors be able to see for themselves our grounds in all their natural glory. Watch this space for details.

Since September we have been carrying out biodiversity surveys of flora and fauna in our school grounds. To our surprise and wonder we found evidence of a small population of Hazel dormice – a priority

species for conservation in Sussex.



We hope that these pioneering projects will become a model for other schools and community groups as well as inspiring a new generation of young naturalists. We look forward to sharing the progress with you in future editions of this magazine.





### Compostable bags

My mailbag has been busy this month with correspondence from readers who have received mail through the post in 'Compostable Bags'.

With the outcry against plastic many organisations, such as National Trust and WI, have quickly moved away from plastic wrappers for their mailings and moved to biodegradable wrappers.

The information they put on the wrapper is not accurate. They suggest putting them into your home compost bin.
However, not everyone has a home compost bin, also they will not compost in a



home compost bin as your bin will not reach a sufficient temperature for the wrapper to break down. There are going to be lots of disappointed National Trust and WI members emptying their compost bins in a year's time and finding this wrapper intact!

Councils will not accept this in their garden waste bin, and we, along with many other councils do not have a food waste collection service.

So where can you put it? You are left with your black top rubbish bin.

This new idea is in fact a lot worse than the original plastic wrapper; that can be recycled in major supermarkets with plastic carrier bags.

Put it in your black top rubbish bin and I do hope you will write to anyone who sends you correspondence in a Compostable Bag and point out the problems they are causing in West Sussex - and other counties!

Would you like me to give a talk to your local group on recycling? Do you have an individual question on specific items you are not sure how to recycle? One email to the Editor, with a picture if possible, and I can let you know.



#### Leek and Potato Soup

(Serves 4 as a main dish)

Finely shred the green tops of 3 leeks and set aside. Thinly slice the rest of them and put into a pan with 2 sliced medium-sized onions, a good knob of butter (garlic if you have it or 1-2 garlic cloves), 1 large peeled and sliced baking potato and a pinch of nutmeg. Gently cook for 5 min then stir in 900ml hot vegetable stock, cover and cook over medium heat for about 10 min or until the vegetables are soft. Cool slightly then buzz in the processor until smooth. Return to the pan, stir in 150ml single cream and season to taste. Meanwhile gently fry the leek tops with 3-4 finely chopped streaky bacon rashers until crisp. Spoon on top of the bowls of soup.

#### Soda Bread

Preheat oven 200C. Sift 450g plain flour, 1tbs baking powder, 1tsp bicarbonate soda and a pinch salt into a bowl. Rub in 50g butter. Combine 150ml plain yogurt with 300ml water and add to the other ingredients to make a soft dough. On a floured surface knead lightly to make a smooth shape. Place on a floured baking tray and make a deep cross on the top with the back of a knife. Bake for about 25 min or until the bread sounds hollow when tapped on the bottom. Break into four portions and serve freshly baked or toasted.

Come November I often have a desire to hibernate, batten down the hatches and sleep until spring! However, reality kicks in and I compensate by making batches of delicious soup, baking the odd loaf of bread or a cake and trying variations on favourite recipes. Do try these...



#### Triple Cheese Lasagne

(4 generous portions)

Preheat oven to 180C. Finely chop 1 large onion, 4 carrots, 4 sticks of celery and 2 crushed garlic cloves and gently fry with 250g bacon lardons until soft. Combine 4tbs tomato puree, 3tbs dry vermouth, 1tsp fennel seeds and 150ml vegetable stock. Add to the pan, cover and simmer for 10 min. Season to taste. Make a cheese sauce with 300ml milk, 25g butter, 3tbs plain flour and 75g grated Cheddar cheese. Stir 4tbs chopped chives into 225g ricotta or curd cheese.

Spoon half the vegetables into a large shallow baking dish, top with three chilled lasagne sheets, spread the ricotta on top, then another layer of pasta, remaining vegetables, another layer of pasta and finally the cheese sauce, Combine 25g soft breadcrumbs and 25g grated Parmesan and sprinkle over the top. (May be made ahead and chilled for an hour). Bake 30-40 min or until a rich golden brown. Leave to stand for 5 min for easier cutting and serving.

#### Mincemeat Fruit Cake

Preheat oven 160C. Tip 225g sr flour, 115g soft butter, 115g soft brown sugar, 2 beaten eggs, 411g jar mincemeat and a generous spoonful of marmalade into a large bowl and mix with a wooden spoon until well combined. Spoon into a buttered and lined 900g loaf tin. Bake for 1%-1% hours or until the cake tests cooked. Cool before removing from the tin.

### **Neighbourhood Watch**

'Engaging the community to become the best place to live in the Heart of Sussex' has been the mission statement of Bolnore CIC for the past three years.

Living up to that mission recently were around 25 residents who came together at The Woodside for a meeting hosted by the Bolnore Village Community Interest Company. This was the second such meeting and the objective was to discuss how best to keep the village safe following a recent article in the Mid Sussex Times which drew attention to incidents of anti-social behaviour within the village.

I think it's fair to say that the village is by no means alone in trying to address anti-social behaviour. We are reaching out to anyone who might have suggestions or ideas that might help.

One suggestion discussed was to reinvigorate the Neighbourhood Watch (NW) scheme. Many of the attendees said they would welcome this initiative and have made a commitment to investigate further. Contact has already been made with the Sussex Neighbourhood Watch Federation.

It's work in progress and we shall see where it leads but we are determined to strive towards our mission statement.

Headteachers can be inspirational and transformational. A good headteacher will create a safe and encouraging environment that strives for inclusivity and continuous development, with the students' current and future needs at the core. Although the scope and weight of responsibility can often seem overwhelming, the role can also be immensely rewarding, as new Headteacher of Bolnore Primary School, Tracy Taylor explains: "I have always held a strong child-centered approach where consistency, praise and nurture, balanced with challenge, are the key to each child's success. I believe that all children are amazing learners and have a unique potential waiting to be unlocked."

Tracy Taylor was awarded the role of Headteacher at Bolnore Primary School in June of this year and took on the post in September. Sharon Allen, who had been the previous (and original) Head, had been in the job for ten years before moving on to pastures new earlier this year.

There are currently 414 children attending the school. Their ages range from 5 to 11, at which point they will then transfer to secondary school. Most of the children attending live within the catchment area.

"Bolnore School feels very personal to me even though it's quite a large school. I know some of the children's names already but still have a way to go. My aim is to know all of their names by Christmas."

Tracy's Mum is Welsh and her father is English. As a child of the Forces she travelled to many different parts of the world and switched schools and home on a regular basis. At ten months old, Tracy moved to Malaya (now part of Malaysia) where she spent a number of years growing up in a Malayan community.

"I was born in Wales and was part of a mining family. Most of my family went into education – most are now headteachers, teachers or educational advisors. That's where I get it from. They were my inspiration I guess."

Tracy recalls going from an Army School in Germany to a school in Northern Ireland where the education system was very different to anything she had experienced before.

"As a child, it was a real eye opener. The teaching was very different. Life was certainly more boundaried back then which definitely helped to build my resilience. I do remember travelling lots with my family and enjoying that part of my life, it was a happy time."

Tracy now lives in Brighton with her husband Tom and travels inland to Bolnore every day. She particularly enjoys her drive into the 'office' because it allows her time to think, refocus and look forward to the day ahead.

One of Tracy's biggest achievements, before her previous Headship at Bramber Primary school, was being class teacher at Hassocks Infant School where she taught for 14 years.

"I absolutely loved that school and I was heartbroken when I left, I'd been there for such a long time. The community of Hassocks was just wonderful and I really felt a sense of belonging and the children loved attending the school. It was a wonderful experience. It was so idyllic and as sad as it was to leave, I knew that it was time to move on."

Tracy has always been interested in education. One of her first roles was, whilst at school herself, was on work experience in a small special needs school in Chichester. Unlike some of us, Tracy knew early on that she wanted to work with children and in particular, education. She spent four years studying for a degree on the subject.

"Education was always the thing I was passionate about. I got distinctions for all of my teaching practices and was awarded a first class honours degree at Brighton University. I have always believed in continual professional development and last year I even did a post graduate qualification in Special Educational Needs whilst I was a Headteacher."

Bolnore Primary School recently underwent an Ofsted inspection for which they received a 'good school' report. The report proceeded to describe the school as a hive of activity where pupils work hard, are proud of their work and have fun. The most important part for Tracy was that pupils of all ages enjoy learning.

The subject of mental health is something that Tracy feels very strongly about, especially with the rise of social media today and the affect it can have on young people.

"It is essential that children get moments of peace and of mindfulness because they are bombarded with information for most of the day. It's not like it was when I was a child because they don't or can't get bored! Making sure that they take time out away from their phones, iPads and in some cases, 'do nothing' is incredibly important."

They do say that happiness in schools starts with the Headteacher and that a positive and upbeat environment can create a ripple effect leading to a happier community.

Tracy's pedagogy and philosophy are simple ones; that school should be a memorable experience, children need to feel safe and secure and above all they need to feel a sense of belonging.

"The true source of happiness is making a difference. Helping others and giving something back. I didn't want to commit to something that I wasn't passionate about. My absolute passion in life is about nurturing children so that they can thrive, feel safe and secure and be the best version of themselves that they can be."

That is what drew Tracy to Bolnore; the fact that the village itself plays a role in raising every child within the community.

"The concept of the local community aiding in the upbringing of children is something that really rings true for me. Everyone should feel in some way responsible for the children in their community."

Dr John Trainer once said 'Children are not a distraction from more important work, they are the most important work'. I am sure that Tracy, those that work at Bolnore Primary School and the wider Bolnore community, will agree with this statement whole heartedly. Thank you to all of you for doing that 'most important work'.

With thanks to Elaine and Nick Goodwin, here we feature a number of the decorated houses and spooky strollers.






























Dear friends.
