

The vision of creating a new multi sports pavilion at Whitemans Green - with assistance from Fairfax and its education foundation Fairfax Building Young Futures - is becoming reality for Haywards Heath Rugby Club – as these realistic visuals indicate.

One glance at how the MSDC approved plans will look once built gives an idea of the transformative nature of these proposals resulting in expanded parking facilities, which will make the nearby roads safer for all Cuckfield residents to navigate. The project will also provide massively improved sport and social facilities, allowing for expansion of the Club and development of girls and ladies rugby and a 21st century community facility for use by other clubs of all kinds.

As a new decade fast approaches, the HHRFC Board has kept its feet firmly on the fundraising accelerator. While the strength of the application for council funding was recognised by being awarded an exceptional 12 out of 12 in fulfilling the relevant criteria, the commitment from MSDC to provide £150,000 towards the project, whilst much appreciated, fell short of what was hoped for and leaves a funding gap which the Club is working to fill. It is hopeful that other sources of government funding may become available since the project ticks so many boxes, fulfilling the future health and well-being aspirations of all political persuasions. The fundraising totaliser in the current Clubhouse continues to move upwards, with each age group contributing in some way



through their own activities and every donation, big or small, making sure that the momentum continues to move forwards.

On Friday 7th February the Club is hosting the HHRFC City Lunch in London. An extensive auction will include an executive box for eight at Old Trafford on 11th April (Easter Saturday) for the Manchester United fixture against Bournemouth, generously donated by David Grant from Merlin PCB Group. This fantastic auction prize provides an unrivalled experience in the Sir Alex Ferguson Stand and is a bucket list item for many sports fans.

Full information is available on the Club's website at www.hhrfc.co.uk where tickets can be purchased online or tables reserved for groups wanting to sit together. The Club hopes that the local community will get involved and support this event, while enjoying a fun afternoon by the River Thames!

Local heros receive applause from Mid Sussex

Guerrilla gardeners, inspiring sports leaders, fundraising exercisers and green gurus were honoured at the recent Mid Sussex Applauds awards.

Chairman of Mid Sussex District Council Cllr Colin Trumble hosted the new community recognition awards. He commented, "The celebrities of this event are of course all those honoured and recognised, and what a fantastic range of projects, stories and events we have heard from across our fabulous district."

Cuckfield had a number of mentions at the ceremony not least of which is Sarah Cheesmur, who took joint second place in the Stronger Together category. Looking to highlight individuals who have helped bring together cultures and communities through a project or activity, Sarah (pictured below with Jane Hill) was noted as having setup the Cuckoo Choir in 2013 as she recognised the potential for retired people in the village to become isolated.



Every Friday over 60 people meet to sing a variety of songs and have now forged friendships outside Cuckoo Choir. The group sang with the Budapest Cathedral Choir in 2018 and at Cuckfield MusicFest earlier this year.

Also receiving commendations in the Good Sport Award was Ansty Ladies Cricket Club and Woodside Netball Club.

Ansty Ladies have provided and promoted cricket for women and girls for over 12 years - one of the first junior girls' setups in the locality. Last winter they initiated free coaching in schools to further promote women's cricket and try to increase the numbers of girls playing the game.

Alison Armstrong runs Woodside Netball Club with her daughter Amy - both go far above and beyond in encouraging the teams and organising competitions. They also provide top notch training and have invited professionals to the club to help inspire the teams. The club is genuinely inclusive and provides netball for all ages, whether you wish to play competively or just for fun.

Lastly, we are delighted to say that Kipper Life, the company that produces Cuckfield Life, was commended in the Business in the Community Award. Colin Trumble commented: "The effort that you and your team put into producing a number of community magazines has evidently impacted people's lives in and around the District for the better."

For those of us of a certain age, nothing is more nostalgic than the sight of a stacked wooden shelf lined with multicoloured glass jars crammed full with sweets. From strawberry bonbons to sherbet lemons, kola kubes to gobstoppers, the best sweet shops that we knew stocked a veritable smorgasbord of childhood delights. At one time the local sweet shop was both the heart of the high street and the most exciting part of a child's day.

Kevin Barber, who runs the Cuckfield Candy Store, explains why he is such a fan of old style confectionary and its ability to transport us back down memory lane: "The idea behind Cuckfield Candy Store, besides being a business, was always to create memories. As a child there was a tuck shop in the village where I used to live and I have long-lasting memories of that place. More often than not, a sweet shop can bring back feelings of your younger self, when life was not so much about living but about discovery and having fun."

Originally from Sussex, Kevin spent most of his childhood growing up on the coast in Worthing. His first job after he left school was working for British Telecom after which he began designing components of cars for the auto industry. At the age of 24 Kevin won his first overseas contract and continued to work throughout Europe in Holland, Germany and Spain for 15 years.

"When I finally stopped travelling for work, I decided to buy a place in Horsham, which is where I met my wife; from there we moved to Cuckfield."



It wasn't long after Kevin and his wife moved into their new home that they experienced a burst water main and had to move into the flat above what is now Edit for over a year. It was at this moment that Kevin spotted the empty premises on the opposite side of the road and decided to grasp the opportunity and open his very own shop.

"The village was crying out for something with a bit of character at the time, and I was sitting looking out of the window and thought to myself, that place would make a nice sweet shop and a lovely little addition to the High Street."

When Kevin first opened Cuckfield Candy Store there was a lot of excitement in the area with people queuing out of the doors of his shop.

"Weekends always used to be chaotic in here. Now it's not quite as busy, except for the school run, but I guess much of that is down to competition from the supermarkets and the fact that people have changed their eating habits, at least where sweets are concerned!"

When Cuckfield Candy Store first opened in 2009 it not only sold sweets but also traditional wooden toys in the area at back of the shop. That space is now used as storage for Kevin's other business, Stadium Sweets, housing bags and boxes of stock waiting to be bagged up for football games at the Amex.

"We sell 33 types of sweets at every home game from the kiosk in the family stand at Brighton Football Club and have been there since the stadium opened in 2011. We've grown from one small kiosk and now have an additional ten trolleys all around the stadium, employing 13 people for every home game."

Kevin also has a kiosk at Southampton Football Club and is hoping to expand his sweet business into other locations too.

So what are Kevin's bestsellers?

"That's an easy one. They tend to be the pick and mix varieties, especially where the children are concerned. Chocolate peanuts and raisins are always a popular choice with adults."

With Christmas only a matter of days away, Kevin's shop is ready for the festive season. On the main counter alongside the expected selection boxes and bags of chocolate coins are more unique gifts.

"We try to offer something a little bit different at Christmas, gifts that the supermarkets don't sell. As well as luxurious handmade English chocolates and truffles, we have giant chocolate Christmas puddings, penguins and Santas, traditional sugar mice and handmade Turkish Delight, and, of course, there are our gorgeous Jellycat soft toys."

The magic of a sweet shop seems to work on adult customers too (me included). It was 9am on a Wednesday morning when I visited Kevin, so I didn't experience the hordes of small children picking out their favourite treats during the after-school rush. What I did witness, however, was a small flurry of older customers wandering about the shop looking to buy a fluffy toy or a birthday card. As one elderly lady left the shop, she turned to Kevin and said: "Nothing can beat the romance of a traditional sweet shop like this one."

The sight, smell and (eventually) taste of a sweet shop can often transport us to another place and time. It is for this very reason that such shops, in particular village sweet shops like Kevin's, need to be treasured before they disappear from the high street for good.

This year, why not pick out your Christmas confectionary from Cuckfield Candy Store.



A delicious Christmas

SIMPLY GOOD FOOD



So many of our traditional celebrations are marked with special foods - birthday cakes, Easter eggs, pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and, of course, Christmas.

The origins of many Christmas foods go back even to medieval times. Mincemeat originally contained meat along with the fruit and spices. It was used to fill one enormous pie dish and was called Christmas Pie. To make your mince pies, large or small, even more fruity add grated eating apple or well drained crushed pineapple to the mincemeat before spooning into the pastry shells. Or



carefully lift the tops of hot individual mince pies and pop in a spoonful of brandy butter just before serving. Don't forget the very important tradition of leaving a mince pie and glass of sherry by the fireplace for Father Christmas - and, of course, a carrot for Rudolph.

Christmas pudding was originally called plum pottage and was a mixture of spices, meat, fruit and lots of breadcrumbs to make the meat go further. It was like a thick soup. By around the 16th century it had become minus the meat - a pudding cooked in a ball shape but it was the Victorians who first packed it in a pudding basin. Traditionally it should be made on Stir-Up Sunday in November, the Sunday before Advent, then it will have God's blessing. Make sure you stir it clockwise - you will have bad luck if you stir in anti-clockwise! Each member of the family should have a stir and make a silent wish.


Serving turkey on Christmas Day is a comparatively new tradition. Goose, chicken and roast beef were once traditional and, even earlier, a whole roast boar's head would be served with great ceremony. Turkeys were reared in huge flocks in Norfolk and Suffolk and then driven to the London markets on foot, grazing as they went - what a sight that must have been!

Tastes change and today many people prefer a lighter Christmas Cake to the traditional dark fruit version under its blanket of golden marzipan and royal icing. Make a lighter but equally festive version using glace fruits such as pineapple and cherries instead of dried fruit. I also add chopped candied ginger and slivers of dried apricots. Brush the baked and cooled cake with melted redcurrant jelly and decorate with toasted nuts and red and green glace cherries.

Everyone loves an edible Christmas present. These Almond Truffles are made every year in our house

and are very popular. Break 8 trifle sponges into fine crumbs (or use the processor), tip into a bowl and stir in 150g ground almonds. Warm 4tbs apricot jam until runny and add to the bowl, plus 2tbs rum or brandy (use orange juice for non-alcoholic truffles). Mix together to a smooth mixture then shape into walnut-sized balls, arrange on a baking sheet and chill for several hours to dry the surface. Then roll each truffle in cocoa, drinking chocolate or sifted icing sugar. Alternatively coat with melted chocolate. They look very pretty set in tiny paper cases. Keep the truffles in a cool place.

Minister Jon Hobbs explains a little more about each of the services:



Kelly Robinson, a Trustee of the BVCP, the charity that manages the Woodside, said: "These fun events enable our community to come together to ensure the future of the facility."







Finding the place; it was (you may say) satisfactory

Dear friends.

Words of T. S. Eliot from Journey of the Magi. A well-loved poem, it is cleverly constructed, initially quoting from the 'Nativity' sermon preached by Lancelot Andrewes, the Bishop of Winchester, before James I on Christmas Day 1622: 'A cold coming they had of it at this time of the year, just the worst time of the year to take a journey, and specially a long journey.'

Three hundred years later, Eliot wove a narrative which seems as powerful today as when he wrote it. Personalising Andrewes' words, he draws the reader to journey with the mysterious wise men seeking the Christ Child. He conjures up everyday life in vivid and sometimes jarring imagery, until the travellers find new life from the mystery of a child born in the humblest of circumstances – a refugee child sleeping in a trough.

Eliot himself experienced the call of Jesus Christ in his life the year before he wrote the poem, realising that to follow Him was to experience the fulness of life. This fulness of life is open to everyone. There are no barriers; just the desire to continually journey towards understanding how much each of us is loved by God, who sent Jesus – the Way, the Truth and the Life – the greatest present imaginable.



Bonfire Society seeks to recover losses

Since 1986 Cuckfield has seen the annual fundraising bonfire and fireworks grow from a small PTA event to the massive village event it is today. On a normal year, organisers expect to see between 5,000 and 7,000 attendees at the village's largest event.

Since those early days, what is now The Cuckfield Bonfire Society, has raised hundreds of thousands of pounds for local charities. Initially, raising funds for Holy Trinity Primary School, at one point it had paid for every smart whiteboard in the school. Over more recent years, the society has widened it's fundraising remit to include more local charities that deal with the needs or education of local children including Kangaroos, Cuckfield Pre-school Playgroup and the village museum.

This year, another 12 months of hard work all culminated on 2nd November. However, it would appear that Mother Nature conspired to make it a gruelling set-up, with torrential rains and gale force

winds, along with the World Cup Rugby Final, meant the volunteers and society members were hampered at every turn. The job this year was three times harder than normal but, nevertheless, the event went ahead and the organisation, the fireworks, music and fire were all a huge success. Unfortunately the weather took its toll on gate numbers and only half the expected visitors arrived to enjoy the night.

So, after all the hard work, the evening ended up losing over £7,000. The loss is measured not in lost earnings, but in actual costs that have to be met, fireworks, PA, lighting etc. It costs around £18,000 to put on the event and these costs would still have to be met even if it were cancelled.

The society has a contingency fund to ensure bills can always be settled after the event regardless of the number of visitors, but this year's loss has eaten a very



big hole into this and, although we can still put on next year's event, it is a very weakened position. As another year like this one could see the end of the event.

In order to combat the impact of this year's losses, the Society has setup a crowdfunding page, which has already, thanks to the generosity and support of the local residents, raised £1,500.

We have been blown away by the genrosity of the people of Cuckfield's, but we still need more help and hope that the many thousands who enjoy the event year in and year out will see fit to help, no matter how small.

Last month the nation celebrated International Men's Day (IMD) with vigour. The origins of this annual event are part of a long-standing campaign to help raise awareness of the issues facing men across the globe. Today the cause is more prevalent than ever, with a strong focus on mental health, drawing particular attention to the subject of male

suicide. In 2019 the IMD campaign has sought (and continues to seek) to improve the overall well-being of men and boys in the modern age.

Cuckfield resident lain Pringle strongly supports the evidence linking physical activity with enhanced mental health and well-being. As creator and influencer of local weekly group Sad Dads, lain believes in the goodness of physical exercise and how it can help to improve self-esteem and overall cognitive function.

"It's a well-known fact that playing sport or doing something that increases your heart rate can have a positive impact on our ability to cope with stress. Sad Dads is there to try to get people involved in exercise and aid inclusivity."

The aim of the weekly gathering is to get lain and his buddies physically moving, playing games and generally making the most of their Wednesday evenings by having fun.

Each week lain and his comrades meet in the gym at Warden Park School for an hour where they run around playing frisbee, hand-hockey or shoot hoops with a rugby ball.

Instead of standard sports the group chooses to play games that are different and slightly off the beaten track. "We tend to avoid playing games where one or two people are far better than others," lain explained. "In fact, if anyone shows any acumen or skill associated with a particular sport then we tend to move on quickly. Our go to game is basketball but with a rugby ball. It's a real run around because you can't bounce due to its shape, and you generally have to run around for a long time, so

it's a good one for keeping us on our toes."

The group also plays uni-hockey or, as it is otherwise known, floor-ball. The game itself is a little bit like Ice Hockey, but instead of playing on ice it's normally played on a polished floor with a puck.

The Sad Dads collective currently consists of around 10 to 12 attendees and isn't all about playing sport

either. The group also enjoys a bit of social activity, which can include wives and girlfriends too.

"Funnily enough it was the wives that gave us our name actually. We never had a name in the beginning, and it was the wives that christened us. Even though they don't play with us, they're very much involved in the social side of things, so I guess we have them to thank for coming up with the name."

lain is originally from Scotland but has been in Cuckfield now for 20 years. When he first arrived in the area there were many (evening) fitness classes aimed at men specifically, one of which was a class in Burgess Hill that advertised itself as 'Men's Fitness'.

"I ended up doing that because it had all of the right ingredients. GPs were prescribing these classes to men of all ages at the time to help with self-esteem issues, overall fitness and general well-being."

It is for this very reason that lain continues to work with Sad Dads. After ten years of supporting the group it still gives him a true feeling of purpose.

"Thinking about it now is giving me goose bumps. It all comes back to the issue of mental health, the pressures of modern day society and how they have an effect on men today."

Since the group's inception nearly ten years ago there have been a number of members that have been made redundant or that have gone through hard times. Iain has always tried to encourage people to keep attending the weekly classes because ultimately it does help, especially during the more difficult times.

"This group is all about inclusivity. The ethos around



Sad Dads, as cliché as this might sound, is not about winning or losing, it's about getting involved and taking part. I truly believe in that."

The other benefit, besides the fitness aspect, of being in Sad Dads is the social activity that it has created.

lain now runs an honesty fund whereby the money he collects every month from each member simply goes into a pot that can then be used for group activities outside of Sad Dads.

Currently there is £1,000 in the fund that lain and his pals can use to buy tickets to a gig, a sporting event or whatever they choose to spend the money on.

"The honesty fund has helped quite a lot actually. It sits there waiting to be used whenever we want to do something together, and, as popular things tend to get booked up, it allows us to buy tickets quickly and work out the details later. The group has also resulted in various splinter activities like the ski trip which has operated for several years, and last year 15 of us went away to Courchevel."


The make-up of the Sad Dads troupe has not remained constant, as lain explains: "We all have busy lives and members come and go as work and life allows, which is brilliant. It also tends to regenerate as new



generations of dads come to the area and has been a great way of making new friends and introducing them to the village."

lain and his pals are off to swing their pants with the 'King of Cool' Bobby Gillespie later this week in Brighton as he trips the light fantastic with his band Primal Scream. It turns out that Sad Dads really aren't sad at all. They're actually rather hip. In the words of Primal Scream, Sad Dads is all about getting out of the darkness and making sure, through inclusivity, fun and activity, that their light shines on.

Life-saving knowledge

Where's your nearest defibrillator?

At Cuckfield Life we'd like to encourage everyone living and working in the village to familiarise themselves with the sites of the life-saving defibrillator machines in Cuckfield and Bolnore and learn how to use them.

Cuckfield resident Wendy Tracey-Roberts Macrae has been working hard to ensure that two new defibrillator units are back up and running in the village.

Fellow resident and local electrician Guy Richardson has joined Wendy in her fight for safety and has kindly offered to fit the new units for free.

One of the new units has been placed outside Mansell McTaggart Estate Agents on the High Street and will be in the safer coded cabinet. The second unit has been erected on Whitemans Green, again in a safer coded cabinet and with a built-in CCTV camera.

If you notice that the status light is red and not green that indicates a problem with the unit, so please ensure that you report it as shown on the device.

Wendy says that we can all do our bit to help by getting involved. "Once the units are up, it is our responsibility as a village to maintain and check them."

Funds are still being raised at the Co-op at Whitemans Green where buckets have been placed at the tills. Please look out for any orange donation boxes in any of the village pubs collecting money by the ISOC (Independent State of Cuckfield) for the purpose of maintaining these two units.


Wendy adds: "The units need replacement batteries and pads every 2-4 years; over the next six years we'll need about £800. Ideally we'd like to encourage the community as a whole to help towards the funding of these life-saving units."

Any local clubs should aim to register their details with the South East Coast Ambulance Service to enable any 999 call handlers to tell them where their nearest unit is in the village.


One new unit has recently been fitted since our last map, inside the clubhouse at Cuckfield Cricket Club.

Reflecting on XR

I've been reflecting on the momentous events of October and chatting to my friend who's joined her local Extinction Rebellion (XR) group in Burgess Hill. I wanted to know what had led her to take this step, and the first thing I asked was why we are hearing so much about Extinction Rebellion.

Catherine is clearly very concerned about the ecological crisis which is affecting huge numbers of people and the natural world everywhere. The scientists have been telling us for thirty years about the dangers of global warming yet, since then, we have seen carbon emissions rise by 60% with very little mitigation. We know that we are all in this together, which is why we have seen millions of people all around the world, under the banner of Extinction Rebellion, calling for clear action on carbon emissions.

Catherine explains just what XR is hoping to achieve from its campaign: "Firstly, XR is asking the government to be very clear with us the public about the reality of climate change. The UK's Chief Scientist has told us that we all need to make real and urgent changes across our lifestyles. All actions great and small make a difference. Whichever country we live in it's up to each of us to do our bit. The time for talking is over. How we live our lives, what we buy, what we eat, which energy supplier we use, who we choose to bank with, what transport we use and how often, these are all critical. And let's talk about what we are doing in our workplaces, schools and coffee mornings because how we are choosing to live today is crucial to our future world and our children's quality of life.

"Secondly, XR is asking for immediate action to halt biodiversity loss and urgently reduce carbon emissions. There are local actions we can take as individuals that make a real difference. It's not just about the terrible habitat loss in the global natural world; it's our local habitats, where we live, that are threatened too. The countryside around Mid Sussex is beautiful in its autumn colours but ash die back and the virus affecting conker trees is clear to be seen. The flaming reds of autumn are a gift. Not so the huge fires in California and the Amazon.

"The third really crucial area is the call to set up a national citizens' assembly to debate and agree the changes across society that are needed to tackle the emergency. On 2nd November the government decided that it would heed this call and 30,000 letters are being sent out to UK households. The assembly will be run in 2020. But we need measures commensurate with the scale of the emergency. Waiting 30 years to reach zero net carbon emissions is not acceptable."

Christmas unwrapped

RECYCLE THIS

Christmas is a busy time and poses more recycling questions! In this month's extended column I try to give quick answers to a range of festive waste dilemmas...



Christmas Tree – did you know that in West Sussex Christmas trees are turned into compost when you recycle them? In Cuckfield you can drop your real tree to Whitemans Green Recreation Ground car park (until 10th Jan) after you've finished with it, or to The Woodside in Bolnore. I call it treecycling!



Wrapping paper – remove as much packing tape as possible. Paper in the Blue recycling bin, tape in the Black top rubbish bin.

Cardboard – flatten boxes and remove as much Sellotape and packing tape as possible. Cardboard in Blue bin, tape in Black bin.



Christmas cards – remove bows and ribbons. Cards in Blue bin (even glittery ones!), everything else in Black bin.

Sweet/chocolate boxes/tins/tubes – metal, cardboard, plastic or paper can all be recycled (Blue bin).

Glass bottles – beer, wine and champagne in the Blue bin, without the tops please. Metal tops can go in the Blue bin separately. Plastic tops and corks in the Black bin.



Plastic bottles – fizzy drinks bottles in your Blue bin.

Plastic/foil trays – from Mince Pie and other food packaging, in the Blue bin please.

Christmas paper chains - in your Blue recycling bin.

REMEMBER the bin must close. If the lid will not close it may not be collected. Do NOT leave recycling next to the bin as it may not be collected.

What to do with other items that <u>cannot</u> go in your recycling bin...

Plastic wrapping paper, bows and ribbons – if you cannot reuse them place them in your Black top rubbish bin.

Tinsel and baubles – take to the Household Waste Recycling Site (HWRS), 'the tip' to you and I.

Christmas fairy lights – as an electrical item take to the tip and not in your kerbside bin.

Artificial trees - take to the HWRS.

Batteries – take them to any supermarket that sells batteries, or the HWRS.

Textiles – from old rags and holey tights to clothes that don't fit any more, bag them up and take them to a charity shop that accepts 'rags' or take them to your HWRS. Do not put in your kerbside bins.



Broken toys – if they cannot be fixed, take to the HWRS.

Used paper napkins - Black top rubbish bin.

Broken crockery or cups – it happens at Christmas(!), take to the HWRS.

Old drinking glasses – take to a charity shop, or - if broken - put them in your Black bin.

Disposable plastic plates and cutlery – try to avoid as they will have to go in your Black top bin.

Please note: your Christmas and New Year rubbish and recycling kerbside bin collections operates from Monday 23rd December to Friday 3rd January. Visit: www.midsussex.gov.uk/waste-recycling for details.

HWRS – Now on winter opening hours. For example, Burgess Hill site is closed on Thursdays. From 1st December you will need to show you are a resident of West Sussex to use the HWRS. Take with you your driving licence or utility bill. TOP TIP: photocopy them now and keep in the car or ready to take with you.





Chairman for 22 years, Evelyn outlined a number of the group's achievements and thanked members of the Mothers' Union for their practical help on the day.


"I know a number of people in the village wondered why there was no Women's Section Standard at the Remembrance Service this year – this is the reason.

From the retiring collection they were able to give £130 to the church with the rest to Women's Section Benevolent Fund.






