Walking Race and Easter Egg Hunt


The annual Independent State of Cuckfield Walking Race & Children's Easter Egg Hunt takes place on Easter Monday, 28th March, in the Recreation Ground.

While the walkers are out on the course, children are invited to join the annual Easter Egg Hunt, which starts at around 10.30am. Pre-school space seeds

Children at Cuckfield's Norto5 Kidz Academy are preparing to become space biologists by growing seeds that have been into space.

In September last year, 2kg of rocket seeds were flown to the International Space Station (ISS) on Soyuz 44S where they will have spent several months in microgravity before returning to Earth this month. The seeds have been sent as part of Rocket Science, an educational project launched by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and the UK Space Agency.

Norto 5 Kidz Academy will be one of up to 10,000 schools to receive a packet of 100 seeds from space, which they will grow alongside seeds that haven't been to space and measure the differences over seven weeks. The children won't know which seed packet contains which seeds until all results have been collected by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and analysed by professional biostatisticians.

Tracey Miller, supervisor of Norto5 Kidz Academy in Cuckfield says: "We are very excited to be taking part in Rocket Science. This experiment is a fantastic way of introducing science to young children."

Rocket Science is just one educational project from a programme developed by the UK Space Agency to celebrate British ESA astronaut Tim Peake's mission to the ISS and inspire young people to look into careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects, including horticulture.

A popular and long established Garden Fair is moving to a new yenue.




The principal beneficiaries will continue to be St Peter and St James Hospice and Chestnut Tree House Children's Hospice.


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Cuckfield Interiors launches design service

Missing Monty finally found

The rugby pitches at Whiteman's Green have been the scene of many dramas but nothing could match the excitement when lost dog Monty staggered onto the touchline during a training session last month.

Monty, a 7 year old border terrier, had gone missing during on a walk on Whiteman's Green and, after more than two weeks with no sightings, hopes of finding him were beginning to fade.

But owner Klare Kennett refused to give up hope. Supported by family, friends and fellow dog walkers Klare set up the 'Help Find Monty' campaign, distributing posters all around the village, setting up a Facebook page and carrying out daily searches around Whiteman's Green and New England Wood.

And their persistence paid off when Monty was found after staggering onto the green and collapsing between the two rugby pitches. Whiteman's Green resident Peter Clack had spotted the little dog in his car headlights, alerting the players who made the phone call Klare had been praying for.

"Monty was very weak, thin and dehydrated, but also warm, dusty and smelt strongly of foxes," said Klare. "We think he'd been stuck down a fox hole, unable to squeeze himself out until he had lost weight.

"Monty knows the rugby club very well as my son Oliver plays for the minis, so headed for a familiar place."

Monty was whisked off to the vet, where he spent the night under observation and on a drip but, much to the family's delight, made a remarkable recovery and was well enough to return to the family home in Bolnore Village the following day.

"Having Monty home is absolutely wonderful, not only for us but for our other dog Barney who had been pining for him," said Klare, assistant communications and marketing director for the RSPCA which had rescued both dogs. "He's sleeping a lot and has a nasty sore where his harness had rubbed him. But apart from that he's doing really well."

Klare added that she was overwhelmed by the support from residents and dog lovers from Cuckfield and beyond. "The Help Find Monty Facebook page reached around 22,000 people and I've had hundreds of messages of support," said Klare.

"I'd like to thank everyone who helped search for Monty from the bottom of my heart. All the wandering around those fields and woods every day calling Monty must have kept him going as he gradually lost weight down the hole until he was small enough to wriggle out and find his way back to his favourite place – the rugby club.

"It shows what can be achieved when people work together but also highlights the benefits of microchipping which makes the chances of being reunited with a lost pet so much better."

There were extra special celebrations when Monty returned to the village just days after his ordeal ended to be reunited with the some of the many 'human helpers' who had joined in the search for him.

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Newest Scout group in Sussex needs a helping hand



In the past six years, Bolnore has made some big strides in coming up with a range of facilities and groups that one might find in its much older neighbouring villages. This really started with the opening of the primary school five years ago, followed by a community garden and the Woodside, which, since opening just over a year ago, already serves as the village church, pub, preschool, Scout hut, youth club and hosts a vast range of groups, classes and sports clubs.

One of the key success stories has been the Bolnore Village Scout Group, founded nearly five years ago and still to our knowledge the newest Scout group in West Sussex. The Scout Group serves a total of around 80 children (girls now as well as boys) and boasts two Beaver Colonies (6-8 year olds), a Cub Pack (8-10yr olds) and a Scout Troop (10-14½yr olds).

All the sections provide a balanced programme based on traditional Scouting ideals which are accessible to all and include a mixture of fun, adventure, learning about self, new skills and experiences, and teamwork, Scouting is also about being a part of the community and as part of its obligation as a uniformed organisation the Scout Group gets involved in local initiatives and supports key local events including Remembrance Day and St. George's Day parades. This all counts towards a range of activity badges, challenge badges and ultimately a Chief Scout's Award, which all the young Beavers, Cubs and Scouts love working towards. For example the Scout troop is currently working towards the survival badge. This involves completing a range of challenges both on Troop night and at Camp. Consequently a recent troop night included cooking some sausages on trangias (a type of portable stove).


Each section also provides at least one overnight experience either under canvas or in accommodation.



For example the Scout Troop's Summer Camp in August this year is in Snowdonia for seven days, and there will be a Spring Camp around Easter time at Stanford Scout Camp site near Pease Pottage. The Cub Pack and Beaver Colonies are also all having sleepovers either locally in Scout halls or in Scout Association campsites run by scouts for scouts.

Bolnore Scout Group would not be thriving of course without its volunteers who give up their time to organise and run section meetings and events throughout the year. Bolnore Scout Group is incredibly fortunate to have an amazing team of enthusiastic, dedicated leaders and executive members who love working with young people and are immensely proud to have brought one of Britain's most traditional and rewarding institutions to such a new community. Without this team of volunteers — around 20 in all — Bolnore Scouting simply would not be the success it is currently and or be able to thrive into the future

Despite this the Cub Pack is currently struggling following the loss of both its Leader and Assistant Leader in recent months. The group is urgently looking for two or more adults who love working with young people in the community and are free on a Tuesday evening between 6.30pm and 8pm (term-time only). Next time you are in The Queen's Hall linger around the entrance and look at the Mayors of Cuckfield display boards. Meticulously recorded in letters of gold on shining polished wood, you will read the names and dates of Mayors over the past five decades from Joe Mitchell the first in 1966 to our present 2016 fourth time Ken.

Don't leave – look more carefully- and you will be able to trace through time Mayors that belong to one special village family. Ted Murphy (1974 and 1975) is the beginning of this remarkable family chain which starts in 1974 when he was landlord of the sadly missed Kings Head, thus fulfilling the early billing of this eccentric election as a contest between 'publicans and sinners'. For those of you with the Holy Bible to hand see Mark 2:15 for an interesting reference.

During Ted's two consecutive years in office he contributed richly to the life of the village. It was during his time that we fought the landfill site at Whiteman's Green, and Ted, true to form, donned the robes and appeared on the BBC's 'Nationwide' to alert the country about this pending environmental catastrophe from which we managed to victoriously escape, and now enjoy the Golf Course.

One of his major achievements however was to marry Christine Knight in September 1975 and so pave the way for Chris Murphy to be elected Mayor thirteen years later in 1989. Chris, by this time, landlady of The White Harte, still thankfully part of village life, managed to perform her mayoral duties while working in the pub and bringing up her young family. It was Chris who unveiled the Mayor of Cuckfield Display Boards in the Queen's Hall so cementing past present and future mayors of The Independent State of Cuckfield and officially establishing the importance of this fundraising organisation to the culture and well being of our community.

Ron Knight, Chris Murphy's late Father, was elected Mayor in 1985, succeeding my own term of office, and did so on a night of controversy and drama. As midnight approached when a bell should ring out to end the voting Ron was in the lead from another candidate Sarah Fry. At that very moment her supporters leapt in with a vote worth £200 to supposedly clinch the deal.

Chaos ensued! Robes were on, robes were off! Who was to be Mayor? Both of them of course! So 1985 was blessed with a Mayor and a Mayoress. Ron Knight, a Second World War veteran, had always worked hard for the youth of Cuckfield and supported and participated in a range of sporting events, and his year of office reflected this interest and commitment.

Ron handed over his robes in 1986 to his nephew Martin Ingebretson, a well known 'voice of Cuckfield', and Chris and Ted Murphy's cousin. During his mayoral year he remembers participating in 'It's a Knock Out' and presenting Trophies at the Motor Bike Scrambles at Sparks Farm in Whiteman's Green. He has, since then continued to work tirelessly for The Independent State of Cuckfield, and will as always be a major









presence at all the events in this fiftieth anniversary celebratory year.

A decade ago Cuckfield celebrated it's fortieth year of Independence and to mark that occasion forty candidates presented themselves for election, and the winner that year of 2006, raising a massive £3,500 was Henry O'Donohue, Chris and Ted Murphy's brother-in-law. Henry, a larger than life character known affectionately to the locals as the 'hippy with long hair', reignited the family theme for the twenty first century.

The Independent State of Cuckfield is hoping that this year fifty candidates will stand for mayor, and the family are relishing their 'trump card'. Waiting patiently 'in the wings' is Leanne Knapman nee Murphy, Ted and Chris's daughter. A busy working Mother, this will be her twelfth attempt to 'win the robes', and she has to be in with a chance. We know she will be well supported by her family

in spite of Jo and Michael, her sister and brother, Gareth her husband and Ted all appearing as candidates too!

What about the future though I hear you cry. Never fear brave Cuckfieldians there are seven grandchildren in this great family waiting on the sidelines to keep the family tradition alive and well. The family of Mayors is in a powerful position to lead us into the next half century and we will be able to continue to celebrate this exciting long standing 'Family Affair' of Mayors.

To celebrate The Independent State of Cuckfield's 50th Anniversary, the group is hoping to attract 50 candidates to stand for mayor this year. Why not get involved yourself? 

Clare Pope, owner of Cuckfield-based Clare's Cake Boutique, recommends a recipe for this eye-catching cake that even we should be able to make!

In addition, Clare shares her tricks of the trade on how to make and decorate cakes like a professional.

By getting the children involved, you get to keep them occupied for a few hours during the Easter holidays (whatever the weather), and they get to learn a new skill. Allowing you and the family to marvel at the centrepiece on the table on Easter Sunday.

Chocolate Easter Cake

Ingredients:

6oz/170g self-raising flour 6oz/170g baking margarine 6oz/170g caster sugar 3 large eggs 2oz/50g cocoa powder 1 teaspoon of baking powder

Method:

- Cream together the butter and sugar in a mixing bowl
- Crack all three eggs into a separate bowl and lightly beat with a fork
- Sieve the flour, baking powder and cocoa powder into another bowl
- Add 1/3 of the flour mixture to the butter then add 1/3 of the eggs. Beat gently, either with a mixer or by hand. Once all the mixture is combined, add the same amount of flour mixture and egg again, combine in the same way. Once this is mixed, add the final portion of flour mixture and egg, beating together to form an even smooth paste.
- Grease and flour two 7" Victoria sandwich tins.
- Scoop mixture into each of the greased tins, ensuring there is an equal amount in each.
- Bake in a preheated oven (180C/356F/Gas mark 4) for 15-20 mins.
 - **Do not open the door until the cake is cooked!**
- Remove from tins and leave to cool

Cake Decorating Hints & Tips

- Cut the domed-top off your cake and discard, then turn it upside down and use the base as your neat top to decorate.
- Before you cut a cake, eg: for layering, leave it to cool and then refrigerate for 1 hour or freeze for 30 mins. This will make the cake more stable and less crumbly when cutting.










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

News from Cuckfield Parish

Spring 2016

Chairman's Introduction

by Nigel Page, Chair of Cuckfield Parish Council

It continues to be a busy time for the Council. We have a number of activities in hand, as well as the day to day running of the Parish Council's assets which include running and hiring two community buildings, management of the churchyard and open burial ground, public toilets, two allotment sites and much more. The Council is now embarking on developing a three-year business plan to identify and agree projects for the remainder of the term. We are aiming to consult residents on the proposed projects at the Annual Parish Meeting on 19th May, so do please put this date in your diary. We have recently set up a working group to look at the amenity land proposed to be offered to the Parish Council following developments at Bylanes and Ardingly Road.

As mentioned in earlier communications we have invested in more staff resources for the parish office and extended opening times over five days. But what you may not know is how to find the office! Cuckfield Parish Office can be found in the wonderful Grade II Listed building, The Queen's Hall in the High Street, the first door on the left as you go in. You will be greeted by Annette, the Parish Clerk, Sam, the Assistant Clerk and Jane, our Clerical Assistant, who are always ready to answer your query or point you in the right direction. The new opening times can be found at the end of the newsletter under our contact details.

Planning

Having acted as an interested party at a recent Hearing, the Parish Council now awaits the Inspector's decision on two appeals (for a housing development of 20 dwellings and 4 dwellings respectively) at the land parcel East of Broad Street. We are now actively monitoring Neighbourhood Plan housing policies against actual planning outcomes. Since April 2015, there have been 35 applications in the parish, mostly for residential extensions, of which 31 have been approved by MSDC. Included in this figure are three new dwellings on existing/in fill sites. In 86% of cases, Mid Sussex District Council decisions have concurred with the parish council.

Roads & Traffic

High Street Pavement

The pavement from Leyton Lea running towards the recreation ground is getting closer to being repaired. West Sussex County Council (WSCC) has agreed the work with its contractor and is aiming to place the order in this financial year. The project will see bollards installed and the block pavers re-laid along the section of the pavement (between the junction of Leyton Lea to the entrance of the Recreation Ground) to prevent vehicles parking / driving on it causing further damage. Please be considerate when parking in the village and remember that pavements and verges are not for vehicles.

London Lane

The project for safety improvements in London Lane, which is to be funded using Section 106 monies, has had to be suspended whilst WSCC carries out a review of the funding and project allocation process. The review is due to be completed by the end of March and we will restart our work on the plans as soon as we have secured the funding.

Street Lighting

You may recall the parish council has been working to ensure the new street lighting is consistent, matching heritage style fittings in designated areas to enhance the street scene. We are pleased to report the street lighting project, to replace the lighting columns in Cuckfield, is getting close to completion! The final work will include replacement of the lamp brackets attached to buildings in the High Street to a Heritage style fitting, which will be more in keeping with the conservation areas of the village. We expect the work to take place within the next six weeks.

Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) in the High Street and London Lane

Lindfield Preservation Society, along with local villages, has been working to try and secure a ban of HGV's through some villages in the District. After gaining support from the majority of local councils, they have submitted an application to West Sussex County Council for a Traffic Regulation Order. We will keep you updated.

Finance

This year has seen a number of commitments on our finances some chosen, some imposed. For example, we have increased staff resources in the parish office to manage our many assets, duties as a parish council and extended office opening times for better access by our residents. The Council has approved a budget of £20,000 over the next two years to carry out much needed maintenance and improvements to the Cuckfield Village Hall (purchased by the Council in February 2015). Government imposed pension and National Insurance costs have affected our outgoings. The Parish Council has in recent years kept its Council Tax increase at either nil or very low (0.10p per annum on a Band D property last year). Recently, however, Full Council had to take the decision to increase the precept for 2016/17 and approved an annual increase of approximately £12.91 per annum on a Band D property (a little over £1 per month) to meet its future commitments. The table below shows the recently approved budget for the 2016/17 financial year, showing where the money will go. Of course, prudent management of the budget will continue and savings made where appropriate. As mentioned elsewhere in the newsletter, the Council are applying to fund the traffic-calming project in London Lane solely from Section 106 funds (which are developer contributions made against housing built in the village).

The price of vandalism

It is costing the Parish Council a considerable amount of money to replace two vandalised rubbish bins.

One in Ardingly Road was set on fire and the other, in Mytten Twitten was kicked in to such an extent as to be unusable. The latter will cost in the region of £300 to replace. Churchyard Wildflower Experiment

In some sections of the churchyard many of the older plots provide evidence of up to twenty species of wild flowers. The Parish Council is starting a small experiment aimed at bringing a more natural look to one of these sections by restricting the mowing and strimming within it. It may look a bit untidy but it will enable us to see how many of these flowers would flourish here if they were not routinely cut back. We will put up small notice to this effect for the benefit of visitors.

It is planned to extend the modified mowing regime to the new burial ground, partly to provide a more wildlife-friendly environment adjoining the hedges and partly to remind everyone that this is not a recreation area for ball games or exercising dogs. Visitors, and especially those tending graves, value our churchyard's quiet and peaceful atmosphere and we are committed to maintaining this.

The Observer Field

Organic or inorganic?

VILLAGE GREEN

The choice whether to go 'organic' is always in the news. It can be a tough call for many of us, but at least we're lucky to live in an area where there are lots of organic possibilities – from lovely veggies at Laines just down the road, to organic wines in Sussex and now organic bedlinen in East Sussex.

While browsing through some magazines recently, my attention was drawn to a T-shirt promotion. The singular quality of the promoted tee was that the cotton used is organic. I remembered visiting a farming family in a small, rural Indian village. Talking over tea they told us how sick the children had become since the cotton harvest. Looking around the small, two roomed home we saw that it was stacked with baled cotton waiting to be collected and taken to the cotton gin. This is where the family slept surrounded by pesticides still in the cotton which added to the poisons already absorbed from spraying against the cotton boll weevil.

Musing on, I thought about the effect of toxins on our skin. This is an area which impacts us all—from the soap and shampoos we use, to deodorants and personal care products. With the 'organic' buzz word used randomly in the beauty aisles of the stores, it's a good idea to check the product ingredients. Look out for what has become known as 'green wash', that is to say only one or two ingredients are natural though the rest and the manufacturing process may be far from organic.

Have a look instead for the certification standard COSMOS – Cosmetics Organic Standard developed by the Soil Association with four European certification bodies to harmonise organic standards globally.

So organic or inorganic? We are what we eat so it's best to choose our food wisely. There has been much written and discussed on this aspect so no more now. It's time to raise the bar so let's hear it for organic wine. It's worth searching out the pesticide and sulphite free bottle of red or white of your choice and, yes, there are organic vineyards in Sussex.

Banking has gone organic too with Triodos Bank. The movement towards natural methods in the food, retail and beauty sectors need sustainable financial support and Triodos lend only to organisations that have a positive impact on people and planet.

More good news is that close to home in East Sussex is a company making organic mattresses, pillows and bedding.

To top it all, there's organic tartan. Oh yes there is! Organic from sheep to blanket, the wool is from HRH The Prince of Wales' organic sheep and the tartan is designed and woven in the New Lanark Mill under their organic license.

Okay, you won't find organic mattresses or tartan at our next Market but there will be good, honest Sussex food to choose from. So come to The Talbot on 12th March between 9.30-12.30pm to sample the produce. And don't forget your milk bottle tops!

RSPB advice

The RSPB is receiving a rising number of calls from the public concerned for wildlife, due to an unusually warm winter.

The mild weather has caused added dangers for wildlife, with reports of hedgehogs leaving hibernation early and councils unable to remove Christmas trees due to nesting birds. On Good Friday we deepen our knowledge of the self-giving love of Jesus for each of us on the cross before the darkness is dispelled on Easter Eve as the great Paschal (Easter) Candle is lit and the church flooded with the light of many candles – a sign of our Resurrection life found in following Jesus Christ. We would love to see you at any of our services as we rejoice at God's love made known through Jesus Christ.


