

Where have the thermometers gone?

For the past two years a thermometer has stood outside Holy Trinity church and on the wall of the Talbot showing not temperature but the extent of the debt remaining for the improvements to the church building and the purchase of the curate's house.

Because of the many successful events and the additional giving by our members we have kept up with the required payback period for our loans.

As we no longer need the curate's house it has been sold. The Diocese of Chichester has agreed that we can use the net proceeds to repay our outstanding loan from the Clydesdale Bank.

We set ourselves a target of repaying all our loans by 2017. Our debt reduced dramatically over the summer, leaving us with an outstanding debt of £68k after taking into account other receipts.

We have decided that it is time to signal that the church can move on to address new challenges, so we have removed the two thermometers.

Whilst this is a happy sign of progress, there is still much to be done to repay the remaining loans of £68k. With friends and supporters in the community we will continue to welcome the use of the church building, the largest enclosed space in the village, for a variety of events.

We hope that no one misses the thermometers (there will still be a small version in the church) and that people will share the good news. The debt is not fully off the agenda but it does not now have to be quite so prominent! Watch out for further exciting and enjoyable fundraising events in the coming months.

Following the success of last year, a local family are organising the fourth Angus Rowland ForgetMeNot walk starting and finishing at Staplefield Village Hall on 4th October.



What's in the water?

VILLAGE GREEN

By Margaret Tyzack More, Cuckfield Local Sitting by my little pond one sunny Sunday recently, cuppa nearby and biscuit in hand. I was idly watching the fish swimming in the clear water. Something surprising caught my eye around the pond weed. Taking a closer look I saw a tiny fish, a couple of centimetres long, closely followed by two more. A shoal of fishlets! Schubert, Orpheus, Gracie, Shadow and Jack Flash have been with me for several years but never before has there been offspring. What was different this year? Could it be because 'my' frogs are no more, having succumbed to the renavirus wiping out frogs, toads and newts in some parts of the UK? I had noticed that Gracie the goldfish had been chasing Schubert the shubunkin around but thought little of it. Whoops! The sex of the fish had not counted when I named them. This just shows that you can't judge a fish by its scales. I had thought cross-breeding in this way was not possible but found that shubunkins are calico goldfish, so that accounts for the babies.

It makes a change to be writing around water. Air is crucial to us and to the bees and pollinators that we support with our Bee Friendly to Pollinators Campaign. Our wild flower bed in the Recreation Ground has been magnificent this summer and has been a good place to do the Great British Butterfly Count. My garden has hosted a small number this year and now I can distinguish a painted lady from a small tortoiseshell and several more besides. Never too late to learn something new.

Moving on to earth, it is concerning to learn from the Soil Association that the maize crop is causing widespread environmental damage. Maize is grown for animal food and fuel through anaerobic digestion and is usually harvested late in the year when soils are wet. Heavy rain water running off the surface of compacted, damaged fields pollutes waterways with pesticide and nutrients and causes floods.

Earth, air, fire and water, where would we be without them? We wouldn't, would we? All the more reason to honour, respect and cherish the natural world. An old proverb says 'a farmer should live as though he were going to die tomorrow but farm as though he were going to live for ever'. Everything we do leaves an impact and a legacy. What's yours?

Visitors to the August Cuckfield Local Food Market will have noticed that some of our regular stall holders were absent. Game is out of season for a while and summer holidays accounted for the others. Don't despair. All your favourites will be back with us on 10th October in the courtyard of The Talbot. The Market runs from 9.30am to 12.30pm. Good news! Buyers of Lesley's yummy jams and marmalade will be pleased to know that she will give you a 25p refund on your returned clean jam jars if you bring them to her stall.

Odd jobs for Emily


Bolnore Village resident Emily Greenland has left her London job after being inspired to make a difference in rural Africa later this year.



The benefits of shopping on your doorstep

HIGH STREET FEATURE

The High Street here in Cuckfield has been passed through and enjoyed for well over 200 years. In the early 19th Century it was terribly fashionable to enjoy a trip to the seaside and the London to Brighton Stagecoach route passed right through Cuckfield's High Street, stopping at The King's Head providing sustenance for passengers and respite for the horses. The Prince Regent used the route many times during this period in his travel to and from his coastal residence at the Brighton Pavilion.

As is well documented in the annals of local history, with the opening of the railway in the 1840s came much reduced stagecoach traffic through Cuckfield. However, the village continued to thrive after this time with a number of significant homes being built in this era.

The twisting and turning High Street is one of the village's great charms enjoyed by visitors and residents alike ever since those days.



Of course some will recall the shops and facilities of days gone by with great longing. The photo above, from 1852, shows a road with a lone horse tied up in the distance and a few locals going about their day either side of a wide, and empty, carriageway. Whilst this represents a moment in time for Cuckfield, there is much to be grateful for, and even excited about, on the High Street in 2015!

The economy of the country is changing and the way we spend money is too. According to a survey carried out last year by The Local Data Company more stores closed on the UK's High Streets than opened; a total number of closures that was three times larger than the year before that. However, despite the rather gloomy picture nationally, Cuckfield enjoys a staggering number of businesses all vying for position and visibility in the village. The High Street may not be what it once was in

terms of footfall, but where is this the case? Instead we have a wonderfully colourful selection of retailers which would be the envy of many communities of this size, and larger. One shopper recently claimed that there are more independent shops in Cuckfield than there are in Hove!

What follows is what I discovered when I took a pleasant meander through Cuckfield to really get a glimpse of just how much is available on the doorstep. In preparation for this article I also gave all High Street businesses the opportunity to place a listing on the pages that follow too. I'm also grateful to some residents who all love shopping right here and have told us why.

Some consider that the core function of a shop in a village is for the most basic of needs. Cuckfield does especially well on this score with one Co-operative Food supermarket at either end and an Esso petrol station at Whitemans Green. Add into this mix the much fought for Wealden Stores with its selection of flowers and plants outside, a popular Cook outlet store and Post Office inside too! Plus there is another Post Office at the bottom of the High Street, featuring all the necessities of a PO alongside many cards and wrapping options.

Another service the village is renowned for locally is dentists! 



Staff and pupils at Holy Trinity Primary School marked the end of an era last term when school secretary Liz Woods retired after almost a quarter of a century.

Referred to by her Head Teacher in her leaving speech as 'the Oracle', due to her vast knowledge of the village and its residents, Liz has been at the heart of school life for the past 25 years. She's the friendly voice on the end of the phone, a former minute taker at Governors' meetings, decorator of the school Christmas tree and 'chief cook and bottle washer' on dozens of school trips.

She's seen a whole generation of youngsters pass though Holy Trinity, including her own two children Claire and Chris, and watched the school almost double in size. She's also worked for eight Heads and deputies, organised school and charity events, and still found time to participate in village life, including becoming Mayor in 1995!

Born in Cuckfield Hospital, Liz grew up at Stonehall Farm on the Balcombe estate where her father worked as farm manager. "He was there for 40 years, so I guess staying in jobs tends to run in the family!" said Liz. Her father is now in his nineties and still living in Balcombe.

She met her husband Richard at the Young Farmers Club. "At that time Cuckfield had its own Young Farmers Club," Liz recalled.

"Richard's grandfather cycled all the way from Portsmouth to get a job with local builder Stephen Knight," she added. "When we got married we moved into a family cottage at Whitemans Green and we've lived there ever since – for 42 years!"

Liz joined the staff at Holy Trinity shortly after the new school opened in 1992, having moved from the old village school next to the church. She was originally employed as a teaching assistant. "I had only been at the school for a term when they decided to create separate roles for school secretary and bursar," said Liz. "As I had previously worked as a PA, the Head Teacher asked me if I would like the job of school secretary (I think he may have had this in mind when he employed me!).

"My first thought was that I didn't want to stop working with the children. But when I was assured that the job also included time in the classrooms, I decided to accept."

At that time the school had five classes and 150 pupils. "I remember being given an old typewriter which came from Mill Hall School," said Liz. "When computers came in I had to learn on the job – there was no official training!"

Liz says the best part of being school secretary has been the variety. "I loved Monday mornings when the whole school worshipped together and I'll miss decorating the Christmas tree and doing shopping for staff who were leaving," said Liz. "I've changed the seat in the boys' toilets and cleared up everything you can imagine!

"When French was introduced into school I did the afternoon registers in French with Years 1 and 2," she added. "I also helped organise exchange trips to France when Cuckfield twinned with Aumale and the children all stayed with French families."

Closer to home, Liz has been a valuable addition to many school trips. "I enjoyed going with the Year 5s on the annual expedition to the youth hostel in Alfriston, to study the Cuckmere," said Liz. "We often got terrible wet weather. One year we had torrential rain and I remember seeing soap bubbles appearing from one girl's trainers – her mother had washed them before the trip!"

Another memorable trip ended abruptly when the party was struck down with a sickness bug. "We were sending the children home as fast as their parents could arrive to pick them up!"

Equally memorable were the Year 6 camping trips to Lodge Hill in Pulborough, when Liz became an expert at shopping for 40 children and cooking everything outdoors. "It was a quite exhausting week but really good fun and great for team building."

As the school grew, the office work took priority. "The school now has 12 classes and around 330 children, and more children means more paperwork!" said Liz.

"Standards are so much higher now and the children have more opportunities," she added. The school has also embraced new initiatives such as becoming eco-friendly, winning awards for its beautiful grounds.

Away from the school, Liz plays an active role in village life. A long-standing member of the Independent State of Cuckfield, Liz was elected as Mayor in 2005, donating £2,000 to the school during her year in office. Her husband is also a former Mayor.

More recently she has focused her efforts into fundraising for charity, after a shock diagnosis of breast cancer in 2013. "It came completely out of the blue as I had no lump or other symptoms," said Liz who, after two operations and a course of chemotherapy and radiotherapy, is currently in remission.

"My daughter got married while I was having chemo, so it was a real shame that I wasn't at my best," said Liz. "It was a tiring but lovely day and when I saw the photos I was pleased I didn't look like I was ill. I think my wig, which was cut and styled by Trevor Sorbie in Brighton, must have helped!"

The treatment meant Liz was off work for ten months. "The Head Teacher Jo was fantastically supportive - I couldn't have wished for a better Head."

Whilst Liz was undergoing treatment, a colleague and keen runner, Wendy, decided that staff at the school would raise money for cancer charities and 'Race for Liz' was born.

The event, a three mile run around Cuckfield village, with Liz providing water and jelly babies for participants at Whiteman's Green, was so successful that it has become an annual event. "We've raised more than £1,000 for MacMillan nurses and the new Cancer Unit at the Royal Sussex County Hospital in Brighton," said Liz, who is already planning next year's event.

Retirement for Liz means spending time with her grandchildren – Erin, 7, Sebastian, 3, Isabelle, 5 and Alexander, 1 and the family is already looking forward to trips to Center Parks and Disneyland Paris.

She's also planning a trip touring the west coast of America with husband Richard. "I'm looking forward to being able to take a holiday in term time!" said Liz, who has also signed up for pilates classes and taken up crochet. "I also plan to do some porcelain painting with my friend Elaine."

Retirement

My work at school has come to an end 'Tho I felt at times I'd go round the bend! I've seen so much, and done even more Unlike any job I'd done before.

The camping trips come rain or shine, Without a doubt we had a great time. From Summer Fair to Christmas tree The memories will stay with me.

In 24 years Heads came and went, You just had to take what the Governors sent! From bad to good we've come a long way Let's hope that Jo is here to stay.

I'll miss you all and children too And tho' I'm off to pastures new I'll keep in touch with all my mates Just hear that buzz – I'm at the gates!

Leaving the school was always going to be emotional for Liz, who summed up her feelings in a poem which she read as her farewell speech. Staff presented her with a silver Pandora bracelet, complete with charms, while the children made a book of memories and a painted wooden collage.

"Working at Holy Trinity is like being part of a family," said Liz. "The staff aren't just colleagues, they're friends. I'll miss their companionship and of course I'll miss the children."

And Cuckfield parents will have to get used to a new voice on the school phone. "Both my children have admitted to phoning the school on my last day just to hear me say: "Good morning, Holy Trinity School, can I help you?" laughed Liz.

"Unfortunately they were out of luck – at the time I was down at the church!"

Amazing walls

DESIGN AT HOME

Bored with grey walls? Does your home need an uplift? If you fancy a change away from the ubiquitous grey, white or cream décor that grace many a fashionable interior, there are some amazing alternatives that can cleverly add value to your room in the hidden technology within the material.

Take the kitchen for example. How about an area of wall given over to blackboard paint, useful for lists, menus and reminders or bits of crazy colourful chalk based art that change with your mood. Guaranteed to occupy the kids when you're cooking. A layer of magnetic paint beneath the blackboard surface will add to the usefulness and creativity.

Do you have a noisy neighbour? Is there a drummer in the family? Musicians might welcome an acoustic wall, look at Selina Rose's fantastic cut and fold acoustic felt panels adding pattern, softness and at the same time absorbing sound while creating a focal point (see website).

Your home office might benefit from an area of magnetic paint or dry erase paint so ideas can be jotted on the wall and rubbed off later.

Alternatively go Eco.! Reduce your carbon footprint by insulating a wall creatively. Warm oak panels or a recycled alternative which can be painted using an eco paint will insulate, add cosiness and statement to an interior. Depending on your style, tongue and groove panelling works well or panels based on an historical design such as Elizabethan or Victorian. Up-cycled panels created from old wooden boxes, old wooden floor boards and suchlike create a unique interior.

Alternatively, use an insulating lining paper beneath a wallpaper that has been made from recycled paper (there are 3D versions of recycled wallpaper), an eco friendly way to keep the chills out.

Consider cork, a renewable and sustainable product from the bark of the cork oak tree. It will introduce a warm, soft texture which also insulates. Cork is available in tiles or on a roll, waxed or natural and can also be painted.

Leather or fabric panels are always a fantastic choice to perk up a painted wall and panels infilled with a lovely fabric adds drama and original styling. Leather panels are very chic, sophisticated and add a masculine tone.

Unusual lighting will uplift a plain wall; a string of LEDs shining up from floor level or down from the ceiling. White LEDs or RGB(red, green and blue) that cycle through the colours creating a shock against the neutral wall, great for the party animal!

A large mirror on a wall or a completely mirrored wall in a small space, placed opposite a window, will make the interior look much bigger and bounce light around the space.

To simply add fun and/or colour to one grey wall, there is a fantastic selection of murals to choose from, made bespoke to fit your wall space, such as world maps, dessert island beaches, Roman columns – a lot of fun!

Cuckfield friends Harry White and Alex Hawkes are climbing the road to success after securing a string of qiqs for their band – These Thousand Hills.

Looking to the future, the friends are hoping to build on their current success. "It would be a dream to be able to earn a living doing what we love," said Harry. "And I'd love to see people wearing our merchandise," added Alex.
