Jay is an uncle to two boys at Holy Trinity School. The photo shows Jay at the school. He later enjoyed lunch and a pint at the Talbot.


#### Traffic worries for residents

offered training to residents wanting to join a speed
watch rota to record excessive speed at various
points in the village. If you would like to help, please

Richard demonstrated a mobile speed monitor that can be moved around the village to show drivers their actual speed as they approach it. ## School listens to responses

Sussex Learning Trust (formerly Warden Park Academy Trust) is in the process of creating a proposal to open a new sixth form college at the current Central Sussex College Haywards Heath campus.

The Trust has received over 1,100 responses in an online survey carried out last month. The CEO of the Trust, Jonathan Morris, said: "It is clear that this is an issue that has engaged the local population and we are very grateful to those people who have responded to the questionnaire. The Trust is now in a position to reflect on the findings from the questionnaire along with our many local and national consultations with politicians and educationalists to confirm its position."

The Trust was formed to run Warden Park School in 2011 and took over the failing Heyworth Primary School, Haywards Heath, which reopened as Warden Park Primary Academy in 2012.

There were a number of questions which came out of the survey, including what the Trust means by 'formal college' and 'business dress'. "Our experience is that schools that pay close attention to uniform and appearance tend to be the more successful ones," Jonathan Morris explains. "Our attitude will be that if a student is up-to-date, punctual and present, reaching their target levels and being a responsible and pleasant member of the community, they will have 'earned' some additional freedoms. Formal Business Dress does not mean uniform. The finer details will need to be consulted on, but probably we are intending smart business suits to set the tone for a 'grown up' and purposeful atmosphere."

## New pitch for Warden Park

Warden Park Secondary Academy has received Planning Permission from Mid Sussex District Council for the development of a 3G sports pitch on its grounds.

Contractors have been appointed and the project will get underway in early July, with an expected opening in November.

Headteacher Jonathan Morris said: "The Academy rightly has an outstanding reputation for its sports. This new addition to the school facilities will give our PE Department the opportunity to further develop the depth and breadth of its offering. With the current restricted funding for schools it has been important for us to ensure that it places no drain on our resources and we are very grateful, in this respect, to local businesses for their support and donations. We also look forward to being able to offer it for use to outside organisations."

# A new school and college with arts specialism

A local performing arts academy has put together a proposal to take over the former Haywards Heath College site as a new primary, secondary and sixth form free school.

Suzanne Gielgud (pictured) has been running Gielgud Academy from The Hub since its inception in 2011 but, in the light of Central Sussex College's decision to close the Haywards Heath campus after the next academic year, she has seen a huge opportunity to create a facility that the whole of West Sussex can be proud of.

"Our proposal is to take over the site and turn it into an all-through school for ages 5-18 with a specialism in the arts," Suzanne commented. "According to West Sussex County Council (WSCC) many primary schools in the area are at capacity already and more spaces are needed. Creating an all-through school not only meets the need to have an excellent sixth form in the area but will also relieve pressure for primary places too."

The new school would be a traditional, and non feepaying, school but with a specialism in performing arts. "I genuinely believe that within every student there is always a particular gifting in the arts, be it dance, photography, art, music, film or design," Suzanne continues. "We want to create a school where those gifts can flourish alongside an outstanding academic education."

Suzanne is currently in the process of forming the Gielgud Academy Trust and has already had very positive meetings with both WSCC and the Department for Education, who are very interested in a provision of this kind being made available in Haywards Heath. "They told me the site was ideally suited to be divided for this purpose. I've also walked around the campus with three headteachers who agreed it would be a fantastic facility as a primary, secondary and a sixth form."

The college buildings are all just a few years old, with particular attention having been spent on creating a state of the art theatre and rehearsal studios all with

fully-sprung floors. The facilities are so good that Katie Derham and Anton Du Beke used them to practise locally during the last series of Strictly Come Dancing. Suzanne's vision includes using the facilities how they were designed to be used. "It would be such a waste of the huge sums of money spent on the building to make it top spec, to not utilise them fully every day," she explained.

Having a clear vision is something Suzanne is used to. She started Gielgud Academy of Performing Arts (GAPA) five years ago, and it now teaches nearly 300 children and young people. She also has experience of working with government bodies too. Twenty years ago her management company began working with the Training & Enterprise Council to create a programme to help professional actors and performers gain extra skills to find employment.

Suzanne has been featured on BBC local radio and TV last month as she seeks to promote what she is trying to do with the Gielgud Academy Free School. ## Tennis club gears up for the summer

Cuckfield Tennis Club has been around for many years but with, three courts tucked away behind the Queen's Hall, many residents don't know it exists. "It always surprises me that many people living in Cuckfield don't know that the courts and club house are here," said member and bar treasurer Karen Pontin. "It's a lovely, friendly and very busy club, which offers year-round opportunities for players of all ages and abilities."

Last year the club reached an important milestone when it took over the running of the courts from the local council.

With so many demands on local Government funding, members were concerned that the council would not be able to maintain the courts, which will need resurfacing in the next few years. So the committee approached the council and was delighted to take over the lease.

The club has now embarked on an ambitious fundraising scheme - to raise around £30,000 to

completely resurface the three hard courts - and is in the process of becoming a registered charity. This will enable the club to apply for grant funding. Fundraising events, including a quiz night, are also being planned and new sponsors sought.

The club is also keen to attract new members and has introduced sessions and tournaments to appeal to players at all levels. Since taking over the lease the club now runs the booking system, which includes a range of sessions for members but also plenty of hours for nonmembers to book a court and play.

The courts are booked for club members on Tuesday and Friday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Wednesday evenings are for junior members, with further coaching offered on some Sundays. Thursday is match practice night. Members play all year round and even had a Christmas tournament!

In addition to the main Men's, Ladies' and Doubles' ladders and competitions, Club tournaments include a popular Mixed Handicap Cup and a parent/child event which was introduced last year and will now become an annual event. "We also have a thriving social side, based in our lovely clubhouse with small licensed bar," said Karen. "It really is a very friendly club and a perfect place to spend a summer evening."



"Ravilious had already designed mugs for the coronations of Edward VIII and George VI. Although he was killed during the war, his design was used again for the Elizabeth II mug."

When a pub changes hands, as they can be prone to do, it feels like a new dawn rising. The Chequers Inn, in nearby Slaugham, is no different since it came into new ownership three months ago, and it opened its doors once again (after a significant refurbishment) last month.

I met with General Manager Lukas Ackermann and Executive Head Chef Brett Duarte to find out what their plans were.

The pair are both part-owners in the business which has bought the pub - The Rare Breed Pub Company - and their vision is to create the best steakhouse in the country! Lukas is very clear about that: "We only want to be fantastic at what we do - just good isn't an option," he explained.

"Running a pub in a small village like this is a privilege and a responsibility," Brett said, "and one that we take very seriously." After signing contracts they attended a public meeting to meet the locals and explain what they were hoping to do with the historic inn. "For us it's about being part of the community, so we are listening hard to the feedback we get every day."

On this score the company has future plans to open a farm shop next door, selling meat and produce, milk, juice, eggs and newspapers.

The idea which became The Rare Breed Pub Co was formed while Lukas and Brett (and others) worked alongside each other at a pub in Esher, Surrey. In fact they are still running The Albert Arms, which they hope will become the training ground for chefs and waiting staff alike. "The Albert is a family business run for last 35 years and has become even more popular in the six years we've been involved," Lukas explains. "Last year we began to look for a village pub which we could take on and apply the same theory to; The Chequers is in such an idyllic setting and rural community, we loved it straight away."

Part of the charm of the newly opened Chequers is the passion! "It's not about egos," Brett says. "We want to serve the best food and drink with the biggest smiles." It's perhaps unsurprising that he goes on to claim that they already serve the best Sunday lunch in the area after only two weeks - but I do believe him. "Even just the gravy takes three days to make," Lukas rushes to explain.

It is that sense of investment that sets them apart. The company owns a herd of Longhorn cows on a farm in Somerset, where most of the meat comes from. "When we serve up beef from that herd we know exactly what it has eaten, where it's been and which road it got to Slaugham on!" Brett said. "Three years of love is being served on that plate, and that's why we make every single serving amazing - that's our job."

Brett was the Executive Chef for Gaucho Grill, a group of 16 restaurants around the world, before doing this; he really knows his subject. But his down to earth manner is very refreshing for such beautiful food. Lukas shows me a professionally produced video of Brett preparing and cooking a spiral cut rib-eye steak - which has me visibly salivating! "I love to teach," Brett tells me. "Whether it's chefs or guests in our restaurant, I'm always happy to tell others how we do it."

Training the team is very important too and they explain that any waiting staff will have tasted all the food, including any specials for that day's service. "This includes which drinks to serve with dinner," Lukas explains. "Many of our guests appreciate suggestions and we love to do that."

So what's on the menu here? Well, The Chequers serves a fantastic lunch menu of two and three courses (£12.50/£15.50), which included Chicken Liver Parfait, Cumberland Sausage and Mash with a Yorkshire Pudding and Berry Eton Mess on the day I was in. The menus



are changed weekly to reflect seasonal variations. For Sunday lunch you could enjoy one course for just £10.95 up to three courses for £19.95 - the Roast Somerset Chicken is Brett's favourite!



If champagne is your summer tipple then you're in luck with 20% off all sparkling and champagne every Saturday, and the garden overlooking green fields makes the perfect sun trap to drink it in. The Albert Arms is a winner of the local CAMRA award and The Chequers will be no different. "We will always have between 4-6 ales on at the bar," Lukas explains, "and of our 32 wines on the wine list, 24 are available by the glass."

As we wind up our conversation Brett has already checked my earlier reaction to his video. "Shall I go and make you a rib-eye steak?" he asks knowingly. I gratefully accept the offer and he reminds me that even the process for producing the triple cook chips takes three days!

The company takes steak so seriously that it has

installed specialist dry airing fridges at their facility in Surrey. Lukas excitedly shows me the photos like a kid with a new train set. It looks state of the art. "Steaks in most restaurants are cooked when they are about 30 days old," Brett explains, "but we only serve between 31-45 days old; it's about putting that extra effort in at the end."

In just shy of 20 minutes I am served a succulent steak on a white plate with a delicate white boat of peppercorn sauce on the side. My crunchy chips are served in a mini bucket and the whole meal is washed down by Lukas' recommended red wine, a glass of 2013 Paul Jaboulet Aine Cotes Du Rhone. Suffice it to say the meal was simply delicious - just the best steak I have ever eaten!

If you wish to sample The Chequers stunning seasonal menu do take the short drive to Slaugham - I feel sure you won't be disappointed! Lunch is served between 12-2.45pm and evening dining starts at 7pm. Call 01444 400400 to reserve your table, and don't forget to mention Cuckfield Life when you book.

## Summer solstice

#### VILLAGE GREEN

The focus of my thought is the high spot of the year when the sun comes to rest for a short while at the northernmost point of its journey; Summer Solstice. I once lived in a converted barn just over the border in East Sussex. The preceding few days when the hedges are bedecked with wild roses, Gaia's garlands, have a feeling about them which is elusive. One could call it a kind of nostalgia for a time not yet passed, a unique peacefulness which can touch the soul. Come the passing of 21st June and the elusive, untouchable is gone, waiting in the wings for its next turn in the spotlight of the sun's bright rays.

Michael McCarthy in his book The Moth Snowstorm catches it pretty well: '...occasions when we suddenly and involuntarily find ourselves loving the natural world with a startling intensity, in a burst of emotion which we may not fully understand and the only word that seems to me to be appropriate for this feeling is joy and, when I talk of the joy we can find in nature, this is what I mean.' This joy, which some of you will know and others have yet to find, is a significant reason to support the principle of 'a legal duty of care for the Earth'.

This duty of care is behind the work being done to make Ecocide the 5th United Nations Crime against Peace. It's our world, our natural world and it is the only one we've got. Without the ecology, biodiversity, the sheer breathtaking beauty of the natural world we are much the poorer in spirit. There is a mindset in the corridors of power of the opinion that, if we are out of the European Union, all that environmental stuff can go by the board and we can get on with expanding the economy. My understanding is that there is no economy on a dead planet.

Summer Solstice reminds me of the television shots of all the goings on for midsummer sunrise at Stonehenge. Winter sunset there? Cold, numinous, magical, solitary; now that's when an ineffable presence can be touched, in a winter sunset. The ancient rituals would finish with cakes and ale. Old friends well met, children laughing, playing together, young people perhaps finding a life partner. It was a general social occasion then 'merry part' to 'merry meet again' at the next ritual celebration.


All money raised from the event is donated to St Mark's Church and the Village Hall, with a donation to St Mark's School, and other worthy causes.

Cuckfield lawyer Lee Hills always knew that touring India might be a life changing experience., but he could never have guessed that an encounter with a young child selling postcards to tourists on the streets of Hampi would be the inspiration for an exciting and dramatic fundraising challenge.

In September Lee will leave the comfort of his village home to spend five days white water rafting along Africa's notorious Zambezi river in a bid to raise money for Winston's Wish, the UK's leading childhood bereavement charity. Lee explains what led to his decision to tackle the mighty Zambezi and why he feels ready to take on the challenge, even though his only experience of boating is the occasional fishing trip!

"It all started with a trip to India earlier this year," said Lee, who is one of the partners at Mayo Wynne Baxter based in Brighton. "I'm very lucky that my job enables the partners to take sabbaticals. When my chance comes up I try to use the opportunity to go somewhere different and experience another culture."

Four years ago Lee spent six weeks in Northern Vietnam. This year he chose India.

"India was somewhere I had always intended to visit," he said. "It's a bit like Glastonbury - an experience everyone needs to do once but will probably never repeat!"

On arrival in Delhi he joined a tour organised by company Exodus and spent six weeks touring the country by coach and rail, which included several overnight train journeys.

"To call the train a sleeper is probably a misnomer as very little sleep was possible due to the constant blast of the air conditioning, the to-ing and fro-ing of passengers embarking and disembarking throughout the night and the cries of the chai boy at all hours," said Lee.

His favourite place was Varanasi on the River Ganges - a maze of narrow lanes with a temple around every corner and full of colour, vibrancy and noise. "Leading down to the Ganges are the 'ghats', steps down which

followers of the Hindu religion walk to bathe in the river and cleanse themselves of their sins," Lee recalled.

"With ceremonies taking place at sunrise and sunset throughout the day and night, it is a hive of activity."

Lee's journey also took in the Taj Mahal in Agra ("words cannot describe the serenity and beauty of the place"). He also visited Jaipur and the Ranthambhore National Park where he hoped to spot a tiger. "After two days and several bumpy safari rides in open top army trucks, despite seeing many monkeys, deer and even the odd crocodile, the tiger hunt was abandoned!"

Mumbai, home of Bollywood, was his least favourite destination, but among the highlights was the mountains and 'hill station' of Ooti - a refuge for British officials, tea planters from southern India and, more recently, tourists. "After almost four weeks of travelling in India, Ooti was the first place I visited where I could breathe clean fresh air!" said Lee.

His journey ended in the southernmost state of Kerala and finally the beautiful resort of Varkala.

"Six weeks away from the day to day routine does cause you to reflect," said Lee, who grew up in Sussex and has lived in Cuckfield for 18 years. "I've always tried to support charities and other people's fundraising efforts, but felt I wanted to actually do something myself that was worthwhile.

"In India I met lots of people and saw the real poverty that exists there," said Lee, who was particularly moved by the sight of children living on the streets. "One little boy approached me to try to sell me a set of postcards. He was chirpy but there was real sadness in his eyes. I

bought the cards only if he promised me he would go to school the next day. Our guide laughed – we both knew he wouldn't!"

Lee returned to Cuckfield in March and within a week was planning his fundraising challenge. "I began researching different children's charities," he said. "I was looking for an organisation with a regional presence but national infrastructure. I wanted a charity that would support children for the whole of their lives and one that would benefit from any publicity I could bring." Winston's Wish stood out as the perfect choice. "The work the charity does is fantastic. It was eye-catching - I felt moved and motivated."

The next step was to find a suitable challenge. "White water rafting just fired my imagination," said Lee. "It's very demanding and will take me way out of my comfort zone."

On 10th September Lee will leave the village and fly out to Livingstone before transferring to Victoria Falls to join a team of fellow fundraisers. After just one day's intensive training, he will embark on his adventure along the 'Great River'.

Lee can expect a rough ride and harsh conditions as his journey takes in unforgiving rapids such as Stairway to Heaven and Oblivion! He will also paddle and carry the raft for 100kms of the river, pitching his tent and sleeping under canvas on the bank at night. "I've been told I'll need to wear ear plugs to try and block out the sound of the raging river," said Lee.

Supported by his fellow adventurers, Lee will paddle and raft his way along around 100 kms of the river through Zambia, steadily heading towards the journey's end at Chabango Falls and the final rapid Ghostrider!

And if the conditions weren't harsh enough, there's always the hippos and crocodiles to look out for! "I've been using social media to raise the profile of my fundraising expedition and was pleased, but slightly taken aback, when Olympic rower James Cracknell, who has also tackled the great Zambezi River, responded, sending me a photo of a huge Zambezi crocodile!"

Lee can also look forward to sweltering heat, humidity, blistered hands and crashing into the water! "Luckily I can swim well but my only experience in a boat is the odd fishing trip," said Lee, who is getting in training by upping his gym sessions and time spent on the rowing machines.

Since signing up for his adventure, Lee's had a mixed reaction from family, friends and colleagues. "Lots of people have been very positive, some can't hide their surprise and my family think I'm having a midlife crisis!" he says.

But the campaign has clearly inspired them as donations have flooded in and Lee is already nearing his £4,000 target. "I thought £4,000 was both realistic and challenging but as donations have been coming in thick and fast, I'm now hoping to reach £5,000," he said.

"I had some wonderful donations from clients and companies, including £1,000 from the Chief Executive of the Adonis club in Brighton. In return, I've promised to wear one of their hoodies during the trip - I'll be the

Adonis of the Zambezi!

"Cover – More Insurance have been fantastic, too, with financial support and much needed free travel insurance!"

Lee would also be delighted to hear from any other companies wishing to sponsor him in return for helping publicise their brand.

Summing up his challenge, Lee says he hopes not just to raise the profile of the charity but to inspire others.



"It's a challenging and physically demanding adventure but one which will make a difference to the lives of dozens of children who need our support," he said. "In a small way I am hoping to make a difference, and I hope that others will want to share in this challenge and do so as well."

News from Cuckfield Parish Council

Summer 2016

#### **Chairman's Annual Report 2015/16**

A new Parish Council was formed in May 2015, this is the first year of a four year term. It is formed of ten locally elected residents who give their time voluntarily to ensure we can run a Parish Council and the Committees, which enact our statutory responsibilities as the first tier of local government.

The second tier of government is Mid Sussex District Council, with whom we work closely. It is responsible for planning decisions, housing provision and local amenities such as parks and recreation. Robert Salisbury and Pete Bradbury are your elected Ward Councillors representing Cuckfield in Mid Sussex.

The third tier is West Sussex County Council which is responsible for services such as Education, Highways, Social and Healthcare services, and then Central Government which defines National Policy and statutory law. I mention this for clarity, as sometimes this leads to confusion within the community about who has responsibility to make changes or how decisions have been made. It has been particularly relevant for some of our Planning and Highways issues for this year.

At time of writing we have just started our second year and I was pleased to accept the nomination for Chairman again, with Martin Sambrook as Vice Chairman. This Annual Report and the Annual Parish Meeting are our annual opportunity to share the work for the previous year and to look forward to the following year. The year has been dominated by residents' concerns over traffic congestion and the increase in HGV traffic. We therefore invited Richard Speller to be one of our guest speakers this year. Richard is Area Manager for Highways and Transport.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Parish Councillors who have served during this first year. You can find a list and contact details of Councillors on the parish website www.cuckfield.gov.uk and in the regular newsletter.

#### **Planning Committee**

With the Neighbourhood Plan formally adopted by Mid Sussex District Council and now part of the District's 'Development Plan' which is being used to assess planning applications, the parish council's attention has turned to the Plan monitoring that we need to do. Most policies have Monitoring Indicators and Targets to

provide examples of the council's intentions and enable some measurement of outcomes. These can be anything from the number of trees, hedges and ponds affected by development to the impact on listed buildings or the loss of strategic views out of the village, as well as the number and location of properties built.

We have seen in the last few months how the Neighbourhood Plan is already having an impact on the future shape of the village. Decisions on a number of prospective developments have been made where Plan policies were a critical factor in the outcome.

#### **Policy**

Mid Sussex District Council continues to struggle on its District Plan delivery, and further delays mean that the area still cannot demonstrate the all-important five year housing supply, against figures which are still to be examined. This has a knock-on effect on our own Neighbourhood Plan, as the government dictates that without this land supply most policies we have adopted which affect housing are deemed 'out of date', even though they're only a few years old, and therefore they do not have the weight they should.

#### **New developments**

The Horsefield Green 14-house development on Ardingly Road is nearing completion, with new residents having moved in from Christmas onwards – we welcome them to the community. Landscape works on the new public open space are largely complete now, and we are awaiting discussions with MSDC over its transfer from the developers to them, and then on to CPC.

Buttinghill Drive is starting to mature as a development. The public open space which accompanies this development will not be transferred to CPC until the end of this year. However, the drainage pond issues we reported on last year are still no nearer resolution, with MSDC and Taylor Wimpey struggling about how resolve the collapsed banks without significant expense. This may complicate and delay the transfer.

Yew Tree Court redevelopment has also been completed recently, and we should thank the developers for mitigating the disruption around the school, which itself is now undergoing a major expansion extension and improvement.

We are awaiting the detailed planning application for Penland Farm development at the end of Hanlye Lane. CPC made a detailed submission to the public



consultation, and we look to the developers to mitigate the impact on the gap between Haywards Heath and the village.

#### Planning decisions and appeals

The Neighbourhood Plan has been a critical document used in the decision making and subsequent appeals process. We await still the outcome of the Appeals for the proposed development for four or 20 houses along Broad Street, at which CPC was represented by our retained professional planner, tasked with defending our Neighbourhood Plan policies.

The Appeals for the extension of Courtyard House at Whitemans Green, Longacre Farm on Ardingly Road and the change of use from planted verge to parking space on the Brick Lane estate, which the parish council objected to, were also all dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate.

#### **Roads & Traffic Committee**

Highways is always a source of public concern and generates the majority of comments to the parish council and one we take very seriously. The majority of the issues are the responsibility of West Sussex Highways with whom we work very closely, but we do own and influence certain projects which we prioritise,

We've seen an increase in traffic, especially HGVs, due to the number of development projects outside the parish which have generated through traffic. We've seen a rise in parking on pavements to the point of obstructing pedestrians. The current legal position on this is tenuous and we continue to ask people to be considerate on this matter. Our key focus for the year was the puffin crossing in London Road which is now complete. We've also been developing a scheme for London Lane to reduce the speed of traffic, and a consultation process started at the Annual Parish meeting. Additionally, we have plans to change the roundabout scheme at Whitemans Green scheduled for 2016-2017 which will be funded and completed by WSCC.

Another cause of concern and frustration has been the pavement outside Cuckfield House. We now have an agreed scheme which will be delivered by WSCC and will include bollards and planters on that stretch of pavement, along with new brick paving.

#### **Community Buildings Committee**

As a reminder, we completed the purchase of the Youth Club building in London Lane and we now own the building and freehold for the site, against a Public Work Loan. We officially renamed the building in Sept 2015 to the Village Hall and it is our newest asset to the village.

I am pleased to announce that the Village Hall has now completed a first full year and we have put in place all the necessary processes and procedures to ensure we can run it as a Community Building for our regular hirers and provide a valuable community asset. Over the summer holidays a series of maintenance projects will be undertaken, which include redecoration of the north hall and entrance area, new flooring and storage. This will benefit existing hirers and also make it an attractive hall to hire and use for new hirers.

The Queen's Hall continues to be very busy and a key asset to the village. It does, however, take a lot of time and effort to maintain and ensure we deliver a good experience for our regular hirers and community groups. We have seen a good use as a wedding venue, including civil ceremonies, and continue to attract very positive feedback from users. We have also worked hard to minimize any impact on our neighbours at the end of the events which are strictly managed and monitored. We have just completed some major decoration in key areas to ensure it is well maintained.

For 2016-2017 we will combine the Queen's Hall and Village Hall into a single Community Buildings Committee.

#### **Environment Committee**

The Environment Committee is focused on wellbeing for the parish. It has worked hard to ensure the churchyard and cemetery are well maintained and provide a beautiful and tranquil environment with stunning views to the South Downs. We are introducing a new mowing regime in certain areas with longer grass to encourage more wildlife and insects. We also ran our biggest and most successful Christmas Street Festival this year, with over 2,000 people attending, and raised money for our local charities. The event marks the start of the Christmas celebration in Cuckfield and coincides with the Tree Festival in Holy Trinity Church. We plan to run it again this year but do require the community and traders to get involved.

The Observer Field (Newbury Lane) continues to be a long-term project to develop and maintain a natural zone for wildlife and ecology. The introduction of beehives has been an important development for this year. We have also supported the volunteers with the renovation of the Royal Observer Corps Nuclear Bunker, as part of Cuckfield's history, which has attracted many visitors at weekends and is located in the Observer Field.

#### **Looking Forward**

The focus for 2017 will be to deliver the projects in our Business Plan for the period 2016 - 2019. This will soon be available for review and feedback on our website. We'll also ratify a new Communication Plan which will then lead to a small investment in our website to upgrade it and provide new methods of communication using social media.

On a staffing note, our current Clerk, Annette Jones, will be leaving at the end of May and we're currently recruiting for a new Deputy Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer. Our Assistant Clerk Sam Heynes will

take on the role of Clerk from June 1st 2016 and we wish her every success in her role.

#### **Getting Involved**

We're always grateful for help with our projects and it's a great way to become more involved in your community. We're always looking for people to take part, everyone one has a skill we can use and we'd like to hear from you. For example, the Christmas Street Festival was only possible due to volunteers coming forward to run the event. Also, we're keen to form a team of Speedwatch volunteers, so please do get in touch if you are interested.

## Ceiling decoration

#### **DESIGN AT HOME**

Gazing at the beautiful ceiling in our own Holy Trinity Church (artist Kempe) the other Sunday made me think about how generally ceilings in our homes are much ignored spaces.

Considered to be the fifth wall, in an attempt to add lift and generate brightness the ceiling is usually painted white. An all white interior with bursts of colour is calming but by being a bit adventurous there are some simple ideas that would set your interior apart if you dare to have a go. I don't mean try to emulate Michelangelo and the Sistine Chapel but paint can be used in a number of ways to change the height and shape of an interior by being selective with colour or tone and moving away from bright white for a more seamless look.

Darker tones advance and pale tones recede, so painting a ceiling dark will have the effect of lowering it when the walls are paler. A pale ceiling will seem higher when the walls are darker. This effect can be achieved by using the same colour or neutral on the wall and ceiling, but by mixing the ceiling paint two shades darker than the wall paint the ceiling will appear lower with the walls stretching out. If your ceiling is a bit lower than you would like, try painting it with the paler paint so that the walls are slightly darker to give the ceiling lift. Painting an interior all the same colour and tone unifies the ceiling and walls, the shadows and colour changing with the light.

Wallpapering the walls and ceiling in the same snazzy design or a shiny metallic is a brave move but can look absolutely stunning. A favourite is a pretty Toile De Jouy wallpaper and fabric in a bedroom. Wooden panelling is a more robust alternative, either narrow planks or geometrical shapes which when painted add depth and dimension and will lend themselves to different styles.

Sometimes decorating a ceiling is out of necessity if there are a few cracks; small ceiling cracks can be hidden using ceiling crack repair tape or sealant, but large cracks might indicate structural damage and should be checked by a professional.

Beware of old polystyrene tiles dating way back which were used to hide cracks and to insulate. Unlike modern versions they do not contain a fire retardant so are dangerous, and a horrible job to remove.

Professional help is needed to remove Artex, especially if it pre-dates the mid 1980s as it contains white asbestos. Skimming the artex surface with plaster is safer.

Stencilled, painted, wallpapered, panelled, tiled, finished with decorative plaster or adorned in fabric, there are many options for a ceiling in need of a facelift. Fantastic ceilings around the world through periods of history and different cultures might encourage you to be a bit creative. Have fun in children's bedrooms bringing ceilings to life with clouds, stars, rainbows, spaceships or perhaps a superhero or two.
